Passengers suffer for want of pontoons at 60 terminals

Passengers in coastal islands of the district often have to wade through mud and water to get into launches as there is no pontoon at around 60 ghats (landing stations).

During a visit to Char Mondol in Rangabali upazila a few days ago, this correspondent found that a

local launch on Galachipa-Char Montaz route got anchored about 200 metres from the riverbank as there was no pontoon. Many passengers including children and women were crossing the muddy water on foot to get on the launch.

Although there is no pontoon, not even any shed for waiting passengers, they

have to pay Tk 5 as 'entrance fee' to a person assigned by the upazila administration.

demanded setting up a pontoon at the ghat considering the interest of local passengers but in vain, said Md Nazrul Islam, chairman of Char Montaz UP.

ghats at different places of the Gramardon, Char Biswas,

coastal areas in the district are without any pontoon.

Twenty of the ghats, On several occasions, we namely, Patua, Felabunia, Taktabunia, Tungibaria, Gaiapara, Chinabunia, Moudubi, Chalitabunia, Tulatali, Modhukhali, Char Gonga, Gab Bunia, Khalgora, Fulkhali, Locals said as many as 60 Nayabhanguni, Jintala,

Char Lakhmi, and Char Bestin are officially recognised for halting and departing of launches, said officials of Patuakhali port.

These are in Galachipa, Rangabali and Kalapara upazilas under Patuakhali district.

"We have to walk through mud and water to get into launches as there is no pontoon and the vessels cannot anchor on the riverbank during the low tide. We have to wait under the open sky during rain and sun as there is no shed. Still we have to pay entrance fee," said Abul Kashem, a passenger.

When contacted, Mostafizur Rahman, deputy director of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority, said, "We do not lease the ghats that are without any pontoon. District or upazila administrations collect revenue by leasing such ghats."

Md Liakot Ali, upazila nirbahi officer of Rangabali, said, "We collect revenue from local passengers at the ghats without pontoon. Launches cannot anchor on the bank at Char Mondol ghat due to massive siltation there. I will take step to mitigate suffering of launch passengers."

Villagers join hands to thwart river erosion, finally

People of three villages in Saghata upazila have finally joined hands to protect themselves from the erosion by the River Jamuna as their appeals for years fell on deaf ears of the authorities concerned.

More than 700 families of Gobindi, Bashhatta and Bharatkhali villages were rendered homeless by the river in the last one week.

Apart from this, the river devoured a number of structures and vast farmlands during the period.

Local lawmaker Fazle Rabbi Mia inaugurated the work of dumping sand bags at erosion-prone points at Gobindi village on Saturday.

The erosion also threatened a biggest cattle market, a temple and around 20

educational institutions in the areas, said Farukul Islam, convener of erosion protection committee.

For long the villagers made appeals to

the district Water Development Board (WDB) to take steps to protect them from erosion but to no effect. Finding no other alternatives, they decided to voluntarily erect bamboo spars

at the erosion-hit points on Saturday and dump sand bags, said Mosharraf Hossain Sweet, chairman of Saghata union parishad. Besides, SKS Foundation, a local NGO

and Puja Udjapon Committee extended financial help to continue the drive.

The authorities have already written to the ministry concerned for funds to take steps to stop erosion, said the lawmaker.

Violent incidents during Peaceful hartal in Shibir-enforced hartal

Stray incidents of violence marked the halfday hartal enforced by Islami Chhatra Shibir in three districts of greater Noakhali yester-

The student wing of Jamaat-e-Islami called the strike in Noakhali, Feni and Laxmipur districts on Saturday, protesting the arrest of Fakhruddin Manik, former central president, Atiqul Islam, office secretary and Mohsinul Kabir, international affairs secretary of Shibir, report our correspondents.

During the hartal, Shibir men brought out procession from Rashid Coloney in Noakhali district town and Chowmuhani of Begumganj upazila.

Police dispersed the processions and arrested 14 activists on charge of planning subversive activities.

In Laxmipur, seven policemen and six Shibir activists were injured in a clash in the district town during the eight-hour hartal. Police and witnesses said, Shibir activists

brought out a procession from Aliya

Madrasa in the morning. When the procession reached Uttar Temuhoni of the town, police obstructed

them, triggering a clash.

Shibir activists pelted police with brick chips, leaving seven policemen, including officer in-charge of Laxmipur Sadar PS Altaf Hossain, injured. Police fired several rubber bullets and

tear gas shells in retaliation, leaving six Shibir men injured. Earlier, Shibir activists vandalised a cov-

ered van in the district town and torched a truck in Bagbari area. In Feni, pickets vandalised about a dozen

vehicles and torched a battery-run easy-bike on different roads of the district town during hartal yesterday. Pro-hartal pickets put up barricade at

Lemua point of the Dhaka-Chittagong Highway in the morning and damaged a covered van. Police dispersed the Shibir men when

Old Police Quarter area and Khajuria. Shibir activists threw two crude bombs at police and vandalised 4-5 trucks in the

A daylong hartal enforced by Bangalee settlers in Rangamati, Bandarban and Khagrachhari districts passed off almost peacefully yesterday.

Parbattya Somo Odhikar Andolan (SOA), Parbattya Bangalee Chhatra Oikya Parisahd (PBCOP) and Parbattya Bangalee Chhatra Parisahd (PBCP) jointly called the shutdown in the hill districts, demanding cancellation of CHT Land Commission Act amendment proposal passed by the

cabinet on May 27. they tried to bring out a procession from In Rangamati, no motorised vehicles, including long distance routes, were seen plying the roads while most business establishments remained shut during hartal hours.

Besides, river vessels did not operated in the area, reports our correspondent.

During hartal, activists of SOA and PBCOP brought out a procession in the town, protesting the amendment.

Meanwhile, the dawn to dusk shutdown called by Bandarban district unit Parbattya Bangalee Chhatra Parishad (PBCP) in the hill areas was observed peacefully, reports our correspondent.

However, the educational institutions, government and non government offices at the district town remained opened.

In Khagrachhari, the district unit PBCP enforced hartal marked stray incidents, reports our correspondent.

During the hartal hours, at least four people were injured in a clash between the pickets and ethnic people in the town in the morning, said SP Sheikh Mizanur Rahman.

Shift court to safer place, declare bldg abandoned

Bagerhat lawyers demand

Bagerhat District Bar Association yesterday gave a seven-day ultimatum to the authorities concerned to declare the dilapidated Judge's Court building abandoned and shift the court to a safer place in the town.

The ultimatum was issued from a human chain formed on Khulna-Bagerhar Road in front of the court building in the morning.

Leaders and members of the Bar and several hundred people, who came to the court building in connection with different cases, also joined the programme that continued for 45 minutes from 10:30am. The lawyers also staged a sit-in on the road, disrupting traffic for 15 minutes.

Addressing a rally at the venue, Bagerhat District Bar Association General Secretary Abdul Hai urged the authorities concerned to take necessary steps to shift the court to a new place within the next seven days. Otherwise, he threatened to launch a tougher agitation programme. Officials and employees of the Judge's Court also expressed solidarity with the agitation programme.

The Judge's Court building is on the verge of collapse only after 17 years of its construction. The two-storey building has become so rickety that the Public Works Department (PWD) has hastily put up mahogany logs to prevent it from crashing down.

Superintendent engineer of PWD Khulna circle said the officials and employees work in the dilapidated building in constant fear of a disaster.

In April last year, the office of the Bagerhat District Judge had sent a letter to the chief engineer of PWD about the cracks developed in different parts of the building. A fourmember team led by Additional Chief Engineer of PWD Md Abul Kashem visited the building on June 15 the same year.

In its written statement, the inspection team stated that the extension of the building was done with low quality construction materials. As a result, the building has become unfit for use as some of its columns and beams have developed cracks, the team said, adding that in many parts decay of rods is 50 percent.
