Many areas in city waterlogged

As torrential rains drenched the country for the second straight day yesterday, many parts of it went under knee-deep water, causing misery for people.

Many farmers have been affected badly by downpours as their croplands have submerged. Road communications were disrupted at some places due to waterlogging. During the day, the Dhaka Met office

recorded six millimetres of rain in the capital. Kutubdia experienced the highest rainfall of 88 mm in the country.

"Twelve hours have passed since the rain stopped, but my house is still under kneedeep water," said Rahela Akhtar, a resident of Gendaria.

She could not cook any meal since Thursday as her gas stove remains submerged. Over the years, it has become a regular occurrence during the rainy season, she added.

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AL leaders doubt BNP's talks intent

Party high-ups say dialogue, hartal cannot go simultaneously

The ruling Awami League (AL) is doubtful about BNP's sincerity regarding the dialogue on a poll-time government as the main opposition is still demanding a caretaker gov ernment comprised of unelected people.

According to AL insiders, the much-talked-about dialogue is expected to be held on the formation of the interim government with elected representatives, not on the nonpartisan caretaker government.

AL Joint Secretary General Mahbubul Alam Hanif said, "When the prime minister had called for a dialogue, BNP gave 48 hours to thwart the government using Hefajat-e Islam. Now they have urged the government to sit for a dialogue but at the same time called hartal which is contradictory."

A top policymaker of the ruling party said, "Until BNP say that it is ready to accept the poll-time government comprised of elected people, we will assume that it has no interest in dialogue and we will not proceed with it."

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PARTNERSHIP DIALOGUE WITH US

Focus on security, trade, labour issues

The second US-Bangladesh Partnership Dialogue will begin in the capital tomorrow, focusing on the expansion of security, trade and development ties between the two countries.

Issues related to labour, regional connectivity, climate change, counter terrorism and food security will come up during the dialogue.

The dialogue will also assess the US-Bangladesh partnership and discuss how it can be strengthened with a strategic direction and highlighting the shared values.

US Under Secretary for Political Affairs Wendy R Sherman will arrive in Dhaka tomorrow on a three-day visit to attend the dialogue.

Sherman will head the US delegation while Foreign Secretary Shahidul Haque

will lead the Bangladesh side at the discussion, according to the foreign ministry from hills officials.

US Assistant Secretary of State for the Office of Commercial and Business Affairs Jose W Fernandez, who arrives in the capital today, will also join Sherman. The dialogue will be held following the

signing of a joint declaration on "Bangladesh-US Partnership Dialogue" on May 5 last year in Dhaka during former US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton's visit. The first dialogue was held in

Obama restricts use of drones

Says US to use drones when they are only option

Drone strikes are a necessary evil, but one that must be used with more temperance as the United States' security situation evolves, US President Barack Obama said Thursday.

America prefers to capture, interrogate and prosecute terrorists, but there are times when this isn't possible, Obama said in a speech at the National Defence University in Washington. Terrorists intentionally hide in hard-toreach locales and putting boots on the ground is often out of the question, he said.

Thus, when the United States is faced with a threat from terrorists in a country where the government has only tenuous or no influence, drones strikes are the only option -- and they're legal because America "is at war with al Qaeda, the Taliban and their associated forces," Obama said.

While he has considered a special court or independent oversight board, those options are problematic, so he plans to talk with Congress to determine how best to handle the deployment of drones, he said.

The nation's image was a theme throughout the speech, as Obama emphasised some actions in recent years -- drone strikes and Guantanamo Bay key among them -- risk creating more threats. The nature of threats against the United States have changed since he took office -- they've become SEE PAGE 2 COL 1
