Bangladesh team leaves for

A team of four math whizzes are heading out to Colombia today to represent Bangladesh in the 54th International Mathematical Olympiad being held in Santa Marta.

Bangladesh Mathematical Olympiad Committee announced this at a press conference at Jatiya Press Club in the capital yesterday. The team comprises of

Shourav Das and Nur Mohammad Shafiullah from Dhaka College, Mohammad Zahidul Hasan from Mymensingh Anandamohan College and Adib Hasan from Mymensingh Zila School.

Zahidul, a two-time cham pion of the national math Olympiad, along with Adib is going to be participating in the international arena for the first time.

On the other hand Shourav and Shafiullah are veterans who are going for the third time, both having bagged a bronze medal in an international Olympiad previously.

The national team is taking part in the international competition for the ninth year running and had previously won one silver medal, six bronzes and fifteen honourable mentions.

Dr Mohammad Zafar Iqbal, co-chairperson of the Bangladesh Mathematical Olympiad Committee, said the team would do a lot better if the members did not also have to keep up with their regular studies, and could devote more time to math.

"They have to think about getting admitted into university. I urge university authorities to take in students who have earned medals internationally without making them go through the regular admission procedure, so that they can spend more time in specializing," recommended Zafar Iqbal, claiming that Shahjalal International University of Science and Technology already does so.

NATIONAL CSR POLICY FOR CHILDREN EU to help formulation

The European Union will support Save the Children and the Ministry of Labour and Employment to formulate a "National Corporate Social Responsibility Policy for Children."

The Ministry of Labour and Employment (MoLE) and Save the Children Bangladesh signed an agreement on formulating the policy, which aims to establish a common understanding in the corporate sector on CSR for children and include child rights in core business principles, said a press release yesterday.

Speaking at the signing ceremony, Ambassador William Hanna, head of delegation of the European Union to Bangladesh, said different actors are carrying out CSR activities in a scattered way and implementation of CSR activities varies among companies.

"Also there is not enough focus on children regarding corporate social responsibility," William Hanna added.

"The formulation and execution of a uniform policy will have a sustained effect on the lives of working children and youth," he said, adding, "Having a policy on CSR will also boost Bangladesh's commitment to international compliance, and improve the country's international reputation."

Michael McGrath, country director of Save the Children, said child labour, poor working conditions and the lack of vocational training opportunities for youth are a matter of great concern for Bangladesh.

Secretary of the Ministry of Labour and Employment Mikail Shiper said corporations play a driving role in building a skilled work force in developed countries.

This initiative is a part of the project "Partnerships to Combat Child Labour through Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) in Bangladesh" funded by the European Union and implemented by Save the Children since November 2011.



While Bangladesh has approved the land boundary accord, more popularly known as Indira-Mujib agreement of 1974, Indian parliament is yet to pass it.

ACC to punish its investigators if any negligence found

The Anti-Corruption Commission will take stern action against its investigators if any negligence is found in their investigation as most of the graft cases' accused were acquitted by the courts last month.

For this, ACC will find out the reasons behind the acquittal in their part, said ACC Secretary Fayzur Rahman Chowdhury at the monthly press briefing at its office in the capital yesterday.

Five accused were acquitted and two others were convicted by the courts in seven cases last month, he said. The anti-graft watchdog punished its 74 officials

mainly for their irregularities in investigating cases between 2009 and April 2013, ACC Public Relations Officer Pranab Kumar Bhattacharya told The Daily Star yesterday. Of the officials, seven have been sacked from their job

while six suspended and five others sent to force retirement, he added. ACC last month approved filing eight cases against 18

persons, including five government officials. It also approved submission of 48 charge sheets against 101 persons, including 29 government officials

and 17 businessmen.

Matin, who went missing since the factory building caught fire on November 24, used to work as a packer at finishing section of Tazreen Fashions Ltd at Ashulia on the outskirts of the capital.

Delwar and his 30 other unnamed associates were directly involved in setting fire to the factory, leaving 112 workers dead and 12 others missing, the complainant said in the case statement.
