Ready again

Army rebuilds 19 damaged temples; PM inaugurates Sept 3

The 19 Buddhist temples that were torched or vandalised by religious fanatics in Cox's Bazar in last September have been reconstructed and renovated.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina is to inaugurate the temples on September 3, said Ruhul Amin, deputy commissioner of Cox's Bazar.

Islamist fanatics attacked Buddhist homes and temples in Ramu and Ukhia in a two-day mayhem on September 29-30 last year, following a fake Facebook post that demeaned the Quran.

It all began on the evening of September 29, after a cer-

tain quarter tagged a local Buddhist boy with the doctored photo. The Daily Star in its own investigation had found that the photo was then printed and spread in and around Ramu by

the quarter to help gather a big crowd and instigate violence. The Engineering Corps of 17 ECB Battalion of Bangladesh Army in Cox's Bazar has done the reconstruction and renovation of the temples while the Border Guard Bangladesh has rebuilt the homes. The jobs were completed last month.

Polls in January? It's a drama

A few AL leaders try to convince govt about constitution change

A section of leaders and lawmakers of ruling Awami League-led alliance have begun to persuade the government to amend the constitution for holding the next general elections after the current parliament completes its five-year term in January 2014.

According to the constitution, the election must be held within 90 days before the tenure of the parliament expires. So the next general polls need to held between October 25 and January 24.

But in case the parliament is dissolved before October 25 the election must be held within 90 days after that.

The provision was introduced by amending the constitution in June 2011, replacing the previous one that had allowed polls within 90 days after the parliament's dissolution. It did not matter if the parliament's tenure was over or not.

The alliance leaders in favour of holding the polls after January 24 are saying the delay will increase chances of reaching a consensus among SEE PAGE 10 COL 6

Govt to challenge it next month

The government is set to take steps next month for the hearing of two appeals to cancel a High Court verdict that declared the Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT) Regional Council illegal and unconstitutional.

Additional Attorney General Murad Reza told The Daily Star that his office will place arguments before the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for cancelling the verdict after it reopens on September 15.

The HC had made "a lot of errors" in the judgment, he said, without elaborating on what the errors were.

The HC delivered the verdict on April 13, 2010, following two separate writ petitions. However, the SC stayed the verdict two days later so that the council could continue operations.

Petitioners' counsel barrister Belayet Hossain said the appeals against the verdict should be disposed of expeditiously, as they deal with serious legal and constitutional issues, including development of the CHT, political SEE PAGE 10 COL 5

KL plans biggest crackdown on illegal workers

Malaysia will launch what local media yesterday called its "biggest ever" crackdown on an estimated half a million illegal foreign workers, as a crime wave focused the nation's attention on security.

Under the three-month operation to begin on Sunday, authorities would seek to deport some 500,000 foreigners, mostly from the country's vast and less-developed neighbour Indonesia, Immigration Department Director General Alias Ahmad said.

The operation would involve 135,000 personnel led by the department, he was quoted by The Star newspaper as saying. Southeast Asia's third-largest economy is a magnet for

migrant workers from poorer neighbours Indonesia, Bangladesh, Mynamar, Vietnam, Nepal and elsewhere, who fill low-paid construction, factory and plantation jobs. Normally laid-back Malaysia has been on edge over


