The Obama administration has cranked up the pressure on Bangladesh to improve its worker safety standards, a condition to win back trade benefits from the United States.

The US on Friday made public a series of steps the country must take, and foremost among them is the need to increase the number of labour, fire and building inspectors and establish clear procedures for effective factory inspections. The steps are not time-bound.

On June 27, the US suspended the country's trade benefits under the Generalised System of Preferences (GSP) due to Bangladesh's "insufficient" progress in affording internationally recognised labour rights to the workers.

Party chief urged to replace 'inactive' leaders, talkers

Criticising the role of Awami League General Secretary Syed Ashraful Islam in party affairs, AL advisers yesterday suggested that party chief Sheikh Hasina replace him with a senior leader who has close contact with the grassroots.

They also recommended taking necessary steps to strengthen the organisation by replacing other "inactive" leaders and resolving internal feuds at all levels of the party ahead of the next general election.

The suggestions came at a meeting of the Awami League Advisory Council at Gono Bhaban, with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in the chair. Speaking at the meeting, some advisers condemned several ministers for their "excessive" talking, said meeting sources.

Telenor Group has contradicted Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in what she was quoted to have said that the Norwegian telecom company had lobbied for Prof Muhammad Yunus and even donated a huge sum to the Clinton Foundation to help him win the Nobel Peace Prize.

She made the remarks on July 11 at a meeting with party leaders, lawmakers and ministers at her official residence Gono Bhaban.

"While we believe the honourable prime minister must have been misquoted on this occasion, we still wish to clarify any misunderstandings related to the issue," said Sigve Brekke, executive vice-president of the group, in a letter to
