India will bank on young seamer Bhuvaneshwar Kumar to contain England's batsmen when the Champions Trophy one-day final is played at Edgbaston on Sunday.

The lean 23-year-old has made such rapid strides since his debut six months ago that captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni regularly hands him the new ball over the faster Umesh Yadav or the more experienced Ishant Sharma.

Kumar has justified his skipper's faith with his accuracy and ability to swing the ball both ways, helping the world champions reach the final as the only unbeaten team in the eight-nation Champions Trophy tournament.

Left-arm seamer Ravindra Jadeja may be India's leading bowler with 10 wickets in four matches, but the early breakthroughs provided by Kumar have left several opponents rattled.

Reigning World Cup holders India clash with hosts England in an intriguing Champions Trophy oneday final on Sunday that promises to be a thriller.

The sold-out game at Edgbaston will please organisers and fans alike as a finale to what has been billed as the last edition of the eight-nation tournament before it is replaced by a Test championship in 2017. The final, worth 2 million dollars to the

winners and 1 million to the runners-up, will be contested by teams who've justified their status as the top-ranked one-day sides in the world.

India, winners of the World Cup at home in 2011, proved worthy of their number one ranking by cruising to the final with four straight wins -- the last three by emphatic eight-wicket margins.

Second-ranked England, looking for their first major one-day title, made it to the final with three wins out of four, including a seven-wicket defeat of South Africa in the semifinal at The Oval in London.

Few would hazard to predict the outcome of the dream final between a young and ruthless Indian side and a typically gritty England in front of boisterous supporters from both sides.

If the weather holds -- light rain has been forecast for Sunday -- a classic contest is in store between India's batting firepower and the crafty seam and spin attack of the hosts.

Left-handed opener Shikhar Dhawan has taken the tournament by storm with 332 runs in four matches at an average of 110.66, making him the competition's leading scorer.

Dhawan's scores of 114, 102 not out, 48 and 68, which leave him a strong contender for the player of the tournament award, and

valuable opening stands with Rohit Sharma have boosted India at the top of the order.

Left-arm spinner Ravindra Jadeja has been the pick of the bowlers with 10 wickets -- joint-second in the tournament with England spearhead James Anderson behind New Zealander Mitchell McClenaghan's 11 scalps.

Jadeja and fellow-spinner Ravichandran Ashwin have been backed admirably by the three-pronged seam attack of Ishant Sharma, Bhuvneshwar Kumar and Umesh Yadav in containing opposition batsmen.

England, who begin an eagerlyanticipated Ashes series against Australia next month, will be desperate to bag a major one-day international title after suffering defeats in three World Cup finals in 1979, 1987 and 1992, as well as losing the 2004 Champions Trophy final to the West Indies at The Oval.

Their batting revolves around skipper Alastair Cook, Ian Bell and Jonathan Trott, who has answered critics of his perceived slow scoring in the ODI game by emerging as England's highest run-getter in the tournament with 209 runs.

But the hosts' hopes will rest on how well the brilliant Anderson and his new-ball partners, Stuart Broad and Steven Finn, are able to contain the Indian batting.

Off-spinner James Tredwell, whose three for 19 in seven overs wrecked South Africa in the semifinal and won him the man-of-thematch award, has ensured England do not miss the injured Graeme Swann.

England have lost eight of their last 10 one-day internationals against Dhoni's men, but all of them were on Indian soil.

When India last played in England in 2011, they were not only blanked 4-0 in the Test series, but lost the one-dayers 3-0. A World Cup game in Bangalore in 2011 between the two sides ended in a sensational tie.



Don't rush on Trott

Whether it's the care with which he scratches out his mark, or the way he builds an innings, England's Jonathan Trott is not a man to be rushed.

Yet for all his success, the speed with which Trott, a key figure in England's top-order for Sunday's Champions Trophy final against India at his Warwickshire home ground of Edgbaston, scores his runs remains a talking point.

The England number three's career one-day strike rate of 77 has been reckoned by some observers to be too slow for the demands of the modern game.

Yet England have made it clear they want the rest of the side to bat round 'anchorman' Trott who has been in fine form at the Champions Trophy.

Unnecessary panic

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) president Nazmul Hassan Papon's sensational disclosure on Friday regarding problems with the hosting of next year's ICC World

Twenty20 has surprised all, including his colleagues in the board. On condition of anonymity, many said

that the BCB boss unnecessarily added another issue to an already formidable list of problems. These include the Anti-Corruption and Security Unit (ACSU) report on matchfixing in the country, uncertainty over arranging the Dhaka Premier League, the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) nonpayment issue and the slothful approach towards the preparation of big events like next year's Asia Cup and World Twenty 20.

"We can't understand why he told it to the media. It's really embarrassing. There is no point highlighting the issue. He could discuss with the board members before going to public if he felt the issue is so serious. It is also not decent to make something public which is in the agenda of an ICC board meeting," said a member, adding that "It's ridiculous to say that we are in danger of losing the rights."

Many believed that this kind of mistake happened because of the president's goalone policy. There have been previous occasions when the president had unilaterally

decided to go to the press about certain issues. Questions have also been asked about why the president has suddenly linked the

issue of the Dhaka Premier Cricket League

with the ACSU report.

A board official informed that it is normal practice for the ICC to have an alternate venue lined up for any multinational event and the situation is not so dire that Bangladesh will lose the hosting rights for the mega event.

There have been concerns about the Sylhet Divisional Stadium but BCB's acting CEO Nizamuddin Chowdhury said that the venue will get the approval when an ICC team visits in September.

"The ground is ready. The structure for media facilities is there and all the internal arrangements will be completed on time. The pavilion was the main concern for the ICC inspecting team but work for the fourstoried pavilion has already started. The galleries are there. So we will be able to hand over the venues to the ICC by October as per ICC's deadline. We have a plan to arrange two international matches in the venue during New Zealand's tour to Bangladesh in October," informed Chowdhury.

A high-placed official from the National Sports Council (NSC) however had doubts about the handover of the Sylhet venue by October.

"We started working from June 10. We had to go through the various official formalities before starting the work and you all know how the government system works. They keep saying to finish it by October, but ultimately we think it will be done by November and the drainage system and some other works will be worked on after the World Cup," said the NSC official on condition of anonymity.

Siddikur at 22nd

Siddikur Rahman fell one spot further to joint 22nd position after the third round of the Worldwide Holdings Selangor Masters in Kuala Lumpur yesterday. Bangladesh's premier golfer had an uneventful day at the challenging Seri Selangor Golf Club on Saturday as he traded one bogey for one birdie, going par in the sixteen other holes, ending the day at par-71. That took his aggregate score to one-over-par (214), having racked up 70 and 73 in the first and second rounds respectively.

Despite Siddikur's indifferent performance over the three rounds, he was only nine shots behind leader Pariya Junhasavasdikul of Thailand, who was on eight-under-par (205), due to the challenging nature of the course. Pariya hung on to his one-shot lead over Korea's Baek Seuk-hyun after shooting a level par 71 in the third round of the 400,000 dollar event. Like Siddikur, Pariya too is chasing his second Asian Tour title.

Siddikur began positively, finishing in tenth position in the first round. The second round proved to be his undoing when he fell to 21st position with a round of two-over-par. In his previous tournament Siddikur wasted a golden opportunity to win his second Asian Tour title at the Queen's Cup in Thailand by failing spectacularly after starting the last round in pole position.


