Dhaka's doom in DAP failure

Tragedies like the Rana Plaza collapse loom large over the capital, as the government is yet to implement vital recommendations in the Detailed Area Plan (DAP), say experts.

"Structural and industrial disasters may occur further, as development has taken place defying the authorised land use plan," said Prof Jamilur Reza Choudhury, who headed the DAP expert body.

The nine-storey Rana Plaza at Savar, on the outskirts of the capital, collapsed on April 24 this year, killing 1,132 people, mostly garment workers. It was built without the approval required under building construction law.

Besides, a fire at a chemical factory in the capital's Nimtali residential neighbourhood claimed 125 lives in 2010, while a deadly blaze at Tazreen Fashions in Ashulia killed 112 workers in 2012.

Jamilur Reza said thousands of industrial units and other structures have been built on the outskirts of the capital, like in Savar, Ashulia, Turag, Tongi, Demra, Rupganj, Keraniganj and parts of Gazipur and Narayanganj, flouting the rules of land use. This happened due mainly to slack monitoring by the Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk), which attributed its failure to do the job properly to lack of manpower.

Easy, safe also for criminals

Kidnappers, extortionists rely on mobile money transaction; Rab gets up to 12 complaints a day

Mobile money transfer has become a way for kidnappers and extortionists to get money as the electronic fund transfer system lacks the means to verify identities of account holders.

Criminals can register with popular mobile money transfer services like bKash or Dutch-Bangla Bank Ltd with an unregistered mobile number and a fake national ID card, kidnap a person and ask for the ransom to be sent via such mobile financial services.

Law enforcers, Bangladesh Bank and

mobile money transfer operators have detected several such cases.

Lt Col Ziaul Hassan, chief of Rab's intelligence wing, said the force gets 10 to 12 complaints of this sort from across the country every day, mostly SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

Shariful Islam, a businessman, was doped by such a gang last month and he lay unconscious for nearly two and a half days after eating some sweets on a bus. He was robbed of Tk 1 lakh he had withdrawn from a bank.

The Detective Branch of police, which investigated the case he had filed with Uttara East Police Station, arrested 10 members of a gang at different parts of the capital on Friday night.

Monirul Islam, joint commissioner of Dhaka Metropolitan Police, yesterday told a press briefing about the arrests, noting that such gangs usually become more active before festivals, especially Eid-ul-Fitr.

Dipu Moni returns empty-handed

India had made no commitment over the land boundary agreement and the Teesta water-sharing deal that had been the reasons behind her visit.

Influential Indian Bangla daily Anandabazar Patrika in its yesterday's issue published a report headlined "Dipu returning home empty-handed".

"If the deals aren't signed, it'll surely be frustrating," Dipu Moni was quoted to have said.

She, however, told the newspaper that the people of Bangladesh would understand and that they had seen no such initiatives by the previous governments to settle the matters.

"These are not today's issues. These have been pending for decades."

"Our store is packed with Eid shoppers. We couldn't be more pleased," said Mohammad Ismail, a salesman at Additta Trading, a womenswear store at Eastern Mollika Shopping Complex.

Thanks to the widespread popularity of Indian TV serials, Indian saris, which cost between Tk 3,000-6,500 apiece, are

selling like hot cakes, he said. "The local jamdanis and taants are also selling well,
