Fahad youngest FIDE Master

Mohammad Fahad Rahman was officially recognised

as a FIDE Master by the game's governing body yesterday after he emerged champion in the 14th ASEAN Age-Group (U-

10) Chess Championship held in Thailand last month to become the country's youngest FIDE Master.

"My ultimate target is to become a Grand Master and I just entered the first stage of that target," said an ecstatic Fahad, the country's 13th FIDE Master, over the phone yesterday. "I believe it (becoming FIDE Master) will encourage me to achieve my target"

The 10-year-old Fahad started to play chess through a tournament organised by Bangladesh Shishu Academy but he drew attention two years later when he became an age group champion of the National School Chess Tournament organised by the Bangladesh Chess Federation in 2009. His star kept rising as he lifted the title of the National Sub-Junior Chess Champions in 2011.

Having shrugged off the failure in the Asian Youth Chess Championship in Sri Lanka last year, Fahad became champion in a foreign meet for the first time by winning the U-10 age-group title in the Asian School Chess Tournament in Kolkata last November and he finally earned the coveted title of FIDE Master through his outstanding performance in Chiangmai, Thailand in June.

"I want to go step by step to achieve my ultimate goal, which is why I need to play Grand Master tournaments as much as I can," said Fahad. "I hope the federation and private companies will help me to take part in tournaments inside and outside of the country."

De Kruif wants keeping coach

Dutch coach Lodewijk de Kruif has asked the Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) to provide him a specialist foreign goalkeeping trainer as soon as possible.

After the national team's practice match against Team BJMC on Wednesday, de Kruif placed his demand to BFF president Kazi Salahuddin, who agreed in principle to provide a foreign goalkeeping coach, but the poor financial condition of the game's governing body means Salahuddin will be hardpressed to meet de Kruif's demand immediately.

"Our goalkeepers have zero technique and I need a coach who has the sound knowledge of technique," Salahuddin quoted de Kruif as saying.

"I think de Kruif should get a goalkeeping coach but at the moment I can't say anything. Today (Thursday) I came to the federation to discuss the matter with others but no one has arrived yet," said Salahuddin at his office yesterday afternoon.

Presently local coach Zahidul Islam Milon has been working as goalkeeping coach.

German-based Reasat arrives

German-based footballer Reasat Khaton arrived in the capital yesterday for a trial for a place in the Bangladesh national football team with Dutch coach Lodewijk de Kruif looking for Bangladeshi expatriate booters to boost his squad for the SAFF Championship to be held in Nepal in September.

Reasat, who was kept in the 35-member preliminary squad, is the fourth expatriate booter for the national camp with two -- Australian-based Anando Rahman and US-based Farhan Khan -- already pulling out of the camp. Denmarkbased Jamal Bhuiyan meanwhile has seemingly prevailed despite the number of booters being reduced to 26.

He was supposed to participate in the camp earlier, but some problems prohibited him from doing so. "The coach knew I had some problems. I had professional contracts with the club (Cloppenburg). I informed the coach, and he said that it was not a problem," Reasat said, explaining his delay. Explaining his desire to play for the national team, Reasat

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) president Nazmul Hassan Papon has said that the board will not comply with the Dhaka Premier League Clubs Committee's demand of host-

ing the players' transfer of the competition in September and the league later that month. The league, which has already been delayed a number of times this year, was scheduled to begin on August 29 and have its players' transfer on July 25. The president however stated that the board will announce fresh dates for both events this week.

week of September because New Zealand is touring Bangladesh in October and the national players won't be available that month. We have an aim of hosting the super league (second round of the tournament) in November," he said.

"The players' transfer will have to take place within August. I will sit with the board tomorrow and announce the dates this week," he added.

Explaining the reason behind yet another delay, he said: "The players' transfer is going to take place in a new format this time -- the gradation system. The system and the bylaws were sent to the clubs recently and they have a number of questions regarding the system which we need to talk about. That will be done within a week's time."

He also stated that if the league does indeed take place in September then it would be hosted outside Dhaka with Bogra,

Rajshahi and Khulna being the likely venues. The president who visited the stadium at Fatullah, an alternate venue for the Twenty20 World Cup next year, also stated that at this point of time preparing the country for the world event was his top priority. "That's more important than the Dhaka Premier League as of now," he said. "While the stadium is up to international standards, the ICC asked us to modify the dressing rooms, build a two-storey building which will include a box for the ICC and build dressing rooms for the practice ground as well. Most of the work is done I am not worried about the venue."

He was however, concerned about the "We have to start the league in the first situation of the outer ground of the venue which was waterlogged due to the recent rainfall. "Because of the lack of a proper drainage system the practice ground outside the stadium was two feet under water for a while. To solve the solution the drainage system needs to be developed and I have spoken to the concerned authorities about it," he said.

Meanwhile Papon also told reporters that he was hopeful that the board's elections would take place in a month's time. "I am hopeful that the legal issues can be solved and the elections can take place within a month's time," said Papon.

Regarding the ICC's Anti Corruption and Security Unit's latest visit Papon stated that they had come to interview Mohammad Rafique and certain other members of the Bangladesh Premier League's franchises. "I did not have any meeting scheduled with ACSU's officials this time," he said.

SL cricketer's antics above 35,000 feet!

Sri Lankan cricket chiefs on Thursday handed down a fine of nearly 2,000 dollars to a batsman who tried to force open a cabin door of a British Airways flight at 35,000 feet.

Sri Lanka Cricket (SLC) said Ramith Rambukwella had been fined 50 per cent of his tour fees after a disciplinary inquiry into the incident on a Boeing 777 from St. Lucia to London at the end of an A tour to the West Indies.

SLC said the player had also received a "severe warning on his behaviour" for causing panic onboard the aircraft which was carrying 229 passengers nearly three weeks ago.

The batsman was seen by other passengers pushing and pulling the door on the plane while apparently searching for the toilet, about two hours out of London's Gatwick airport, according to British media reports.

Although British Airways said at the time that "the event was linked to an element of alcohol", Rambukwella has insisted that he was merely sleepwalking.

Ian Bell's third hundred in successive Ashes matches saw England fight back against Australia in the second Test at Lord's on Thursday.

Ashes-holders England were 289 for seven at stumps on the first day, having been in dire straits at 28 for three when Bell came in. Yet just when it seemed England had

regained control, part-time leg-spinner Steven Smith took three wickets for 18 runs in six overs late in the day. SCOREBOARD

Tim Bresnan was seven not out and nightwatchman James Anderson four not out at the close.

Bell's 109 was the same score as he made in the second innings of England's 14-run first Test win at Trent Bridge last week, with both these centuries following his 115 in the final match of the 2010-11 Ashes in Sydney.

The 31-year-old was the fourth Englishman to score centuries in three consecutive Ashes Tests after Jack Hobbs, who did it twice, in 1911-12 and 1924-25, Walter Hammond in 1928-29 and Chris Broad, whose son Stuart was in England's side Thursday, in 1986-87.

Bell, together with Warwickshire colleague Jonathan Trott (58) and Jonny Bairstow (67), shared

Yet England's grip was loosened when Smith dismissed Bell, Bairstow and Matt Prior.

After the teams were presented before play to Queen Elizabeth II, monarch of both Britain and Australia, it was the tourists who bossed the early exchanges.

England were soon three wickets down with skipper Alastair Cook, opening partner Joe Root and dangerman Kevin Pietersen all out cheaply. Shane Watson got the ball rolling for

Australia when he brought one back into Cook's pads to have the lefthanderlbw for 12.

> Ryan Harris, recalled after Australia dropped the wayward Mitchell Starc, then took two wickets in an over.

The 33-year-old, playing just the 13th Test of his injury-ravaged career and first in more than a year, had Root lbw in his third over. Four balls later, Harris

shaped a delivery up the slope which Pietersen, on two, nicked to wicketkeeper Brad Haddin. Often criticised for slow

scoring, the fluent Trott had scored 11 fours when he topedged a pull off a Harris short-ball to give Usman Khawaja a simple catch at deep square leg.

Bairstow, on 21, was bowled by Peter Siddle but was told to wait as Dharmasena asked Hill to check for what turned out to be the slightest of no-balls.



Team BJMC fly to Bhutan today

Team BJMC leaves here today for Bhutan to take part in the Kings Cup with hopes of playing the final of the nine-club tournament but they have left behind coach Jakaria Babu and goalkeeper Aminul Haque.

"It is the first time that BJMC, a government organisation, is going outside the country to play a football tournament. Our target is to reach the semifinals first and then think of the final," said captain Amit Khan Shuvro at a press conference yesterday.

About the absence of coach Babu and Aminul, director of BJMC Arif Khan Joy said, "The coach is sick and not able to walk. The assistant coach will act as head coach. Aminul is not in our plans next season, so we are thinking of existing goalkeeper Himel instead of Aminul."

Team BJMC will start their campaign taking on Thimphu City FC on July 23 after another Bangladeshi side, Arambagh KS, play the opening match of the nineclub tournament against Yeedzin FC tomorrow.
