TAREK, SHOOTOUT Rab continues to confuse

Rab has made a fresh, confusing claim that Jahid Siddique Tarek had suffered bullet injuries in the back during the killing of Jubo League leader Riazul Haque Khan Milky.

Talking to The Daily Star, Rab-1 Commanding Officer Kismat Hayat yesterday said Tarek had been hit by a bullet when his cohorts opened fire to ensure Milky's death before Shoppers World in the capital's Gulshan on Tuesday.

On Tuesday and Wednesday, two top Rab officials told this paper that Tarek had been hit in the abdomen during the killing of Milky. Other newspapers, quoting Rab officials, reported that Tarek was hit in the leg.

Ban not on govt's plan

Ministers and Awami League leaders may keep echoing the popular demand for banning Jamaat-e-Islami, but the government is unlikely to ban the party in the existing political reality.

The government will instead wait for the Appellate Division's disposal of Jamaat's appeal against the High Court verdict that on Thursday declared illegal the party's registration with the Election Commission.

According to a number of ministers and top AL leaders, it is for the Appellate Division to decide whether Jamaat can now contest the upcoming national polls, due between October and January.

Any executive move to ban the party before the Appellate Division's verdict will prove counterproductive and trigger fresh controversies. The opposition parties, including Jamaat, will in that case spread propaganda against the government and label the move as one against religionbased politics. This will harm the AL ahead of the election, they said.

One minister told The Daily Star that the AL-led government did not intend to ban religion-based politics. This is SEE PAGE 2 COL 4

Most SC judges not interested

Most Supreme Court judges have not disclosed their wealth statements, even two years after the then chief justice ABM Khairul Haque in 2011 had requested them to do so for the sake of transparency.

The Appellate Division of the SC has now nine judges, including Chief Justice Md Muzammel Hossain. The High Court Division -- the

other division of the SC -- has 90 judges. Lower court judges give their wealth statements every year in their

annual confidential reports to the SC, as it is mandatory for them.

THREAT UNSPECIFIED US embassy shut tomorrow

The US embassies and consulates in Bangladesh and some other countries will remain closed on Sunday due to an unspecified threat. A state department spokeswoman said

the order would apply to any embassy or consulate that is normally open on Sunday, reports BBC. Bangladesh, Bahrain, Israel, Jordan,

Kuwait, Libya, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Yemen, Afghanistan are among those to be affected by the closure.

Shortly after the announcement, the US issued a global travel alert because of an unspecified al-Qaeda threat.

In a statement, the state department said the potential for an attack was particularly strong in the Middle East and North

The alert expires on 31 August 2013, the department said. It recommended US citizens travelling abroad be vigilant. "Current information suggests that al-

Qa'ida and affiliated organisations continue to plan terrorist attacks both in the region and beyond, and that they may

Youths build monument

100 days after Rana Plaza disaster

A group of youths has built a monument at the site of Rana Plaza in Savar yesterday in memory of the victims of the worst industrial disaster of the country.

The youths, mostly students under several banners, called the monument "Protibade-Protirodhe" (in protest and in resistance). The simplistic monument is just two muscular hands, one holding a scythe and the other one holding a hammer. They are about 10 feet high.

The nine-storey Rana Plaza that housed five garment factories crumbled and collapsed on April 24 killing over 1,130 people and injuring thousands more. It took the army and local volunteers 20 days to rescue 2,438 people from the rubble. Eighty of them are undergoing treatment, according to government data.

While the worst industrial disaster of the country sent shockwaves and triggered international uproar about workers' safety, some families of the victims, labour organisations, civil society members and
