# Govt moves to amend CrPC

The government has planned to amend the Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC) to add 20 more offences to the existing 64 non-cognisable offences that many consider not that grave.

Involuntary manslaughter (unintentionally causing the death of someone), embezzlement, extortion with death threats, theft, torture for dowry and assault would be among the offences to be included, according to the draft amendment to the CrPC.

In non-cognisable offences, police cannot investigate or make arrests without orders from the court.

Law Minister Shafique Ahmed at a views-exchanging meeting on the proposed amendment yesterday said a high number of cases pending with courts often causes case proceedings to linger. That was why there were plans to appoint mediators and settle non-cognisable cases outside courts.

He said over 80 percent of the women and children repression cases were false and the government was considering if those could be settled outside the court by compensation to the victims.

According to the draft, investigators would now get 150 days to probe an offense under CrPC, he said.

However, during a group discussion following the meeting, a judge said investigation officers would now complete their probe hastily due to time constraint.

# Convicted collaborators may lose voting rights

The Election Commission is considering excluding from the voter list the names of those who were convicted of collaborating with the Pakistani army during the Liberation War.

The commission had received a list of 47 convicted collaborators from the home ministry, EC Secretary Muhammed Sadique told The Daily Star yesterday.

"We will place the list during the commission's regular meeting to discuss the next course of action," he said.

Election Commissioner Shah Nawaz said, "I will be able to give [you] details after the list is placed at the meeting."

# Stop political violence

Roundtable calls for civil society's role against unrest, killings, hartals

With 171 people killed in 230 incidents of political unrest in the first three months of this year alone, speakers at a roundtable called on the civil society to raise its voice against political violence.

Misuse of power by the state and political leaders gave opportunities to criminals to create unrest, they said.

Editor of Prothom Alo Matiur Rahman at the roundtable on political violence at the daily's office yesterday said during the first three months of the year there were 14 nationwide hartals and 68 regional hartals.

Immediately after Jamaat-e-Islami leader Delwar Hossain Sayedee was sentenced to death for crimes against humanity, 137 people were killed -- 44 members of Jamaat, six policemen and 70 other people, he said quoting figures from Ain O Salish Kendra.

Eminent citizens and civil society members spoke at the roundtable.

Akbar Ali Khan, former adviser to a caretaker government, said it was difficult to ensure good governance and rights of the citizens in a situation where there was political unrest.

"There is a difference between the religious

# UK spy agency taps net cables

Collects and stores vast quantities of global email messages, Facebook posts, internet histories and calls to share them with NSA

Britain's spy agency GCHQ has secretly gained access to the network of cables which carry the world's phone calls and internet traffic and has started to process vast streams of sensitive personal information which it is sharing with its American partner, the National Security Agency (NSA).

The sheer scale of the agency's ambition is reflected in the titles of its two principal components: Mastering the Internet and Global Telecoms Exploitation, aimed at scooping up as much online and telephone traffic as possible. This is all being carried out without any form of public acknowledgement or debate.
