have to concede a huge financial loss; quite ironic considering that the board thought that the tournament would lay golden eggs.

And this was the reason the BPL governing council's secretary IH Mallick responded with only one answer in response to almost all questions regarding the non-payment issues. "Actually in the last board meeting it was decided that the board president will sit with everyone, so we have to wait for the meetings to get the answers to your questions," said Mallick yesterday.

One of the ad-hoc committee members, Mallick however said that the board has been currently focusing more on the prepa-

rations for next year's ICC Twenty20 World Cup. With that another question arose: is there any chance of the third edition of the BPL taking place on time?

"Realistically, the third edition must take place after the World Cup. And before that the board has to bring huge changes in the structure of the tournament. We ran the tournament absolutely on wrong structure. I realised from first-hand experience that it's quite unrealistic to expect one franchise to spend around Tk 15 crore each year and return a profit," he responded.

On condition of anonymity a board official said that he sees little chance of the tournament continuing with the old franchises while conceding that one or two may make it through.

Whatever the scenario is, the board stands to lose around Tk 45 crore if BCB president's last effort goes in vain as the board are supposed to get Tk 22 crore from the franchises and Tk 19 crore from event management firm Game On Sports, besides other expenses. Furthermore the BCB, as the guarantor of players' payments, has to pay the dues of the players if the franchises do not pay which means they have to suffer a loss of around Tk 70 crore. Despite repeated attempts, only two franchises have completed fifty per cent players' payment.

BPL governing council chairman Afzalur Rahman Sinha however was still hopeful that the board will not suffer the financial loss despite the mess with the second edition.

"The agreement has already terminated but we still believe that the problem will be solved when the board president meets with Game On and the franchises. They are talking about compensation as they claimed that the second edition lost its glamour because of the non-participation of Pakistani players. But one thing is clear they have to give the bank guarantee before making any argument. They should pay the dues, so I'm not worried about the financial loss of the board," said the veteran organiser.

Record deal for school hockey

The Bangladesh Hockey Federation (BHF) yesterday struck a record deal worth Tk 2 crore with the First Security Islami Bank for the 2014 National School Hockey Championship.

This comes as the biggest sponsorship deal for BHF, after they had signed a deal worth Tk 90.44 lakh with Janata Bank Ltd for the national coach, following national team's excellent performance in the World Hockey League (Rd-2) in February.

ATN Bangla has been chosen as the media partner of the

school hockey championship. The championship is supposed to get underway from February next year at 10 venues in seven divisions with 120 schools expecting to take part. The sponsors will provide the 50 per cent of the total amount of money within one month of the deal, as per the contract.

"Like football and cricket, we will have to make the game of hockey popular at grass root level. The BHF has already taken initiatives to make it popular and we have just responded to their proposal as a partner in hockey's development," said managing director of FSIB, AAM Zakaria at a press conference at the Bangladesh Olympic Association auditorium yesterday.

"If there this brings a fruitful impact on the country's hockey, then we will feel that our initiative has been successful," said Zakaria adding that the board of directors approved Tk 2 crore for one year.

ATN Bangla chairman Mahfuzur Rahman informed that the channel would try to provide wide coverage of the tournament from each venue and would telecast the matches of the final round live from the Maulana Bhasani Hockey Stadium.

Irish through to 2015 WC

Ireland on Tuesday qualified for the ICC Cricket World Cup 2015 after a dramatic last-gasp tie with the Netherlands.

The Netherlands' number-nine batsman Michael Rippon hit a four and a six from the final two deliveries off John Mooney to snatch a point for his side.

But Ireland's point was good enough to see them top the ICC World Cup League Championship and advance, for the third successive time, to ICC's flagship event that will be staged in Australia and

New Zealand in 2015. After Tuesday's result, Ireland topped the table on 20 points, with nine wins

from 12 matches. There is still one place up for grabs from this tournament with four sides -- Scotland, Netherlands, Afghanistan, and the **United Arab Emirates** (UAE) -- all still capable of claiming second position.

India take on Sri Lanka in final today

India and Sri Lanka meet yet again, this time in the final of the Tri-Nation Series at Queen's Park Oval on Thursday, amid increasing speculation that Mahendra

Singh Dhoni will be back to the lead the World Cup and Champions Trophy holders.

Dhoni sustained a right hamstring strain while batting against the West Indies in his team's first match of the tournament on June 30 at Sabina Park in Kingston and an announcement was made the following day that he was ruled out of the rest of the competition with uncapped batsman Ambati

Rayudu being flown in as his replacement. With or without Dhoni though, India are bracing for a much tougher Sri Lankan chal-

lenge than what transpired on Tuesday when fast-medium bowler Bhuvneshwar Kumar produced the outstanding figures of four for eight and engineered the demolition of the 1996 World Cup winners for just 96.

Sri Lanka had all but qualified for the final ahead of that encounter and their performance with the bat on the way to an 81-run defeat on the Duckworth-Lewis Method reflected a noticeable lack of intensity that is not expected to be repeated in the final.
