

Jugul Kishore Talukder: A self-made artist



Jugal Kishore Talukder, a self-taught artist in Mymensingh, hopes that commercial art will flourish in the area.

Talukder began his career as commercial artist at Atharabari Building area in the town in 1963, and has been in this profession since then. "I started as commercial artist but interest

ingly I received no training. I was devoted to drawing since my early life and this gave me the courage to start up on my own. My parents also encouraged me much to go into this profession,'

"Early on I had to work on portraits, designs and logos, signboards and banners. When I had time I used to do pencil sketches as well." He has groomed over 20 talented artists during his career who have established themselves



n this profession in Mymensingh and Dhaka. Now the business of painting signboards and banners is not as popular as in the past, says Talukder. In the last 15 years, the traditional commer cial art form has slumped as digital art has

become very popular, says Talukder. Talukder recalls some talented commercial artists such as Poresh Majumder, Hemendra Das Monindra Singh, Satyan Dey, Dhirendra Boiragi and Narayan Saha. "The artists shaped commercial art as a profession in Mymensingh," he says. "It was a golden opportunity for me to be

introduced to prominent personalities like celebrity film artiste and director Soovas Dutta, artiste Professor Shahtab, internationally reputed photographer Nayebuddin Ahmed, poet Nirmalendu Goon, Professor Golam Samdani Koraishi and Professor Jatin Sarker," he added. Taluker is closely associated with several socio-cultural organisations in the town.

PRIMA DONNA

Nazia Andaleeb's articulation of subjective expressions on canvas



Noted artist Nazia Andaleeb Preema's solo art exhibition, titled "Prima Donna", is running at the Bengal Art Lounge in Gulshan, Dhaka. The exhibition which began on May 3 has already drawn the attention of art lovers.

The artworks which are on display at the gallery are abstract in nature and vivid in colour. Under the veil of strong colours and bold compositions, Preema, from a feminist's point of view, has depicted the inner experiences of women, their whims and their world against the backdrop of a patriarchal society.

Some of her works deal with suppressed emotions and the silent outbursts of women in a male dominated society. The sets of nudes symbolise the condition of women and stand as a symbol of protest against oppression. Though muted in nature, the pieces of art convey a sense of freedom and an urge to break free the chains of subjugation.

A total of some 44 artworks are on display at the gallery, and the most striking aspects of the artworks are their distinct shades and interpretations. Preema has used various mediums for providing soul to her work The mediums include acrylic on canvas, mixed media on paper, oil and paper collage on canvas, oil and collage, while most of the works are



Abul Fazal's 30th death anniversary observed

noted educationist and writer Abul Fazal. Fazal was born in 1903 in the village Keochia, under Satkania upazila of Chittagong. After initial schooling at a madrassa, he completed his BA from Dhaka University in 1928. In 1931, he did his BT from Teachers' Training College in Dhaka. He completed his Master's degree in Bangla Language and Literature from Calcutta University in 1940. Fazal initially began his career as an Imam before embarking as an academic. In 1941 he joined Krishnanagar College as a lecturer of Bangla. In 1943 he moved to Chittagong College from where he retired as a professor in 1956. In 1973 he was appointed Vice-Chancellor of

Chittagong University. In 1975 he joined the advisory council of the Government of Bangladesh as member in-charge of education and culture, and served in that position Fazal was a fearless and socially commit-

ted writer whose works reflect patriotism, secularism, and humanism. He was considered the conscience of the nation in his time. Though primarily a writer, Fazal participated in and led almost all intellectual and civil movements against the Pakistani autocratic regime. At the advent of the Bangladesh liberation movement, Fazal became a truly national figure guiding the progressive forces with courage and high

Fazal imbibed a liberal mode of thinking, non-communal and secular, but at the same time followed a tradition of liberal Islamism that took deeper roots in the sub-His notable works are "Chouchir" (1934),

"Prodip O Patongo" (1940), "Ranga Probhat" (1957), "Khuda O Asha" (1964) and others. Fazal's contribution to Bangla literature earned him the Bangla Academy Award (1962), the President's Award for Literature

(1963), the Adamjee Literary Award (1966), the Nasiruddin Gold Medal (1980), the Muktadhara Literary Award (1981) and the Abdul Hai Literary Award (1982). In 1974, the University of Dhaka conferred an honorary doctorate on him. He died on May 4, 1983 in Chittagong.

'Queen Helen Mirren scolds drummers

Dame Helen Mirren yelled at a group of street drummers to be quiet while still dressed in her stage costume as Queen Elizabeth II, it has emerged.

The incident took place in London on Saturday after a parade paused on Rupert Street, but continued to drum. Dame Helen, on stage in "The Audience" at

the nearby Gielgud Theatre, eventually emerged in full costume. She says she used "thespian' words" to tell

them to be quiet. Orange Nation, organisers for the One in the Park festival, said in a statement that Dame Helen was dressed in pearls and a tiara when she emerged from a stage door and demanded the noise to stop.

"Clearly angered she shrieked 'Quiet! I'm trying to do a play in here! People have paid a lot of money for tickets," she apparently said. Dame Helen was also joined in the street by

Rufus Wright, who plays Prime Minister David Cameron in the production. He wrote on Twitter: "Just fulfilled a lifelong ambition by bellowing at 25 drummers to

shut... up. West End theatres got thin walls." "I'm afraid there were a few 'thespian' words used," Dame Helen told the Daily

"They got a very stern royal ticking off but I have to say they were very sweet and they stopped immediately. "I would love to track them down and invite

door. There was just a thin wall between drumming and the theatre so it was unbelievably loud on stage. "Paul Ritter and I could hardly hear each

other speak and the audience couldn't hear us speak at all." "The Audience" imagines the private meet-

ings between Queen Elizabeth II and her prime ministers over the decades. It reunites Dame Helen with playwright Peter Morgan, who also wrote the 2006 film "The Queen".

Dame Helen won best actress for her role as Her Majesty at last week's Laurence Olivier Awards.




