ATIQUE ANAM from Kathmandu



A 93rd minute free-kick from Indian skipper Sunil Chhetri robbed Bangladesh of a muchdeserved victory against India in their crucial Group A match of the 10th SAFF Championship at the Halchowk Stadium in Kathmandu yesterday. The free kick, which resulted after a feeble challenge

from substitute midfielder Mamunul Islam on Chhetri at the edge of the box, was curled over the wall, and into the near corner of the net, beating goalkeeper Mamun Khan who was guarding the far post. The goal cancelled the 83rd minute strike from Bangladesh defender Atiqur Rahman Meshu and severely dented Bangladesh's chances of progression from the group stages.

After two matches, Bangladesh remain at the bottom of the table with a single point, along with Pakistan who however have a better goal difference after drawing 1-1 against hosts Nepal in the second match yesterday. India and Nepal have four points each.

To progress Bangladesh will need to beat Pakistan by a big margin in their last match on Thursday and hope that the match between Nepal and India on the same day produces a big-margin win for either team.

Yesterday's was a match of two halves. The first half belonged to India, who profited from some nervous defending and missed passes from Bangladesh to launch a number of attacks. The Bangladesh backline, made up of Nasiruddin Chowdhury, Atiqur Rahman Meshu, Wali Faisal and Ashraf Mahmud Linkon, was under severe pressure from the

Indian midfield and was split open quite a few times. But thanks to some wayward finishing from Chhetri, Je Je Lalpekhula and winger Francisco Fernandes in particular, Bangladesh went for the breather unscathed.

Bangladesh gradually gained confidence and took control in the midfield, with Omar Faruk Babu playing a key role in the buildup. The two wings -- Taklish Ahmed on the left and Mobarak Hossain, who started in the right wing in place of Zahid Hossain, were penetrative with their skill and speed. Zahid Hasan Emily was the lone forward dropping into a deeper position to complement the two wingers.

Most of the attacks that Bangladesh created came from Mobarak as he dribbled past the defenders quite a few times but could not find either Emily or Takllish at the end of the ball. The coach took a gamble and sent on Mamunul in the 80th minute, and it immediately paid off. Mamunul's first touch was a corner which was headed off by a defender for another corner. The resulting corner was curled towards the middle of the box by Mamunul which was headed back to the path of Meshu, who blasted the ball at the back of the net to give Bangladesh the lead.

Having taken the lead Bangladesh tried to keep possession, but endured a few nervy moments towards the end, as India desperately looked for an equaliser. But India seemed destined to their first defeat against Bangladesh in ten years, until the last thirty seconds when the slightest of challenges from Mamunul inspired the Sri Lankan referee to blow the whistle for a free-kick. Chhetri made sure that he made the most of that lucky break.

Mamunul, who came off the bench in the 81st minute of the match to make an instant impact by sourcing the goal before being involved in the tackle which gave his inconsolable players from the

"If it was a foul, it should have been a penalty kick because I came

into contact with the Indian player inside the box. But it was not a foul at all and we have been dealt a harsh blow," said Mamunul, who took two injections to his knee to be match-fit.

India coach Wim Koevermans declined to comment on the refereeing but said his side should have won the match in the first half. "I don't comment on refereeing. But I think it was a foul and we should have killed the match in the first half," said the Dutchman at the post-match press conference.

De Kruif said will try to motivate 'double hammer blow' in time for the match against Pakistan on Thursday, a must-win for Bangladesh.

Unique breakfast gift

Maldives coach Istavan Urbanyi startled everyone during the team's breakfast in the morning when he stooped before star striker Ali Ashfaq and crawled 2013 Kathmandu, Nepal towards him before taking off the striker's shoes. And

then the Hungarian coach himself replaced them with a new pair of boots. The bemused teammates of Ashfaq clapped and cheered to show their admiration for their captain and the gesture by the coach.

The day before, Ashfaq had set a unique record, scoring six goals in the Red Snappers' 10-0 bashing of Sri Lanka -- both are new regional records. That feat also made him the highest scorer in the SAFF Championship history, taking

him two past Indian IM Vijayan, who held the record thus far with 12 goals. The celebration on the field was unique too as the ginger-haired striker performed a double somersault after completing his double hattrick.

Ashfaq said he was ecstatic with having scored six goals, but he had even better goal-scoring record in club football.

"I have scored 12 goals in a match in the Maldives Premier League. But as much yesterday's goals gave me pleasure, these were not my best goals. My best goal is the one that I scored for Radiant FC against Indonesian club Persibo Bojonegoro in the AFC Cup earlier this year. I scored that goal dribbling past three defenders," said the striker while talking to reporters after the breakfast surprise yesterday.

The striker has been a prolific scorer

both at club and national levels. Debuting at a tender age of 18, Ashfaq became the captain at 23 and scored in four of the five SAFF Championships so far. He has scored 32 goals in 38 appearances for his country, a national record, and more than 300 goals in his country He is so popular among the Maldivian football lovers that they like to call him 'Dhagandey' or 'Man of Steel'.

The 27-year-old striker had urged on his countrymen to support them as the 12th man so that they can become champions for the second time. "We came here to win the tournament and be with us as the 12th player. InshaAllah we will win the tournament this time."

Going by the display Ashfaq put up on Monday, it will be no surprise if Maldives become the champions again, demolishing all their opponents.

Cox's Stadium to miss deadline

Bangladesh Cricket Board president Nazmul Hassan Papon has said that the stadium at Cox's Bazar, which has been named as Sheikh Kamal International Cricket Stadium and Sports Complex, will require around 15 more days than the ICC's September 30

deadline. Speaking to reporters during the foundation stone laying ceremony of the venue yesterday, he said, "We have to present the ground to the ICC by September 30. Having seen the progress of the stadium I feel that it should take around 15 more days than the actual deadline to complete all the work."

"We might therefore send a letter to the ICC asking for an extension," he added.

Earlier in the day Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina symbolically laid the foundation stone of the stadium from Ukhia.

The arena is expected to host the ICC Women's Twenty20 World Cup next year. The sports complex at the venue is an aspect that the BCB plans to work on after the world cup. As of now, the board aims to meet the ICC's requirements that would ensure the venue

to host the grand event. The stadium aims to be a nature-friendly sporting facility and has been dubbed as a 'green stadium'.

Federer fails once more

Roger Federer crashed out of the US Open in the fourth round on Monday while Rafael Nadal captured his 19th hardcourt win in a row to reach the

quarterfinals without having allowed a service break. Federer suffered a stunning upset at the hands of Spanish 19th seed Tommy Robredo, whose 7-6 (7/3), 6-3, 6-4 shocker was his first victory in 11 matches against the 17-time Grand Slam champion

and five-time US Open winner. Federer's failure, which came on the heels of a shock second-round Wimbledon exit, thwarted a potential quarterfinal match with 12-time Grand Slam winner Nadal in what would have been their first meeting on the New York hardcourts.

Instead, it will be Robredo in his first US Open quarterfinal against second-seeded countryman Nadal, who dispatched Germany's 22nd-seeded Philipp Kohlschreiber 6-7 (4/7), 6-4, 6-3, 6-1.

Spanish fourth seed David Ferrer reached his eighth consecutive Grand Slam quarterfinal, beating Serbian 18th seed Janko Tipsarevic 7-6 (7/2), 3-6, 7-5, 7-6 (7/3).

Ferrer will face French eighth seed Richard Gasquet, who outlasted 10th seed Milos Raonic 6-7 (4/7), 7-6 (7/4), 2-6, 7-6 (11/9), 7-5.

In the women's section life-long friends Roberta Vinci and Flavia Pennetta as well as Daniela Hantuchova reached the quarterfinals Monday to ensure five women over the age of 30 will be in the last eight.
