TCB to sell onion for Tk 47 per kg from today

UNB, Dhaka

The Trading Corporation of Bangladesh (TCB) will start selling onion in Dhaka and elsewhere in the country from today for Tk 47 per kilogram.

The first consignment of 100 metric tonnes of onion has already arrived in Dhaka from India, TCB spokesman Humayun Kabir told the news agency last night.

In Dhaka city, he said, the onion will be sold in 35 trucks. The TCB is also planning to import onion from Myanmar, he added.


Man stabbed to death in Sylhet

Govt plans permanent pay commission: PM

UNB, Dhaka

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said the government has a plan to form a permanent pay commission to increase salaries and allowances of the government officials and employees regularly considering the inflation.

Hasina was addressing a function after inaugurating the newly-built 150-bed government employees' hospital at Fulbaria in the capital. The Department of Housing and Public Works implemented the project at a cost of Tk 46.76 crore.

The prime minister said if voted to power again, her government would ensure services to the common people in future through decentralisation.

She, however, reminded that the government officials and employees have much more responsibility in this regard and asked them to discharge their duties sincerely towards ensuring overall welfare and development of the country.

Emphasising continuity of the democratic process and economic emancipation, Hasina said the public servants would have to work with utmost sincerity to this end.

She mentioned that her government works with the mentality of serving people. Many works still remained incomplete, she said, expressing her strong resolve to complete those if they assume office again.

Expressing that the government's efforts towards ensuring welfare of the government employees would continue, the prime minister said the newly-built hospital, having the foundation of 16-storey, has now been primarily built to four-storey.

The government has a plan to turn this

into a medical college with 300-bed hospital alongside introduction of different departments, she said. Hasina said the government is positively

considering the demands of the govern-

ment officials and employees of the secretariat and deputy commissioner's offices at field-level. "So far, many of their demands have been implemented and the government is sincerely working to implement their other logical demands. In this connection, she said that work on the formulation of the Public Service Bill, 2013 is at the final stage to make public administration more efficient, dynamic and time befitting. Highlighting various efforts and suc-

cesses of the government in the health sector, the prime minister said a project is awaiting approval for constructing multistorey buildings for the government officials at Azimpur and Motijheel government colonies while the construction work of 10storey residential buildings for the officials is going on in Mohammadpur and Segunbagicha in the capital.

Besides, she said, the construction work for building some 488 flats is going on in Sher-e-Bangla Nagar for the officials and employees of the Parliament Secretariat.

The government has also undertaken a Tk 267.73 crore project to build a 30-storey building at Dilkusha in the capital to create a permanent source of income for the Bangladesh Employees Welfare Board, she said.

coordination among the managers in Noakhali, Comilla and Sylhet with respect to the timetables of the inter-district buses. The managers can only recommend where counters can be placed and that must be approved by the deputy general manager (DGM) (operations), BRTC Sylhet Depot Manager

Nure Alam told The Daily Star recently. The head office is the sole authority with respect to allowing counters, he said, adding that persons interested in running the counters on commission have to apply with the DGM and get an approval.

6 including ETV engineer killed in road accidents





FROM PAGE 5 "I've heard for the last 15 years that a concrete bridge would be built there, but haven't seen any effort to date," he told The Daily Star.

The Nanaia-Nanaiar Char bridge is just 200 metres from the Dhaka-Sylhet bypass, said Naser Ahmed, a retired government employee. If it is turned into a concrete bridge, thousands of villagers will see a new way of communication, he added.

As the shaky bridges are unfit for use by the motorised vehicles, even rickshaws, villagers trading with the suburban areas have to walk long distances carrying their loads on shoulders or head. In some cases, accidents occur when the bridges are damaged.Six months ago, a teacher of Kaliganj-Narun High School got injured after

the 30-foot high Nanaia-Nanaiar Char bridge partly collapsed with his motorcy-

cle, said Naser.

Sreepur Uapzila Engineer Abdur Razzak said the local lawmaker usually got the bridge projects approved after locals applied for these based on demand and necessity. Sreepur Upazila Parishad

Chiarman Iqbal Hossain Sabuj said he had applied to the disaster management and relief ministry three times for replacing the Marta-Martar Char bridge with a concrete one, but never got any response.

In this regard, the local lawmaker advocate Rahmat Ali said he would take necessary steps if locals placed the demand, informing him of the due importance of the bridges.

On sensitive cases, a media advisory can help news managers be more careful so that reports do not contribute to children's vulnerability, they added.

Journalists have to be mindful of the consequences of the story. Reporters, news editors and the last gatekeepers have to apply their conscience and sense of fair judgment before publishing/airing a report, they said. Media houses, except for

a few, have no specific code of ethics of their own, the roundtable participants observed, adding that such a code or guideline was very important.


