

Levski fined  
for Hitler  
banner

Top Bulgarian football club Levski Sofia has been fined almost 20,000 euros after fans displayed banners with swastikas and praise of Adolf Hitler during a recent game, the country's football federation said on Wednesday.

"The Bulgarian football union's disciplinary committee has imposed a fine of 37,500 leva (19,200 euros, \$24,900) on Levski for swastikas held up by its fans," the union said in a statement on its website.

It also called on the club to slap a two-year stadium ban on the authors of the incidents.

During a league game against Litex Lovech on April 20, fans had held up a banner wishing happy birthday to Hitler -- born on that day in 1889 -- and another with a swastika adopted by his Nazi party.

Levski, which eventually won the game 2-1, was also fined 5,000 leva after fans threw missiles and firecrackers.

This is not the first time the club, currently second in the league table, have been sanctioned for racism and violence.

In September, European football's governing body UEFA fined them 30,000 euros after their fans shouted racist abuse at their Bosnian opponents Sarajevo during a Europa League qualifying match in July.

Barcelona, who have changed the face of the game in recent years, were handed a footballing lesson when they were crushed 4-0 by Bayern Munich in an extraordinary Champions League semifinal first leg on Tuesday.

The Catalans, winners of the trophy in 2009 and 2011, had no answer to Bayern's power, speed, pressing and resolute defence as they slumped to their heaviest defeat for almost six years and matched their worst result in European competition.

The victory was so comprehensive the 68,000 crowd at the Allianz Arena may have wondered whether they were witnessing the end of an era as the all-conquering visitors were ripped apart in the second half.

Thomas Mueller was the architect,

scoring the first and last goals and setting up the second for Mario Gomez as the Bavarians, already crowned Bundesliga champions, continued an astonishing season that could yet yield a treble.

World Player of the Year Messi, returning from a hamstring injury, made little impact up front for Barca while midfield duo Xavi and Andres Iniesta lacked their usual cutting edge.

Some of the gloss was taken off Bayern's win however by doubts over the second and third goals.

Gomez looked marginally offside when he turned in the second after 49 minutes and Barcelona protested that midfielder Mueller blocked Jordi Alba as the defender tried to tackle Arjen Robben before the Dutchman clipped the ball into the corner 24 minutes later.

Two of the goals followed corners, exposing weaknesses in the Barca defence in the absence of the injured

Carles Puyol.

On a heavily-watered pitch, Bayern did not touch the ball for the first minute as the Catalans got the match under way with one of their characteristic passing moves.

Robben had an early shot saved by Victor Valdes following a clever Javi Martinez backheel before Barca enjoyed another long period of possession.

German Cup finalists Bayern then began to look more dangerous and it was no surprise when they went ahead in the 25th minute with the help of an overhit corner by Franck Ribery.

His delivery found Robben on the other side of the penalty area and a rare right-footed cross from the Dutchman fell to defender Dante who headed the ball on for Mueller to stoop and score.

Barca were also caught out at another corner four minutes after the break. This time Mueller rose at the far post to head

into the middle for Gomez to turn the ball in amid suspicions of offside.

The Catalans were then run ragged after that as shots from Mueller and Ribery flashed wide and Robben went close with a header from a free kick.

Barca were even reduced to long balls forward in their attempt to break free of the home team's shackles.

Bayern were cruising at 2-0 when defensive midfielder Luiz Gustavo replaced Gomez in the 71st minute but there was no end to the agony for Barca.

Robben exploited some gaps two minutes later when he dribbled down the right for the third goal although Mueller appeared to unfairly block Alba as the Dutchman tucked inside before shooting home with his left foot.

With the visitors still reeling, Mueller then blasted a David Alaba pass into the net for the fourth goal with eight minutes left.

## Raumdeuter strikes again

Mueller, who scored two goals and was involved in the other two against the stunned Catalans, was expecting to be loaned or transferred from Bayern until Van Gaal turned him into a first-team regular in the 2009-10 season.

Mueller, who later described Van Gaal as his mentor, responded with 13 goals in his first full season, including a hattrick against VfL Bochum which effectively clinched the Bundesliga.

Since then, he hasn't looked back. He scored four goals at the 2010 World Cup, including two in the 4-1 last 16 tie against England, and has become one of Bayern's influential players. Yet he is something of an unlikely hero.

Mueller has emphasised that his gift is his understanding of space.

He demonstrated his uncanny knack to find it against Barcelona, popping up on the left wing, the right wing and in the penalty area, invari-

ably unmarked, to create havoc in the Catalans' improvised back four.

He scored the first goal as he stooped to head Dante's header in the net. For the second, he rose at the far post to head the ball into the path of Gomez who turned it in from close range.

His involvement in the third was more dubious as he blocked Jordi Alba, leaving Robben with a clear run on goal. For the fourth goal, he was in the right place at the right time again as he turned David Alaba's cross into the goal from close range.

German media have labelled him the "Raumdeuter", which means "interpreter of space" and is a term usually associated with interior design.

Bayern lost 4-0 on their last visit to the Nou Camp four years ago, when Mueller was still in Bayern's youth division, but the 23-year-old was convinced it would not happen again.

"We've all witnessed the magic of Camp Nou often enough. But we want to show the world it won't work on us."

## Chelsea face Basel test

If Chelsea are to salvage a trophy from their difficult campaign, they will have to succeed where their London rivals Tottenham Hotspur have already failed and beat Switzerland's FC Basel in their Europa League semifinal tie.

The two sides meet at the St. Jakob-Park in Thursday's first leg, with Chelsea wary of the threat posed by a side that eliminated Spurs on penalties in the quarterfinals.

After starting the season as European champions, Chelsea never even wanted to be in this competition, but now the focus is on going all the way and lifting a trophy they have never won before.

The desire to do so is made even more acute by their recent FA Cup semifinal loss to Manchester City.

No English club has won this competition - which was re-branded from its tradi-

tional title of the UEFA Cup in 2009 - since Liverpool in 2001, although Middlesbrough and Fulham have both been runners-up since.

But if Chelsea are to make it to the final in Amsterdam on May 15, they must get the better of opponents who, as well as sending Zenit St Petersburg and Tottenham packing from Europe this season, also won at home to Manchester United and Bayern Munich in last season's Champions League.

Basel have lost just once in 21 competitive games since the beginning of December - and that was an ultimately inconsequential 1-0 loss away to Zenit. Murat Yakin's side are three points clear of Grasshopper at the top of the Swiss table with eight games left to play, and the coach is relishing the tie.

The draw prevented Yakin, the former Swiss international of Turkish descent, from coming up against one of his former clubs in Fenerbahce, with the Turks drawn to face Benfica instead.
