

David Frost no more

British broadcasting great David Frost has died of a heart attack, his family said in a statement yesterday. He was 74.

Frost, celebrated for his revealing interviews with former US president Richard Nixon, died Saturday after falling ill on board the Queen Elizabeth cruise liner.

"His family are devastated and ask for privacy at this difficult time," the statement said. "A family funeral will be

held in the near future and details of a memorial service will be announced in due course." Frost's list of interview-

ees, from presidents and prime ministers to royalty and show-business celebrities, was expansive. On the surface, Frost's

interviewing style could come across as soft, but the friendly veneer allowed him to extract intriguing information with more blunt questions.

37 Bangladeshis among detained

At least 37 Bangladeshis are among those detained in Malaysia during a nationwide crackdown on illegal immigrants yesterday, reports Malaysian state news agency Barnama.

Saravana Kumar, a deputy director at the Immigration Department of Malaysia, said around 1,000 migrant workers were detained from different provinces of the country during the crackdown.

The security personnel detained 403

foreigners from Melaka, 130 from Sungai Petani, 101 from Johor Baharu and 12 from Kampar for entering Malaysia without valid documents and overstaying, the news agency said.

A local man was also detained for harbouring the illegals.

Malaysian English daily The Star said in a report the crackdown launched by the immigration department, police, armed forces, civil defence and national registration department is the biggest ever drive against SEE PAGE 10 COL 5

5 charge sheets Mueen, Ashraf were killers of intellectuals

Prof Anisuzzaman testifies at war tribunal

Eminent educationist Prof Anisuzzaman yesterday testified that the plot to kill the intellectuals was hatched in August and was executed by infamous Al-Badr force in December 1971 in an attempt to cripple the soon-to-be-independent Bangladesh.

Chowdhury Mueen Uddin, operationin-charge of Al-Badr, and Ashrafuzzaman Khan, chief executor of the Pakistani auxiliary force, were involved in the execution of the plan, the 76-year-old professor told the International Crimes Tribunal-2.

The Professor Emeritus of Dhaka

University, also 20th prosecution witness in the case against alleged Al-Badr leaders Mueen and Ashraf, cited victims' family members and newspaper reports to substantiate his testimony.

Mueen and Ashraf, now abroad, are facing 11 charges for their alleged involvement in the killings of 18 intellectuals in the last week of the nine-month-long Liberation War.

During his 50-minuter testimony, Anisuzzaman said he had worked at the Bangla department at Chittagong University in 1971 and after the crackdown SEE PAGE 10 COL 7

UZ chairman killed as AL factions clash

An upazila chairman was killed and 10 others were injured in an intra-party clash in Dhubaura upazila of Mymensingh yesterday.

The deceased, Forkan Uddin Mridha alias Pahari Selim, 40, was chairman of Dhubaura upazila and secretary of the upazila unit Awami League.

It all started following a programme organised to mark the upgrading of the 30-bed Dhubaura Upazila Health Complex to a 50-bed one. When the secretary of Gamaritala union AL, Azizul Haque Khan, tried to enter a venue at Panchanandapur where "VIP guests" were having lunch around 2:00pm, Mridha and his cohorts obstructed him, said local sources. At one stage, Mridha's brother Majnu beat up Azizul Haque.
