Two killed in landslide

They defied repeated warnings by the authorities and ended up being buried alive even as they slept, when a downpour triggered a landslide in Chittagong city early yesterday.

Some 30 to 35 families seem unperturbed by the tragic deaths of Fatema Begum, 38, and her daughter Kusum Akhter, 15, of Comilla, in the landslide as they are still living at a slum in Tankir Pahar.

The mother and daughter had been working at a garment factory and living in a rented shanty at the slum in one of the foothills in Tankir Pahar. Yesterday, they slept off after taking sehri, said Shahanaj,

one of their neighbours. "Around 5:00am, I heard a noise and asked them to move out of their room as a heavy downpour was continuing since midnight. Right then a chunk of earth fell on the

Amir Hossain, son of Md Akbar, had built the slum by cutting a hill at an angle of 90 degrees, local people said. The correspondent there found some 30 to 35 tin-roofed houses rented out to people from the low income group, like rickshaw-pullers, domestic workers, garment workers and day

Fatima was one of Amir's tenants.

The hill on the top has some 20 tin-roofed houses built by Md Belayet, a traffic policeman, the residents said.

The deaths took place amid a campaign by the district administration asking people to move to safety from the

Country rain-struck

Torrential rain caused immense sufferings to people yesterday, covering many areas in the capital in ankle- to knee-deep water and flooding the low-lying parts in some other districts.

The downpour that began at midnight on Saturday in the capital and adjoining areas stopped around midday yesterday. In other districts, it would continue to rain for two more days due to a low over Gangetic West Bengal, said a Met official.

A total of 122 millimetres of rainfall was recorded in the 24 hours till 6:00am Sunday, while 32 millimetres of rainfall were recorded from 6:00am to 12:00pm yesterday in Dhaka, said a senior observer of the Bangladesh Meteorological Department.

Commuters from lowlying areas in the capital have been greatly inconvenienced by water logging as many streets and alleys

Even in the month of Ramadan, the use of formalin and other harmful chemicals in fruits, vegetables and other food items continues unabated. An environmental group has

recently tested 254 samples collected from over a hundred shops in the capital, and found formalin in 82 percent mangoes, 91 percent bananas and 100 percent grapefruits.

HC kept in wait

Police chief given time again

Not even the High Court's repeated expressions of disappointment could make powerful public and private organisations respond in time to its directives in the public litigation case relating to last year's Tazreen Fashions fire.

Anthropologists Naznin Akter Banu, Saydia Gulrukh Kamal and Mahmudul Hasan Sumon filed the litigation on April 28, seeking directives on the government to arrest Tazreen owner Md Delwar Hossain to ensure his trial for criminal liabilities.

The HC bench of Justice Quazi Reza-Ul Hoque and Justice ABM Altaf Hossain has been dealing with this case since May and at every proceeding, it had to struggle to get reports from government or

private organisations.

The deadliest factory fire in the nation's history burned to death at least 112 garment workers and injured many others at the Ashulia-based Tazreen Fashions on November 24 last year.

After repeated directives for over a month, the law officer submitted the home ministry probe report on June 19, although it was prepared in December and the ministry is just a 20-minute walk from the court.

Also on June 19, the HC directed the labour ministry and Bangladesh Garment Manufactures and Exporters Association (BGMEA) to submit separate reports on the compensation disbursed to the fire victims. Now electricity from Indian private sector

Govt fixes rate; price double that of state's

Dhaka is going to purchase 250 megawatts of electricity from an Indian private power company at almost twice the price suggested in the Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) signed between the two countries early last year.

The cabinet committee on public purchase yesterday approved buying the power at a rate of Tk 6.34 per kilowatt hour (each unit). However, the indicative price in the PPA

was set at Tk 3.40 for purchasing per unit power.

India's state-owned National Thermal Power Company (NTPC) offered the same indicative price to Bangladesh for purchasing another 250 MW power.

A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between the two countries in 2010 regarding import of a total of 500 MW power from India.
