#### Malaysia PM unveils cabinet

AFP, Kuala Lumpur

Malaysia's premier yesterday unveiled a cabinet line-up which he said would help national reconciliation after a racially divisive election, but which was noticeably light on Chinese faces.

Prime Minister Najib Razak's Barisan Nasional (National Front) coalition, which has ruled multiracial Malaysia for 56 years, fended off the strongest opposition challenge ever in an election marked by anger over racially divisive policies.

"Over the past months and years, divisions have opened up in Malaysian society. Now it is time for all of us, in government and beyond, to put the bitterness behind us," Najib said in introducing his line-up.

#### Nigeria declares emergency

Nigerian President Goodluck Jonathan on Tuesday imposed a "state of emergency" in three states menaced by Islamist group Boko Haram, saying the level of violence called for "extraordinary measures".

The insurgents, who say they are fighting to create an Islamic state in the north, have carried out scores of attacks since 2009 but Jonathan said the violence can no longer be treated as "militancy or criminality".

The president for the first time acknowledged that parts of Borno state have been "taken over" by insurgents.

#### Sanjay Dutt to surrender today

Sanjay Dutt will surrender today before a special TADA court in Mumbai to undergo his remaining jail term in the 1993 Mumbai blasts case, according to his lawyer.

His plea for a review of his conviction in the case has already been rejected by the Supreme Court.

The apex court on Tuesday refused to give Dutt extra time to surrender on a plea by a Bollywood producer.

#### Brazil okays same sex marriage

Brazil on Tuesday became the third and largest Latin American country to give a de facto green light to same-sex marriage.

In a bold stride for the majority Roman Catholic nation, the National Council of Justice (NCJ), a panel which oversees Brazil's legal system, said government offices that issue marriage licenses had no standing to reject gay couples.

Uruguay's and Argentina are the other two LatAm countries.

Pakistani politician Imran Khan yesterday vowed to cooperate with incoming prime minister Nawaz Sharif on terrorism and other major challenges following key elections.

Khan made the remarks from his hospital bed, where he is laid up with a fractured spine after falling at a campaign rally, after his Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) polled third place, behind Sharif's Pakistan

Muslim League-N (PML-N). "We have decided that despite severe differences that we have, we will work together to resolve major national problems including terrorism," Khan said in a video message aired during a PTI press confer-

He harshly criticised Sharif and the centre-right PML-N during the campaign for last Saturday's general election and had vowed to go into opposition.

Sharif pledged to work with Khan for the good of the country, after visiting the former cricket star in hospital on Tuesday.

Khan is credited with helping to inspire 60 percent turnout at the polls, having galvanised the youth and urban middle class in particular with promises to end corruption, introduce tax reform and stand up to the Americans.

"Elections are over and we all as a nation want to move forward," Khan said, adding he wanted all politicians and the military to sit down together and find a solution to domestic terrorism, which has killed thousands of people in Pakistan. "We cannot ensure prosperity until we

## Russia, US seek to limit damage

Russia and the United States yesterday sought to limit the damage to already troubled ties from a new spy scandal that erupted when Moscow caught a blonde-wigged alleged CIA agent who was reportedly seeking information on the Boston bombings.


The suspected agent, who Moscow says was caught with a "typical espionage arsenal" of money and disguises, is said to have been working undercover as a low-ranking third secretary at the US embassy.

The man, named as Ryan C Fogle, was caught red-handed in a blonde wig as he tried to recruit a Russian security agent with an advance of \$100,000 for intelligence on the Northern Caucasus, according to the Russian FSB security service. The Kommersant daily said that Fogle was likely to have

binding, a big mutiny would be an embarrassment for Cameron less than two years before the next parliamentary election and would embolden eurosceptics pushing him to take a harder line on Europe.

Cameron, who will miss the showdown because he is visiting the United States, played down its significance, saying he was "extremely

relaxed". Cameron had hoped to end party squabbling over Europe in January when he promised to renegotiate Britain's EU role and hold a referendum on its membership before the end of 2017, provided he wins the next

## Manmohan files nomination papers for Rajya Sabha

Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh yesterday filed his nomination papers for election from north-eastern state of Assam to the Rajya Sabha, upper House of Indian parliament.

Singh, 80, submitted his papers before the state Legislative Assembly Secretary GP Das on the Assembly premises in Guwahati.

The prime minister's Upper House term expires on June 14 and polls will be held on May 30, if nec-

Singh, who became prime minister in May 2004 and was re-elected in May 2009, has been a member of Rajya Sabha since 1991.

The electoral college for Rajya Sabha members consist of members of state legislature.

Congress, with an absolute majority in the 126member Assam legislative assembly, can easily ensure the victory of Singh in the event of a contest for the Rajya Sabha seat.

The Indian prime minister, in a brief interaction with the media, expressed his gratitude to the people of Assam for making it possible for him to file nomination for the Rajya Sabha for the fifth time since 1991.

# to global warming

The North Pole has shifted east because of ice sheet loss caused by rising temperatures, a new study published in Geophysical Research Letters has found, according to the scientific journal Nature.

The pole drifted southeast toward northern Labrador, Canada, at a rate of about 6 centimeters per year between 1982 and 2005. But since 2005, the direction and speed of the pole's journey changed. It started moving rapidly east towards Greenland at a rate of more than 21 centimeters per year.

There has been huge ice sheet loss in the polar regions due to global warming.

The study was carried out by scientists from the University of Texas, Austin, using data collected by NASA's Gravity Recovery and Climate Experiment (GRACE).

Earth's two geographic poles do not have a fixed location. As the distribution of snow, rain and humidity changes every year, the poles too wobble around, usually in a circular manner.

GRACE's twin probes measure changes in the Earth's gravity field, which can be used to track shifts in the distribution of water and ice, Nature said. The researchers led by Jianli Chen, a geophysicist, used GRACE data to model how melting icecaps affect Earth's mass distribution. They found that more than 90% of the post-2005 polar shift was because of increasing ice loss and sea-level rise.

# North Pole shifts due UN General Assembly set to vote on Syria resolution

Communication blackout as fighting flares around Aleppo prison

The UN General Assembly was scheduled to vote on a draft resolution that condemns Syrian authorities and accepts the opposition Syrian National Coalition as party to a potential politi-

cal transition. Russia, a close ally of Syrian President Bashar al-Assad, is opposed to the resolution, which was drafted by Qatar and other Arab nations and circulated among the 193 UN member states. Some Western diplomats said it was unlikely to win as many votes as a resolution that passed last year with 133 in favour. No country has a veto in

the General Assembly. The Syrian conflict started more than two years ago with mainly peaceful demonstrations against Assad, but turned into a civil war . Islamist militants have emerged as the most potent

of the anti-Assad rebels.

Another senior UN diplomat, who also spoke on condition of anonymity, said this draft resolution was stronger than the earlier resolution, prompting Russia to write to all states to complain that it was unbalanced. The diplomat said Russia had also warned that it could hinder preparations for a Syria peace conference, as agreed by Russia and the United States.

The official news agency SANA, meanwhile, said that Internet and telephone lines were down because of a faulty fibre optic cable, in the second such incident in the past week.

Syria's Internet was down for two days last week, with state media blaming the blackout on a technical fault but activists and a watchdog accused the regime of deliberating cutting the connection to shield military operations.

On the ground, Syrian troops backed by tanks and warplanes fought to repel an attack on the central prison in Aleppo after rebels blew up its walls in suicide car bombings, a watchdog said.

Around 4,000 prisoners including Islamists and common law criminals are held in the prison on the outskirts of the city, which is largely under rebel control, said Observatory head Rami Abdel Rahman.

Regime forces fired tank shells and launched air raids around the jail to repel the rebel attack, igniting fire and damaging neighbouring houses, the Observatory said.

In violence across the country on Tuesday, 99 people were killed, said the Observatory, which has compiled a total of more than 94,000 deaths in the two-year conflict between the regime and its opponents.

# Mayan pyramid bulldozed for road!

A construction company has essentially destroyed one of Belize's largest Mayan pyramids with diggers and bulldozers to extract crushed rock for a road-building project, authorities have announced. The head of the Belize Institute of

Archaeology, Jaime Awe, said on Tuesday that the destruction at the Nohmul complex in northern Belize was detected late last week. The ceremonial centre dates back at least 2,300 years and is the most important site in northern Belize, near the border with Mexico.

"It's a feeling of incredible disbelief because of the ignorance and the insensitivity ... they were using this for road fill," Awe said. "It's like being punched in the stomach, it's just so horrendous."

Photos from the scene showed diggers clawing away at the pyramid's sloping sides, leaving an isolated core of limestone cobbles at the centre, with what appears to be a narrow Mayan chamber dangling above one clawed-out section.

Belizean police said they were conducting an investigation and criminal charges were possible. The Nohmul complex sits on private land, but Belizean law says that any pre-Hispanic ruins are under government protection.

The Belize community action group Citizens Organised for Liberty Through Action called the destruction of the archaeological site "an obscene example of disrespect for the environment and history".

It is not the first time this has happened in Belize, a country dotted with hundreds of Mayan ruins, though few as large as Nohmul.

Norman Hammond, an emeritus professor of archaeology at Boston University who worked on Belizean research projects in the 1980s, wrote in an email that "bulldozing Maya mounds for road fill is an endemic problem in Belize (the whole of the San Estevan centre has gone, both of the major pyramids at Louisville, other structures at

Nohmul, many smaller sites), but this

sounds like the biggest yet".

# Aussie PM brought to tears in parliament

Australian Prime Minister Julia Gillard's tough exterior cracked yesterday as she choked back tears while introducing a bill into parliament on disability reforms. The country's first female leader,

seen as a hard-talking survivor in maledominated politics, spoke in a quivering voice of people with disabilities she had recently met.

She said a proposed national disability insurance scheme would let people like 17-year-old Sandy from Brisbane realise their dreams for life. "When I met this young man he handed me a card signed

by him and his mates to say thanks for what we are doing for people with disability," an emotional Gillard said. "Over the past six years, the idea of a national disability

insurance scheme has found a place in our nation's heart. In March, we gave it a place in our nation's laws. "Today we inscribe it in our nation's finances," she added before

being comforted by Disability Reform Minister Jenny Macklin. When fully operational, the scheme is expected to cover 410,000 Australians with disabilities and cost upwards of Aus\$15 billion (US\$15 billion) a year to run, providing extra personal care and physical therapy.
