Ominous draft cleared by govt

☑Arrest without warrant ☑ 14-year jail
☑Non-bailable

The cabinet yesterday approved the draft of the ICT (Amendment) Ordinance-2013 proposing to empower law enforcers to arrest any person without warrant and increase the highest punishment to 14 years.

In the original Information and Communication Technology (ICT) Act-2006, enacted by the BNP-Jamaat government, the maximum punishment was 10 years' jail term and a fine of Tk 1 crore.

And police had to seek permission from the authorities concerned to file a case and arrest any person involved in crimes covered under the law.

The amendments, okayed in a regular cabinet meeting, envisage a minimum jail term of seven years. In the original act, termed by many a repressive law, offences were bail-

able. Now they have been made non-bailable, meaning the bail is at the judge's discretion.

"Some crimes were non-cognisable under the existing act," Cabinet

Secretary M Musharraf Hossain told reporters after the meeting at the Bangladesh Secretariat.

"But the new act will make those cognisable. [That means] the police will

be able to arrest a suspect without issuing of warrant [by the court]. But they will have to produce the arrested person before the court within 24 hours."

He said the cabinet had asked the ICT ministry to bring further changes

Completion of genome mappings of both tossa and deshi (white) genera of jute and that of the plant's enemy -- a deadly fungus -- by Bangladeshi geneticists in consecutive three years is a great feat in itself.

Khaleda slams PM's remark on polls-time govt

Staff Correspondent will not be able to control the situation

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia has urged the Awami League-led government to restore the caretaker government system at the upcoming parliamentary session in order to avoid people's wrath.

Speaking at a rally at Suhrawardy Udyan in the capital, she said that if voted to power at the next polls, her party would "introduce a new trend in running the government and practise politics of unity, not division".

Khaleda, the leader of the opposition, slammed Hasina over her Sunday remark that she would not budge an inch from the current constitutional provision for holding the next parliamentary polls.

"You said you will not move even by a hair's breadth. But such a wind will rise through people's movement that your hair will be blown away. You will not be able to control the situation and your existence will be at stake," she said, referring to Hasina's comment.

She called upon the government to create a level-playing field by restoring the provision for a non-partisan polls-time government to test its popularity.

"Let's see who gets more votes. What are you

afraid of? Why are you unwilling to restore the caretaker government system?" she questioned.

The BNP chief also asked her party leaders and

supporters to prepare for launching an agitation against the government.

Swechchhasebak Dal, the volunteers' wing of the BNP, organised yesterday's rally to mark its 33rd founding anniversary.

Khaleda launched a blistering attack on the ALled government and portrayed a gloomy picture of the country during its tenure.

LAND BOUNDARY AGREEMENT

Delhi fails again to place bill

Trinamool, AGP block move in Rajya Sabha

Indian government's efforts to place a constitution amendment bill in Rajya Sabha to ratify the land boundary agreement (LBA) with Bangladesh failed yesterday, with lawmakers of Trinamool Congress and Asom Gana Parishad (AGP) scuttling the move.

Backed by Trinamool members, Birendra Prasad Baishya of AGP thronged the well of the House and opposed the bill as soon as External Affairs Minister Salman Khurshid rose to introduce it in the upper house of

Indian parliament.

The Constitution (119th Amendment) Bill, 2013, is intended to give effect to an exchange of enclaves adversely held by India and Bangladesh.

Due to the uproar, Khurshid could not move the bill and Rajya Sabha Deputy Chairman PJ Kurien adjourned the House for 10 minutes at 2:00pm.

After the House reassembled, Kurien said the bill would be taken up some time later and wanted to discuss other issues listed by the Rajya Sabha.

Tk 2,885cr stuck in anomalies

Finds CAG inspection

Agrani Bank is mired in losses of Tk 2,885 crore for its reckless lending practices, auditors found recently.

The inspection, conducted by the Office of Comptroller and Auditor General (OCAG) at the state-run bank's head office from May to July, found that some of the funds might never be recouped.

The bank has a hole of Tk 416.85 crore in its books from its failure to recover the amount it invested in "buyback shares" of Unique Hotel and

Agrani parted with Tk 300 crore at the time of

purchase and the companies were supposed to repurchase the shares after one year at 20 percent interest.

The transaction, however, never took place, said the audit report. The shares' value as of December 31 last year stood at Tk 271.34 crore.

So far, the three companies paid only Tk 7.29 crore of the interest amounts of Tk 124.14 crore, meaning a total of Tk 416.85 crore is pending, the report said.

Moreover, the bank could not adjust the outstanding amount by selling in the stockmarket, as SEE PAGE 10 COL 6
