## Papon prefers long-term too

Although having recently appointed Mushfigur Rahim for only six months Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) president Nazmul Hassan Papon, like the outspoken Mushfiqur, is also in favour of long-term captaincy.

When asked about Mushfiqur's criticism of BCB's practice of appointing captain series by series, the BCB boss said during the Bangladesh Umpires' and Scorers' Association website launching programme at Maulana Bhasani Hockey Stadium yesterday: "I don't see any reason for not appointing someone for long-term but we have to decide it in the board meeting. I agree that it's not a good idea to appoint captains on a series by series basis because the players and captain both feel comfortable if someone is given enough time."

"We are thinking about the matter. We will take the final decision after watching the next series. We will appoint a captain for the long-term before the World Cup (ICC T20 World Cup in March 2014)," he added.

Ad-hoc committee member Mahbubul Anam, who was also present, however stated that the elected body will take the decision regarding this matter.

Earlier, Mushfigur blasted his short-term appointment as a 'very wrong' concept saying that it hinders progress in setting long-term goals for the team, a view supported by former captains Roquibul Hasan and Faruque Ahmed.

Regarding the board elections, Papon said that he has yet to decide whether he will contest but welcomed former board president Saber Hossain Chowdhury to contest the election.

"I had never planned to become president of the cricket board. The Prime Minister (Sheikh Hasina) gave me the responsibility, so I have to talk with her before taking any decision whatsoever if I even want to quit. But at this moment I can't say whether I will contest the election," said Papon.

"I learned that Saber Bhai (Saber Hossain Chowdhury) will contest the board elections. I will be happy if he contests because I believe many things will be solved if he does," he added.



## TV STING SLC bans 2 umps

Sri Lanka cricket bosses on Tuesday banned two umpires named by an Indian television programme last year that claimed they were willing to make favourable decisions during matches for cash.

Sri Lanka Cricket (SLC) said it banned Sagara Gallage for 10 years from umpiring in domestic matches, and Maurice de la Zilwa for three years after a disciplinary hearing over allegations in the television sting.

SLC did not give details of the hearing nor the allegations against the pair, but official cricket sources said the disciplinary panel found sufficient evidence to punish them.

Three of the six named by the TV programme were from Sri Lanka, while two were from Pakistan. The sixth was Nadir Shah, who was banned for 10 years by Bangladesh authorities in March.
