Speakers at a workshop yesterday identified lack of teachers and infrastructure, poor monitoring system, irregularities at education offices, and inactiveness of school management committees as major challenges in establishing good governance in the country's primary education sector. They said political influence in teachers' posting, lack of promotion and

proper training of the teachers, dropout of students, and teachers' involvement in out-of-school activities were also hindering the delivery of quality education. Teachers of different primary schools, officials of district and upazila

FIGHTING DRUG ABUSE

Parents advised to help children

Speakers at a discussion on how to resist drug abuse yesterday called upon parents to keep aware of the adverse surroundings their children are growing up in. Eminent psychiatrist Dr Mohit Kamal urged parents to

stop imposing their opinions on children, and allow for healthy discussions to sort out the differences. "Try to put yourself in the shoes of your children and understand why they think the way they do," he told the meeting, "Build Social Resistance Against Drugs", organised by

Bangladesh Mahila Parishad at the capital's Jatiya Press Club. The psychiatrist of the National Institute of Mental Health also asked parents to help their children build their self-image and self-esteem so that they do not go astray for drugs.

"Stop being in denial if your child starts abusing drugs. Address it and discuss it with them," said Dr Mohit. He also asked parents not to shy away from visiting a mental health counsellor if their child is suffering from any psychological difficulty, frustration or depression.

Dr Anwara Syed Haque, a noted psychiatrist at Birdem, laid stress on the role of schools in taking care of the psychological condition of children.

FRESH WATER SOURCES

Destruction threatens food security

Seminar told

The country's food security and public health will be in danger if the rivers and wetlands are destroyed at the present rate, experts said at a seminar yesterday.

The Bangladesh Institute of Planners (BIP) and Delhi-based Centre for Science and Environment (CSE) jointly organised the seminar at BIP's office in the capital. Unplanned urbanisation and contamination are fast destroying both

the surface and underground fresh water sources, said Kazi Matin Ahmed, a geology professor at Dhaka University. He said groundwater, the primary source of fresh water in Bangladesh,

was vital for irrigation for food production, industrialisation, and public health, while industrial pollution and poor sanitation were making surface water unusable.

Public health largely depends on uncontaminated groundwater, which singly contributes 98 percent of the world's fresh water, he said. Waterrelated diseases are responsible for 80 percent of all deaths in the developing world, he added.

Sushmita Sengupta, deputy programme manager of the CSE, said the

REPATRIATION OF BANGABANDHU'S KILLER

US senator assures Dhaka of cooperation

An influential US senator has assured Bangladesh of cooperation in the repatriation of self-confessed convicted killer of Bangabandhu, Rashed Chowdhury, and war crimes accused, Ashrafuzzaman Khan.

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid gave the assurance during an hourlong meeting with Bangladesh Foreign Minister Dipu Moni in Las Vegas, Nevada on Monday. Dipu Moni informed Senator Reid that a self-confessed convicted killer of


Bangladesh's founding father Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and a war crimes accused wanted by the International Crimes Tribunal of Bangladesh had been living in the US.

She hoped that the US government would help Bangladesh in upholding the rule of law and human rights by sending these persons back to Bangladesh.

Senator Reid assured the foreign minister of extending all sorts of cooperation in this regard, according to a foreign ministry press release. Welcoming the foreign minister to Las Vegas, Reid showed keen interest in

the social developmental issues of Bangladesh. Dipu Moni apprised the senator of Bangladesh's progress in women empowerment, primary and mass education, cutting infant and maternal mortality, and achieving many of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs).
