
British newspapers reported after the Sydney match that United are prepared to increase their offer to lure former Arsenal playmaker Fabregas to Old Trafford.

Moyes, whose squad were due to fly to Tokyo on Sunday for the next leg of their pre-season tour, confirmed last week that a formal offer, in the region of 26 million pounds, had been lodged for Fabregas.

With United due to face Yokohama F. Marinos in Japan on Tuesday, Moyes said he was delighted with the form of Danny Welbeck and Jesse Lingard in the emphatic win over the A-League All Stars.

Welbeck and Lingard scored twice and Dutch ace Robin van Persie added the icing with United's fifth goal minutes from fulltime after coming on as a second-half sub-

"To get Robin back on and get him started was good, but I think it was impressive that Danny got a couple of goals. I said to him that on another night he might have scored four or five goals," Moyes said.

As the field set off from Versailles, Froome will be roared on several thousand miles away by the man who first initiated him into the sport.

Back in Kenya, David Kinjah, Froome's first cycling coach, saluted his one-time protege's progress.

For the last three weeks Kinjah has been following Froome in arguably the world's most gruelling sporting event after buying a satellite television package and recording every stage of the

Recalling how they trained together, mountain biking in the rural highlands north of Nairobi, Kinjah admitted he is delighted to see Froome produce such a dominant display on the sport's biggest stage.

"Even though we don't see each other so much any more he has lived my dreams. He is wearing the yellow

jersey every day and I almost felt like I was wearing it myself," Kinjah told BBC Radio Five Live's Sportsweek programme.

"He was like one of us, our brother. He was just funny and happy, a white boy who accepted our village and ate our food."

Kinjah also shed light on the famed Froome stamina.

"He would want to complete each and every training ride and he wouldn't stop. If he decided he wanted to complete the whole 100km he would do exactly that," he said.

"No matter how much pain or how many hours he went through he would keep riding to the end."

That ability has led to raised eyebrows in cycling circles with some speculating that Froome is just the latest in the long line of cyclists using banned substances.

Heynckes's no to Barca job



Treble-winning coach Jupp Heynckes has poured cold water on speculation linking him to the vacant Barcelona job as the ex-Bayern Munich boss insisted he is enjoying his retirement.

The 68-year-old steered Bayern to become the first German club to win the treble of Champions League, Bundesliga and German Cup last season as

the Bavarian giants swept aside all rivals. Heynckes stepped down as Bayern coach following his history-making feat but has said he has no interest in replacing Tito Vilanova,

who resigned as Barcelona coach on Friday. "I think now it would be impossible to take on a new club after my time at Bayern Munich," Heynckes told Germany's Sky Sports News.

"I keep myself busy, I have hobbies, I do some sports, I have my pets and a huge garden to keep me occupied."

With Vilanova, 44, walking away from the Barca job to continue cancer treatment, a poll in the Spanish media put Heynckes top of the potential list of candidates.

But after a career spanning half a century as a player then coach, which saw Heynckes steer both Real Madrid and Bayern to Champions League victories, the German has said enough is enough.

"Who will be the coach? I don't know, I have nothing to do with it."

Meanwhile, it was learnt that former Barcelona B team coach Luis Enrique has emerged as the favourite to become the Catalan club's new first-team manager after Tito Vilanova's decision to step down, with Gerardo Martino, the coach of the Argentinian side Newell's Old Boy coach also among those that have been contacted.

Luis Enrique became manager of Celta Vigo less than six weeks ago and Barcelona would be obliged to pay €3m (£2.6m) to release him.

Iran bars captain's **UAE** transfer

Iran has barred national football team captain Javad Nekounam's lucrative transfer to a club in neighbouring UAE because of a dispute over a name, media reports said on Sunday.

Nekounam, 32, who captained Iran in qualifying for the 2014 World Cup finals in Brazil, visited the United Arab Emirates earlier in the week to finalise a deal with newlypromoted club Sharjah.

But the move -- reportedly worth more than two million dollars -- has been blocked by Iranian authorities, Iran's football federation chief Ali Kafashian said, quoted by Fars news agency.

"We had to stop him from joining the Emirati league," Kafashian said, adding that Nekounam would be compensated with an unspecified amount which "we will ask the president (Mahmoud Ahmadinejad) to allocate."

He did not elaborate why Nekounam had been "denied permission" to join Sharjah, but Iranian media said the decision was taken to stop the veteran international from playing in the UAE's newly-renamed "Arabian Gulf League," a rebranding which has stirred tensions.

The Second Asian Youth Games (AYG) this year will be held in Nanjing, the capital of Jiangsu province in eastern China, after the inaugural edition was organised in Singapore in 2009. Four years ago, the hosts and the Olympic Council of Asia were forced to reduce the number of sports to nine because of time and resource constraints. But there is no such fear this time around as Nanjing has got the time it requires to be ready for such big international event.

The Chinese officials however prefer, although they have got enough time and 'can afford to spend lavishly', to organise these Games rather in an economical style. Compared to the 13.6 billion yuan China spent on the Guangzhou Asian Games in 2010,

a budget of only 1 billion yuan for the AYG is indeed meagre. But, Yang Weize, the secretary of

the Communist Party of China's Nanjing Municipal Committee and the executive chairman of the Games' organising committee, has his own points about the low-key budget. "Keeping the expenses in control

has been our primary objective," Yang told a group of journalists from 13 Asian countries at the Nanjing City Hall recently. "At the same time we aim to provide good service so as to make the Games sustainable." He explained how the organis-

ers were following the cost-cutting measures. "No new venues will be built if old ones can be renovated. No new facilities will be purchased if old ones can be repaired. No equipment will be bought if it can be rented, and they won't be rented if they can be borrowed."
