Observe AL's Gazipur grassroots, blame it on govt's failure on key national issues

The Gazipur election looks similar to the June 15 polls to four other city corporations in outcome, but it is different in that the industrial city had always been an Awami League bastion while Rajshahi, Khulna and Barisal are considered BNP strongholds and Sylhet a swing constituency.

The AL suffered a humiliating defeat in the maiden Gazipur City Corporation polls on Saturday, as the opposition cashed in on the government's mishandling of critical national issues, said local leaders of the ruling party.

The present strategy of the party, they added, is outdated and if it is not changed, results in the upcoming parliamentary polls will be disastrous.

Talking to The Daily Star yesterday, some district-level leaders said the issues like stockmarket, Hall-Mark and railway-gate scandals and alleged Padma bridge graft had exposed poor governance and overshadowed the successes and clean image of party-backed mayoral candidate Ajmat Ullah Khan.

AL not waking up to reality

In mid-June, the Awami League had described its humiliating defeat in the four city corporation elections as a wake-up call. But Saturday's stunning defeat in Gazipur, considered as the party's bastion, is a sign that the party is still sleeping.

In fact, since mid-June the ruling party did not send voters any message that it was correcting itself. It was business as usual everywhere.

Following the defeat in the four city polls on June 15, the AL highups, including AMA Muhith, Matia Chowdhury and Obaidul Quader, said it was a wake-up call for the party to make a comeback in the Gazipur City Corporation polls.

But their speeches proved mere rhetoric as the party leadership paid little attention to this end. Instead of rejuvenating the grassroots, the party top brass tasked the central leadership with overseeing the polls campaign.

In the presence of central leaders, grassroots leaders in Gazipur felt they were sidelined and so they remained largely inactive in the campaign.

Bangladesh two years ahead

Hostile climate seen as major threat to progress

Bangladesh has already achieved most targets of the UN Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) two years before the 2015 deadline, but climate change remains a threat to the country, says a government report.

Though developed nations didn't provide Bangladesh with their pledged assistance, the country achieved many of the

MDG targets, says the Planning Commission's progress report 2012 on the MDGs.

Dr Shamsul Alam, member of General Economics Division of the commission, presented the report at the National Economic Council auditorium in the capital yesterday.

AL's Black Rose fails to bloom

Central's hectic campaign falls short of people

The Awami League high command had set up its campaign office at the Black Rose hotel in the city's Uttara and made all-out efforts to secure win for the party mayoral favourite in the Gazipur city polls, but all in vain.

Leaders of AL and its different associated bodies swarmed the hotel, just 200 metres from the Gazipur City Corporation (GCC) area, either for campaign planning or to make their senior leaders happy, party insiders said.

Communications Minister Obaidul Quader and State Minister for LGRD and Cooperatives Jahangir Kabir Nanak were the AL's campaign coordinators in the GCC polls.

Star honours some unsung war heroes

While many sacrificed their lives for the motherland, Abdul Mannan accepted the fate of a landless farmer by giving up his only piece of land for burial of the villagers massacred by the Pakistani Army on October 9, 1971.

Yet, Mannan has no regrets, even though he had to fight with poverty every day of the last four decades.

"I could have been one of them. What would I have done with the land if I was killed? I thought the Almighty will take care of me so I gave my land to bury the dead," says Mannan of Khaghar in Brahmanbaria.

Stories of such unsung heroes of the Liberation War, collected and compiled by researcher Lt Col (retd) Kazi Sazzad Ali Zahir, Bir Pratik, are being published in The Daily Star since 2011.

Gazipur chooses clean councillors

Voters have largely rejected the councillor aspirants with criminal records in the first-ever Gazipur city polls on Saturday. But they lined up against Awami League-backed mayoral candidate Ajmat Ullah Khan who is widely known as a man with clean image.

Out of 57 councillors-elect, 42 are not facing any criminal records. Some of them had been accused in criminal cases that were eventually withdrawn or they were acquitted of the charges, according to affidavits submitted to the returning officer.

Also, none of 19 councillors-elect to reserved seats for women is facing any criminal cases.

As many as 108 candidates who face criminal cases had contested for 57 councillor posts in the polls. Five councillor aspirants and even mayor-elect MA Mannan have murder cases against them, according to their affidavits.

Mannan, with support of the BNP-led opposition alliance, defeated Ajmat by a margin of more than one lakh votes.

Local government expert Prof Tofail Ahmed told The Daily Star yesterday that voters, while picking councillors, have mostly looked for people with clean images.

But, he said, the situation was different regarding the election to the mayoral post. Political influence and national issues overshadowed the mayoral aspirants' backgrounds.
