England edge ahead dramatically

James Anderson took five wickets for the second time in the match as England just held their nerve to win the first Ashes Test against Australia by 14 runs at Trent

Bridge on Sunday.

When Australia lost their ninth wicket on the fifth and final day, they were 80 runs adrift of their victory target of 311 and all but out of the match.

But by lunch they were 291 for nine, just 20 runs away from a stunning upset with Brad Haddin 69 not out and James Pattinson unbeaten on 22.

However, the third over after lunch saw Haddin, on 71, eventually given out caught behind by opposing wicketkeeper Matt and a match haul of 10 for 158. Prior off player-of-the-match Anderson's full-length delivery.

England, in a Test full of controversial umpiring decisions, had though first to

challenge Pakistani on-field umpire Aleem Dar's original not out verdict.

But third umpire Marais Erasmus, using Hot Spot technology, overturned the call and that meant Ashes-holders England had gone 1-0 up in this five-match series ahead of the second Test at Lord's on Thursday.

Pattinson finished on 25 not out after a missed the stumps. last-wicket stand of 65.

It was the second remarkable lastwicket Australia stand of the match after their first innings 163, a tenth wicket Test record featuring teenage debutant Ashton Agar's 98 -- the highest score by a Test No. 11.

England spearhead seamer Anderson, who took four wickets for 12 runs Sunday, finished with an innings return of five for 73

Haddin, 11 not out overnight, continued to mix aggression with defence, and took Australia to 200 when he cover-drove fast-medium bowler Anderson for four.

Anderson, one of only four England bowlers to take more than 200 Test wickets, eventually had had left-hander Agar edging to Cook.

And Australia's 207 for seven soon became 211 for eight when Starc, who has a Test-best score of 99, managed just a single before he too fell to the Anderson-Cook combination.

The pair almost had their third wicket when Siddle on 10 got an edge only for Cook to drop the chance.

However, Siddle added just one more run to his total before he edged a full-blooded drive off Anderson and Cook, going high to his right, held a sensational catch.

England had put themselves into a strong position thanks to a seventh-wicket second innings stand of 138 between Ian Bell (109) and Stuart Broad (65).

But Broad was controversially given not out on 37 despite edging the ball to slip -one of several contentious decisions in this enthralling match.

USA rout Cuba in Gold Cup

Chris Wondolowski scored twice as the United States men's national team routed Cuba 4-1 in a CONCACAF Gold Cup contest on Saturday. Wondolowski now has

Good start for 'new Kagawa'

Turkey midfielder Nuri Sahin has dubbed Borussia Dortmund's new-signing Henrikh Mkhitaryan as the Champion League finalists' "new Shinji Kagawa" as the Armenian continues to impress.

Kagawa became a club icon by helping Borussia win back-to-back Bundesliga titles in 2010-11 and 2011-12 before moving to Manchester United last year.

Mkhitaryan has impressed in his two friendly matches since joining Dortmund from Shakhtar Donetsk last week for 27.5m euros, (US\$36m) both on his debut in Wednesday's 3-1 win at FC Basel, then Saturday's 4-1 win over Turkey's Buraspor.

"Honestly, he reminds me of Shinji Kagawa," said ex-Real Madrid midfielder Sahin after Saturday's win in Altach, Austria, near Dortmund's training camp.

"I think he's even a bit quicker than Shinji.

"We have a lot of quality in attack."

Having finished second to Bayern Munich in both the Bundesliga and Champions League last season, Dortmund and their Bavarian rivals could meet next weekend in a preseason tournament at Borussia Moenchengladbach.

The rivals then meet in the German Super Cup final on July 27 in Dortmund and Borussia are eager to integrate their new signings in preparation.

"Mickey", as Mkhitaryan has been nicknamed, scored against Basel and the central midfielder was in the heart of Dortmund's attack as fellow new-signing Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang also scored against Turkey's Buraspor.

Poland striker Robert Lewandowski and Germany's Marco Reus also got on the score sheet as the Turkish league side also conceded an own goal. Having lost Germany midfielder Mario Goetze to

European champions Bayern Munich, Dortmund coach Jurgen Klopp said he was happy with Mkhitaryan's bright start before the Bundesliga starts on August 9.

"We already suspected that Henrikh has the qualities to set up chances in key moments like he did," enthused Klopp.

Dortmund's other new addition Sokratis also impressed against the Turks as the centre-back looked calm and composed next to Serbia's Neven Subotic against the Turkish side.

Debuts hearten Moyes despite loss

David Moyes took heart from sparkling debuts by two emerging stars after his reign as Manchester United manager got off to a lowkey start with an upset loss in Thailand.

A generally flat performance was enlivened by the eye-catching trickery of Belgian teen Adnan Januzaj, before new signing Wilfried Zaha came on and nearly snatched the equaliser.

After 27 years and 38 trophies under Alex Ferguson, Moyes admitted losing 1-0 to the Singha All-Star XI -- a team pulled together from the best players of the Thai league --"wasn't a brilliant result".

But he was sufficiently encouraged by Zaha, the hero of Crystal Palace's promotion to the Premier League, to suggest he is in line for his competitive debut this season.

"I thought when Wilf came on he gave us a little lift. He was certainly unlucky not to score with his attempt at goal, said Moyes, adding, "I hope so" when asked if Zaha would get an opportunity this season.

"We'll see how he does. We're bringing him here to give him a chance," said the Scot.

"It's the first time I've worked with him, first time I've had a chance to see him up close so he'll certainly be part of the squad and we'll see if we can fit him in (to the first team) as often as we can."

After coming on in the second half, Zaha missed a header from close range but with eight minutes left, he nearly spared United's blushes when he rattled the far post with a curling shot from inside the box.

Januzaj, the top-rated 18-year-old with highlight reels on YouTube, started the game on the right but he impressed all over the pitch with his one-touch control, pace, quick feet and passing.

And the slight Belgian, United's reserve team player of the year last season, popped up for their best chance of the first half but disappointingly volleyed Fabio's cross over the bar.

"I thought he played well tonight, I thought he was a plus for us," said Moyes of Januzaj.

"It's always good when you give a young player a chance and he shows up, and I thought he did tonight. The more he plays like that, the more opportunities he's liable to get."

Moyes fielded a side missing Robin van Persie, captain Nemanja Vidic, Shinji Kagawa and Wayne Rooney, who fuelled transfer speculation when he pulled out of the Asian tour on day one with a hamstring injury.

France kings of U20

France defeated Uruguay 4-1 in a penalty shootout to win their first Under-20s World Cup title on Saturday after a fiercelycontested final ended 0-0 after extra-time.

Dimitri Foulquier scored the decisive fourth spot kick in front of a sparse crowd, beating Uruguay keeper Guillermo de Amores to seal victory for France who beat Turkey, Uzbekistan and Ghana on the way to the final.

Earlier, Ghana eased past Iraq 3-0 in the third-place playoff.

The competition was a test of Turkey's ability to hold a major sporting event ahead of the September decision on the city that will host the 2020

Olympics. Istanbul is one of three contenders for the Games along with Madrid and Tokyo.

Jim Boyce, chairman of the Under-20s World Cup organising committee for soccer's ruling body FIFA, said he was disappointed by the small crowds at the tournament.

"We are obviously disappointed with the attendance at the games. I know how passionate the people in Turkey are about football but for some reason we did not get the anticipated number of fans."
