

The name game

he naming of plants and animals can be confusing. Take, for example, the bird fingey (drongo.) Within a distance of 100km from Dhaka, you will find people calling it fingey, fesa, feskuna or feskunda. Nor is this confusion an exclusively Bengali problem: for example, our chorui is known in English as both "house sparrow" and "English sparrow."

To prevent mix-ups like this, the Swedish scientist Carl Linnaeus – in the 1750s - proposed a two-word nam ing system for all living beings. The first part of the name is the genus (which is, essentially, the family) and the second part is the species. This naming convention was meant to precisely identify living things.

Linnaeus chose Latin as the language because that was the language of the office in Europe at the time.

Thus, our fingey became dicrurus macrocercus, meaning "long-tailed forktail." Indeed, more than any other feature, it is the forked tail that stands out on this bird.

Linnaeus apparently loved naming things: he even gave himself four other names! But his naming system has proved useful over the years.

Using this naming, many species which originated or otherwise associated in our land are called

"Benghalensis" or some variation - eg, ficus benghalensis is the banyan tree and coracias benghalensis is the beautiful (and shy) blue bird called neelkontho. That pretty red and yellow woodpecker we often see around here is dinopium benghalense.

Some of our species have met sad endings: the houbaropsis bengalensis, or bengal florican, a large terrestrial bird, can no longer be found in Bangladesh, and our white-rumped vulture, known as gyps bengalensis, is almost extinct.

Other binomial names have historical roots. For example, the family of water lilies we see in our waters in various colours is the genus nymphea. It was named by the ancient Greeks who used these flowers for dedications to the semi-divine water maidens called nymphs.

Perhaps the prettiest member of the water lily family, the purple water lily or beguni shapla, is named nymphea nouchali. But where did "nouchali" come from? It is unclear, but there is, apparently, a note attached to a specimen in London's Kew Gardens indicating a connection with Noakhali.

Sterculia is a family of trees growing in the wild in Bangladesh. Some species of this tree, such as sterculia colorata - called koifoli hauwal or samari in our parts - have flowers with an unpleasant odour. Turns out sterculia is named after Sterculius, the Roman god of dung and manure.

The bauhinia family of trees, eg, bauhinia variegata (rokto kanchon) has flowers that look like orchids. It is named after twin brothers Casper and Johann Bauhin, from 17th century Switzerland, who were botanists. Bauhinia leaves have the unusual shape of two symmetric lobes - perhaps reminding us of the twin broth-

But Linnaeus himself, genius though he was, was not above calling someone a "name" using his naming system. The German naturalist Johann Siegesbeck was a harsh and vocal critic of the way Linnaeus was naming his plants. So when Linnaeus got a chance to name a foul-smelling, useless weed growing in Europe, he called it Siegesbeckia.

Govt to bring back Tarique thru' Interpol

Says Qamrul

The government will bring back BNP Senior Vice Chairman Tarique Rahman to the country with the help of Interpol and prosecute him in different cases now at the trial stage, State Minister for Law Qamrul Islam said yesterday.

He said Tarique was "a fugitive accused" and was conspiring from abroad to topple the government.

Qamrul came up with the announcement at a discussion, "Election under the interim government: Seditious activities by BNP-Jamaat", organised by Bangabandhu Sangskritik Jote at the capital's Public Library.

Tarique, now in London, was detained on March 7, 2007 and was allowed to travel abroad for "treatment" in July the following year. He faces 16 cases for laundering money and grenade attack on an Awami League rally on August 21, 2004, among others.

Meanwhile, AL Presidium Member Mohammad Nasim accused the BNP of showing double-standard by talking about dialogues and at the same time calling hartal.

BNP slams remarks on Tarique

BNP leader said Tarique was now under doctors' supervision, and the doctors could say when he would be able to return. AL Presidium Member Mohammad Nasim on Thursday said

Tarique had left the country for treatment on a "bond" that he would not get involved in politics again.

Earlier, BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia's adviser Shamsuzzaman Dudu said if an election was held right away, the BNP would win and Tarique would become the prime minister. "So make comments on him sensibly," he said, referring to the AL leaders.
