PREVENTING CHILD DEATHS

Unicef lauds Bangladesh

The United Nations children's agency on Monday commended the Bangladesh government for its commitment to end preventable child deaths in the country before 2035, building on its success of lowering maternal and child mortality.

"There's a lot to learn from Bangladesh. Between 1991 and 2011, under-five deaths fell by almost 75 percent, thanks, in part, to its commitment to innovation and knowledge-sharing," UN Children's Fund (Unicef) Executive Director Anthony Lake said in a news release.

"The challenge now is to achieve high levels of coverage of existing and new interventions, such as vaccinations and skilled birth attendants, by targeting the poorest populations where infant and child mortality remain high," Lake About 60 percent of child deaths in Bangladesh happen

during the first 28 days of birth, mostly due to birth asphyxia, neonatal infections, prematurity and complications at birth, according to the Unicef. Taking effective steps to counter neonatal deaths is a

"challenge", the news release said, as 71 percent of deliveries in the country still take place at home.

In addition, the main reasons for deaths of children under the age of five are pneumonia, drowning and SEE PAGE 2 COL 5

Forced hiring hits project operation

Interference of local influential people, including a ruling Awami League leader, is hindering the operation of a government energy project in Ashuganj, say its officials.

The \$136 million project to build a gas compressor station was awarded last year to Korean Hyundai Engineering Company Ltd by the Gas Transmission Company Ltd, a

Petrobangla concern.

The problem began in December 2012 when Hyundai sub-contractor Pipelines Engineering Ltd (Peal) deputed to the project its engineers and supporting staff for mechanical and electrical works.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR POLLS

EC high-ups in the dark

The Election Commission has drafted an amendment to the electoral code of conduct, but surprisingly enough, its highups are "in the dark" about the draft.

"We've not yet seen the draft of the amendment. But some newspapers have run reports on it. We will make comments on the draft only after looking at it," Chief Election Commissioner Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmad told newsmen at the EC secretariat yesterday.

As per a provision of the draft amendment, if the general election is held under a partisan government, the ruling party chief and its 20 leaders (picked by the party chief) would enjoy the privilege to lead electioneering across the country.

This means that the provision would allow Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina along with 20 other ministers or state ministers or AL leaders join the polls campaign without resigning from their posts, if the premier continues as the Awami League chief.

The CEC expressed his ignorance about the progress of the draft amendment. He also denied holding any meeting on the draft.
