A biannual housing fair that ended on Saturday registered a slump in sales from its previous edition in June last year.

Realtors sold Tk 227 crore worth of flats, plots and commercial space at the four-day show organised by the Real Estate and Housing Association of Bangladesh (REHAB).

Sales at 2012's summer fair were worth around Tk 450 crore, it said.

Heavy rain during the fair and space constraint were the key reasons behind sluggish sales, according to Md Wahiduzzaman, acting general secretary of REHAB, said at the closing ceremony.

More than 10,000 people visited the show at Ruposhi Bangla Hotel, which displayed projects from 120 members of the association. In June 2012, 159 members of the association participated.

The association, however, tipped the sales of new flats to increase significantly in future, due to the provision to legalise black money by investing in real estate and resumption of new gas connections to households.

Real estate is a growing sector with an annual turnover of Tk 24,000 crore. Around 1,200 REHAB members build, on average, 15,000 apartments a year, according to an industry insider.

REHAB also awarded 20 newsmen from print and electronic media for writing excellent reports on the

Symphony currently holds 57 percent of the market for smartphones that was 41 percent in the first quarter of this year and 18 percent in the 4th quarter of last year.

Canada keen to work for compliance in RMG sector

Canada is willing to work with Bangladesh to improve compliance in the RMG sector, said Canadian Foreign Minister John Baird yesterday.

Canada will send experts to promote building safety, fire safety and labour law compliance in the garment sector of Bangladesh, Baird said.

"Canada will work together with Bangladesh to improve compliance in the RMG sector, including through corporate social responsibility. Canada does not believe that workers in the sector should be punished through any kind of trade restrictions."

Baird spoke in a meeting with Foreign Minister Dipu Moni on the sideline of the 20th Asean Regional Forum Ministerial Meeting in Bandar Seri Begawan, Brunei yesterday, the foreign ministry said in a statement.

The Canadian minister said the Canadian government would also encourage its buyers and retailers to engage with manufacturers and exporters in Bangladesh to improve social compliance in the sector to protect and promote the rights of workers.

Dipu Moni thanked the Canadian government for its pragmatic approach and briefed Baird about the steps taken by the government to further update the existing labour law to enhance occupational safety and promote the rights and well-being of workers.

Dipu Moni also requested Canada to review its current rules of origin provision so that it does not adversely affect Bangladesh's exports to Canada.

Earlier, Dipu Moni met with the US Secretary of State John Kerry on the sidelines of the Asean meeting's retreat session yesterday.

Saudi slice of Asia at risk as king aims jobs at locals

"The government can afford the wage bill in the short- to mediumterm," al-Turki said in a phone interview. "But in the long term it will be difficult.

Preparing Saudis for privatesector jobs is one of the tasks of the Technical and Vocational Training Corp., which teaches 110,000 Saudis a year. It has "gotten a lot of requests from different companies," spokesman Fahad Alotaibi said in a phone interview. "There is a need in the market for our graduates."

This month, Al-Hidada, a construction company, hired 500 graduates from the program, and the local BMW distributor, Mohammed Yousuf Naghi Motors, took 200 for its car workshops, Alotaibi said.

As such jobs go to Saudis, crowds are gathering outside embassies and consulates as foreign nationals line up for the paperwork required to leave the country.

The wait erupted into a riot at the Indonesian consulate in Jeddah on June 9, leaving one woman dead. The Indian Embassy in Riyadh has "urged our community to avail the concessions announced by the Saudi authorities" and is working on a "24/7 basis" to process them, said spokesman Surinder Bhagat in an e-mailed response to questions.

There are still jobs for foreigners, and not all the Indians will have to leave. For Mohammed al-Dowsari, a Saudi camel farmer, it's a good time to hire cheap labour and the embassy is a good place to find it.

GM, Honda partner on fuel cell vehicle development

General Motors and Honda will combine forces to develop hydrogen fuel cell vehicles in the hopes of delivering them to customers by around 2020, the US and work together to develop the next genera-Japanese automakers said Tuesday.

The partnership is aimed at solving the two biggest problems facing the commercial feasibility of fuel cells: high cost and lack of fueling stations.

"Honda and GM are eager to accelerate the market penetration of this ultimate clean mobility technology," Honda chief Takanobu Ito said in a statement.

"I am excited to form this collaboration to fuse our leading fuel cell technologies and create an advanced system that will be both more capable and more affordable."

Engineers from both companies will tion of fuel cell technology, sharing all their previous research and future discoveries at joint research facilities in Michigan and Japan.

While the master agreement does not cover manufacturing, it will likely lead the automakers to use essentially the same engine and storage tanks in their fuel cell vehicles.

Ahmed also asked them to be vigilant of price manipulation by few unscrupulous ones among them, adding that the 14 surveillance teams formed by his ministry would monitor the markets in Dhaka during Ramadan, due to start next week.

Every market must hang a price list to ensure that the prices are upheld, he said.

The commerce ministry sat with the policymakers, businessmen, traders and business leaders several times over the matter. "It can be assured that the existing stock situation will not put any negative impact on prices during the month of Ramadan."

Ahmed's comments came at a discussion on the price and supply situation of essentials ahead of Ramadan, organised by the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry at its auditorium.

Meanwhile, the businessmen and traders, too, gave their word that there would be no scarcity or a price hike as there are enough stocks of the items widely consumed during the month.

"Prices of some items such as sugar, edible oil, lentil and salt have already been reduced," said Tanvir Mostafa, director of Meghna Group of Industries, a leading importer of essentials.

Asif Iqbal, executive director of the company, cited the current retail price of lentils, which was Tk 130-135 a kg a month ago but is Tk 125 now.

Kazi Salauddin Ahmed, general manager of S Alam Group, said the supply chain worked appropriately for the last 3-4 years, and "there would be no exception this year".

"The common people can consume the essential items at fair prices," he added.

Sirajul Islam, a date and other fruits importer, said the yearly demand for date is around 35,000 tonnes, with three-fourths of the amount consumed during the month of Ramadan alone.

"The existing stock is sufficient to meet the demand," he said, adding that the price of per kg date will remain Tk 70 to Tk 80, which is lower than the previous year.
