

Gerrard to have shoulder surgery

Liverpool and England captain Steven Gerrard will undergo shoulder surgery this week that will rule him out of the last two games of the season, the Premier League club said on Tuesday. The 32-year-old, who has been ever present in this season's league campaign, is now likely to miss England's friendlies against Ireland at Wembley on May 29 and away to Brazil on June 2. "The captain's injury has progressively worsened in recent weeks and requires an operation to cure it," Liverpool said in a statement on their website.





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Tigers whimper to series loss

Bangladesh played possibly their worst cricket of the tour as they surrendered the

ODI series to Zimbabwe, who outclassed their misfiring opposition by seven wickets in the third and final ODI at the Queens Sports Club in Bulawayo yesterday.

Vusi Sibanda played the innings that Bangladesh's batsmen should have played, as the right-hander scored exactly 100, bringing up the century with the winning run edged over the absent slip cordon with 2.5 overs to spare.

The match was over as a contest when Bangladesh, in the 44th over with Zimbabwe needing 26 runs, first dropped Sean Williams at midwicket and then Sibanda at long off. After that, the only point of interest was whether Sibanda would reach his second ODI hundred.

Bangladesh's bowlers were toothless in their defence of 247, the lowest total batting first in the series. The bowling from the pace bowlers let off pressure with short and wide deliveries, while the spinners failed to build any momentum except during a brief period in the middle of the innings. Hamilton Masakadza and

Sibanda put on 79 in 14.1 overs before Robiul Islam came back into the attack to dismiss Masakadza, caught behind off a beauty reminiscent of the bowler's Test exploits. Then Sikandar Raza and Sibanda put on 56, but the slow progress heaped some pressure on the batsmen, and it told in the quick dismissals of Raza and skipper Brendan Taylor, who played possibly his first rash shot of the tour, reverse sweeping Mahmudullah Riyad into Mushfiqur's gloves.

Then however, the man of the match in the second game Sean Williams batted comfortably and built a 109-run partnership at better than a run-a-ball to win the series for Zimbabwe.

Earlier, Mushfiqur Rahim lost his third toss in a row and Bangladesh seemed resigned to their fate as Tamim Iqbal and Mohammad Ashraful walked in to bat. The match marked the return to the Zimbabwe side of Brian Vitori, the leftarm fast bowler who had been the major thorn in the Tigers' side on their previous tour in 2011.

Alex Ferguson will retire as Manchester United boss at the end of the season, the Premier League champions announced Wednesday, ending the most successful managerial reign in English football. Ferguson, 71, guided United to 13

It has been a little worrying that heading into a series-deciding ODI, most of the talk has centred on the pitch and the toss. Bangladesh won the

first game after being put in to bat first and lost the second match from the same situation.

It is undeniable that the toss does provide an advantage, the ball swings more in the morning making life difficult for the top-order batsmen on an otherwise good pitch. But the question remains that should an international team -- one that not long ago won an ODI in Sri Lanka and beat T20 champions West Indies 3-2 at home -- be cowed by which way a coin lands against a team they themselves expect to beat every match?

The other side of the coin is that if the batsmen, after being put in on a difficult wicket, bat well and put up a formidable score, Zimbabwe's batsmen will be under the pressure of having to chase a big total and then batting first becomes an advantage.
