Ramadan vacation for schools and colleges would be reduced to make up for the lost time during shutdowns in recent months, the education minister told The Daily Star yesterday Nurul Islam Nahid also

said that the frequent shutdowns seriously disrupted the academic activities, forcing reduction of the number of classes in schools. "Besides, we had to stop many classes while holding Secondary School Certificate and Higher Secondary Certificate examinations postponed by hartals."

An order will be issued today to this effect, said officials of the education ministry.

They said the schools and colleges may have to hold classes till July 20, despite the Ramadan break coming off on July 11 according to the educational calendar.

Vacation cut Moon ride on Dhaka roads

Repairs kept in wait for rain; untimely road-digging results in terrible tailbacks

Commuting in the capital is now a real hassle, as many roads lie potholed for months in the absence of timely repair. Rain and waterlogging in recent weeks have worsened the situation, adding to the plight of city dwellers.

The city corporations say they will not take on any major repair job before August as the rain will hinder the work. They, however, see no problem in the construction of footpaths and drains, making the roads narrower only to compound the nagging traffic congestion.

Jahangir Alam, chief engineer of Dhaka South City Corporation (DSCC), has said due to a fund crisis, the authorities do their work in order of priority.

The DSCC sought Tk 400 crore for road maintenance and traffic management in this fiscal year but received an allocation of Tk 178 crore. In the previous fiscal year, it got Tk 134.8 crore after seeking Tk 500 crore, officials said. The Dhaka North City Corporation (DNCC) got allocation of Tk 236

crore against a demand of around Tk 500 crore in this fiscal year. Asked about the construction of footpaths and drainage when massive repairs should get priority, Jahangir said, "These are emergency works to drain rainwater from roads into the storm sewer system."

He also said the ongoing repairs were also being delayed as contractors take time to compact roads in a proper manner.

According to Jahangir Alam, the roads that are supposed to last at least three years turn shabby within six months because of waterlogging. He blamed unplanned urbanisation for the situation.

GARMENT SAFETY IN BANGLADESH

Factories under scanner

70 top retailers to inspect all factories within 9 months

A mostly European forum of 70 international retailers and brands has agreed to inspect all garment-supplying factories in Bangladesh in nine months to ensure fire and building safety.

The steering committee on the Accord on Fire and Building Safety in Bangladesh announced its action plan in the Swiss city of Geneva yesterday.

Atiqul Islam, president of Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA), welcomed the move from IndustriALL Global Union, a consortium of mostly European : retailers and brands.

"If retailers do something positive, our indus-

tries will be immensely benefited. But if they impose harsh terms and conditions, we will not be able to implement those, and eventually it will have negative impact on industries," said Atiqul.

The signatories have agreed to provide funds for renovation of any factory if the inspection teams find it risky.

The teams with local and international experts will focus on faults in procedures and emergency infrastructure, including fire exit and evacuation, and fundamental flaws that could lead to a partial or total structural failure of a factory building.

Some European companies signed the accord, initiated by IndustriALL and UNI Global Union,

Test finds food, water not poisonous STAFF CORRESPONDENT

An investigation conducted by the Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research found large numbers of garment workers fell ill due to mass psychogenic illness, rather than from consuming 'poisonous' food

The study concluded that the fire in Tazreen Fashions garment factory last November and the collapse of Rana Plaza in April this year may have contributed to the mental stress of the workers resulting in sickness.

"We have identified and investigated five outbreaks and found that they are suffering from mass psychogenic

Azhar 'committed' 9 types of crimes

Investigation agency submits formal charges to war crimes prosecution

The investigation agency designated to probe war crimes has found "evidence" about Jamaate-Islami leader ATM Azharul Islam's "involvement" in nine types of war crimes committed during the Liberation War.



Azhar, the alleged Al-Badr commander of Rangpur, was "involved" in at least six incidents of war crimes, which left over 1,200 people dead between April 3 and December 16, 1971.

Mughal era Eidgah choked by illegal structures

Illegal structures are hampering restoration work of the historic Eidgah

at Dhanmondi in the capital. Set up in 1640 by Mughal ruler Subedar Shah Shuja Dewan Bin Abdul Kashim, the Eidgah is one of the only two Mughal congregation sites in the sub-continent, the other being in Delhi, according to histo-

The arched main entrance to the Eidgah has an inscription on it in

Persian language. Neglect and lack of supervision over the years have led to encroachments upon the Mughal legacy. A complaint centre of Dhaka Power Distribution Company Ltd, a pump house of the Wasa and a private Islamic research centre have the largest unauthorised structures at the

Eidgah, obscuring it from public view. An encroachment that comes as an eyesore is on the eastern side of the Eidgah -- remnant of a demolished old mosque. A newly built fourstorey mosque-cum-madrasa is now in place close to it. But the

mosque committee is dilly-dallying over its removal. Asked about this, committee sources said some influential local people want that the remnant be kept as a "souvenir".
