# Silver lining fading

BNP gives up on polls-time govt proposal as govt sticks to its guns

The BNP-led 18-party alliance aims to step up street agitation to force the government to concede its demand for a non-partisan polls-time administration.

The opposition MPs, who are to join the parliament session beginning on June 3 to save their membership, will not place any proposal on the election-time government for discussion, as suggested by the ruling Awami League, said two BNP policymakers. Talking to The Daily Star yesterday, they

said placing any proposal would bring no result until the ruling party agreed in principle to their demand.

They also said they were looking for ways to intensify street agitation, as the party in power was not "sincere" in resolving the ongoing political crisis through talks, the possibility of which seems to have fizzled out.

The two leaders believe the government will not pay heed to their core demand unless it is forced to do so through vigorous agitation.


Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged the opposition lawmakers to join parliament for discussing current political issues, not for retaining memberships only.

Six leading foreign chambers in Bangladesh have joined hands to condemn the ongoing political · violence in the name of hartal.


