Flushed out

Law enforcers swung into action early today to flush out Hefajat-e Islam activists occupying Shapla Chattar in downtown Dhaka.

Rapid Action Battalion, police and paramilitary Border Guard Bangladesh personnel commenced firing teargas shells and shots in the air around 2:30am to disperse the Hefajat activists from Motijheel, over 12 hours after they had held a rally there.

The Islamists retaliated with brick chips but around 3:00am they were forced to leave Shapla Chattar.

Shibir the instigator

Groups of youths dressed in jeans and shirts brought two dead bodies -- one at 6:00pm and the other at 8:00pm -- to the Shapla Chattar gathering. One man shouted at the rally that the deaths should be avenged. They also announced that the Shapla Chattar will be renamed Zubaer Chattar after one of the deceased.

People at the rally became agitated with the arrival of the dead while the carriers of the corpses urged leaders there to declare "Jihad" against the government and to fight unto death.

HEFAJAT STRIKES HORROR

Offices, shops burnt, looted in downtown Dhaka; 3 dead; over 200 hurt

Bangladesh has seldom experienced brute violence of this scale. Several parts in downtown Dhaka now resemble a burned-out and looted zone.

Thousands of radical Hefajat-e Islam men, instigated and bolstered by Jamaat-Shibir activists, exploded into an awestriking force and set fire to hundreds of shops and police outposts as the evening

Dhaka's night skyline turned orange, as flames leaped from burning establishments after power supply was cut off. The Hefajat men forced into a parking lot at

Dilkusha and torched at least 50 government buses yesterday.

As police and Hefajat men fought on the streets -- from Paltan to Bangabandhu Avenue, and from Motijheel to Bailey Road -- at least three people were killed in the violence.

Hefajat and Jamaat men pelted law enforcers with brickbats and set off bombs, while police rained thousands of teargas shells and rubber bullets on the marauding

A few thousand shops, including jewellery, electronics and furniture outlets, were looted in Paltan, Baitul Mukarram and stadium markets.

Hefajat had earlier promised to hold a non-violent rally at Shapla Chattar to protest what it called anti-religion write-ups by "atheist bloggers" and press home its 13point charter of demands, including introduction of a blasphemy law.

But it eventually turned nasty after police tried to block a procession of Shibir men at Nayapaltan around 11:30am.

The clash there soon spread to Bangabandhu Avenue, as Shibir and Hefajat men tried to attack the Awami League office there around 1:30pm.

Violence broke out in the Paltan area, and the office of the deputy commissioner

Islamic book shops burnt

Hefajat-e Islam activists, teamed up with Jamaat-Shibir men, set ablaze dozens of shops selling Islamic books -- among many other makeshift stalls -- on footpaths around Baitul Mukarram Mosque yesterday evening.

"They are enemies of Allah! They are enemies of the Prophet! How can they set the Holy Qur'an on fire?" cried a bookshop owner trying to douse the blaze after the attackers left the scene.

The attackers set fire to everything they could by the roadside between Purana Paltan intersection and Dainik Bangla intersection. They put up concrete obstructions to bar the law enforcers from

No one knows how many were trapped

Twelve days into the biggest industrial disaster in the country's history, claiming at least 629 lives, there have been no moves to determine the actual number of people who were trapped inside Rana Plaza.

Opposition plans non-stop siege
