## Teacher jailed for sexually harassing schoolgirl in Manikganj

A mobile court has sentenced a primary school teacher to six months imprisonment for sexually harassing a class IV female student in Saturia upazila of Manikganj. The court of Saturia Upazila Nirbahi Officer Shahin Akhbar gave the verdict on Thursday.

Earlier, police held the convict, Rafiqul Islam, an assistant teacher of Jalshuka Nasurpur Government Primary School, from the upazila complex area following complaints of the victim's family members.

## Six held with gun in Pabna

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) arrested six alleged arms traders and seized a foreign made gun and two rounds of bullets from their possession at Kolerandi-Bottola in Ishwardi of Pabna Thursday night.

They were sent to jail yesterday.

## Road crash kills RMG worker

A female garment worker was killed and another injured after a car hit them at Khilkhet in the capital on Thursday night.

The deceased Tania, 16, daughter of Shahjahan, was a resident of Khilkhet.

Injured Rubel, a worker of a tailoring shop, is undergoing treatment at Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

The accident occurred when few pedestrians, including Tania and Rubel, were crossing Dhaka-Mymensingh highway around 10:15pm, said Habibur Rahman, a witness.

## School building for visually impaired girls inaugurated in capital

HATHAZARI-CTG CITY ROUTE  
Commuters suffer for transport workers' whim

Commuters on the route number 3 between Fatehabad of Hathazari upazila and Chittagong city are suffering for lack of vehicles after evening, as drivers of the human haulers (minibus) have started refusing to leave the city after sundown.

For the whim, the travellers not only have to wait long hours but pay two or three times the regular fare for using alternative transports like auto-rickshaws, which too are inadequate.

Shakhat Hossain, who travels to the city from Hathazari every day, said he often reaches home at night for not availing any transport. Auto-rickshaws charge Tk 15-20

for a trip from Oxygen in the city to Fatehpur when a human hauler takes Tk 6, he said.

Drivers of the human haulers say they refuse to go outside the city after evening because they did not get passengers during the return trip.

Golam Rasul Babul, general secretary of the Chittagong bus, minibus and human hauler owners association, recognised the situation and said they were looking into it.

Uttam Kumar Pal, additional deputy commissioner (traffic-north) of Chittagong Metropolitan Police, said they asked the owners' association to solve the issue soon. "If they do not, the route permit of the vehicles not following rules will be cancelled."

## FOUR CITY CORPORATION POLLS

## 45 of 116 councillors-elect accused in cases

Of the 116 general councillors-elect of the four city corporations of Syhet, Barisal, Rajshahi and Khulna, 45 are accused in different cases, as per the affidavits submitted to the regional Election Commissions.

However, only two of the 39 councillors elected in the reserved seats for women are accused in cases.

Our Sylhet correspondent reports: Among the 26 councillors-elect of Sylhet City Corporation's 27 wards, eight are accused not only in different cases but in more than one. These eight are among 12 councillors who have been reelected.

Another 14 councillors who have been elected for the first time have a clean sheet. However, none of the nine councillors elected from the reserved seats for women are accused in cases.

The result of the remaining ward 16 has been withheld as two candidates got an equal 1,774 votes. Returning Officer SM Ejharul Haque said they were preparing to hold reelection there.

The highest number of cases, five,

were filed separately against two councillors-elect -- Azadur Rahman Azad, elected for a third term in ward 20, and Farhad Chowdhury Shamim of ward 12.

Our Barisal correspondent reports: Among the 30 councillors-elect of Barisal City Corporation, 14 are accused in different cases.

However, none of the 10 councillors elected in the reserved seats for women have cases against them.

The highest number of cases, five, were filed separately against two councillors-elect -- Ziauddin Shikdar of ward 25 and Advocate Salahuddin Masum of ward 14.

Our Rajshahi correspondent reports: Among the 29 councillors-elect of Rajshahi City Corporation's 30 wards, nine are accused in different cases.

Of the 10 councillors elected in the reserved seats for women, two are accused in cases.

The election in ward 8 has been withheld as electronic voting machines broke down. The regional Election Commission is preparing to hold reelection there.

The highest number of cases, five, was filed against Iqbal Hossain of ward 12.

Three of the cases filed in 2012 include charges of causing explosions, attacking law enforcers and destabilising law and order. Another case was filed in 2011 over mugging and attempted murder charges and another in 2003 over theft and beating charges.

Following close behind with four cases is Ruhul Amin of ward 4. The cases, filed in 2008, 2011 and 2013, include charges of attempted murder, violence, clashes, and hindering government activities.

Our Khulna correspondent reports: Of the 31 councillors-elect of Khulna City Corporation, 14 are accused in different cases.

However, none of the 10 councillors elected in the reserved seats for women are accused in cases.

The highest number of cases, six, were filed against Golam Mowla Sharu of ward 26 followed by Sheikh Zahangir Hossain Helal of ward 31 with three cases.

## MIGRANT WORKERS' WELFARE

## WB, Brac sign \$2.58m deal

The World Bank and Brac yesterday signed a US \$2.58 million agreement to launch a programme in the capital focusing on the welfare of migrant workers.

Christine Kimes, WB Bangladesh office acting head, and Dr Mahabub Hossain, Brac executive director, signed the agreement at the Brac Centre Inn in the capital.

The programme, funded by Japan Social Development Fund, aims to provide information support to aspiring migrant workers so as to reduce the risks they have to face, says a press release of Brac and WB.

"Remittances contribute hugely to the gross national product. It is important to reduce the risks that workers going abroad have to face," said Mahabub.

The population of Bangladesh must be utilised as a resource, said Hiroyuki Minami, minister of the embassy of Japan. Bodiar Rahman, deputy secretary of the expatriates' welfare and overseas employment ministry, recognised that migrant labourers often have to fall victim to different fraudulence.

"The information support to be provided would include professional development for the overseas jobseekers. The knowledge would be provided through organisations working within the community," Md Aminul Islam, manager of the migration programme, told The Daily Star over the phone.

It would also provide jobseekers with information about existing funding sources that they can use to make the trip abroad, such as the Brac microfinance programme for migrant labourers, said Mahabub at the signing ceremony.

Christine Kimes also spoke at the event.

Many ruling party men own vested properties  
Says Sultana Kamal

Some people claim to believe in the spirit of the Liberation War but their actions do not reflect their belief, said Sultana Kamal, executive director of Ain o Salish Kendra, at a discussion yesterday.

Criticising the Vested Property Return (amendment) Act-2013, Sultana Kamal said she is aware that many ruling party members illegally own vested properties at present.

The government wants to win the hearts of people by talking about good governance, fighting against corruption, religious harmony and so on, but there is little reflection of such promises in its work, she said.

The discussion on eliminating all the amendments of the Vested Property Return Act 2001 was organised by nine rights organisations at Jatiya Press Club in the capital.

The organisations are Ain o Salish Kendra, Association for Land Reform and Development, Bangladesh Hindu Buddhist Christian Oikya Parishad, Arpito Shomponi Ain Protirodh Andolok, Nijera Kori, Sammilito Samajik Andolok, Human Development Research Centre, Bangladesh Legal Aid and Services Trust, and Bangladesh Puja Uddipan Parishad.

Talking about the recent city corporation polls, Sultana Kamal said the results reflect the government's way of ruling the country at present. "People are talking about the abuse of religious sentiments during the recently concluded four city corporation polls. If such things happened then we should feel ashamed as we have failed to uphold the spirit of the Liberation War," she said.

"The results are reflections of the failure of the government," she added. Dr Gowher Rizvi, the prime minister's foreign affairs adviser, said the government would not take any action that goes against the minorities of the country.
