High octane at Bogra

Elsewhere, Mohammedan Sporting Club made it two in two after beating Kalabagan Cricket Academy by five runs at Fatullah and went to the top of the table and Cricket Coaching School lost to Sheikh Jamal by one wicket at BKSP 3.

Batting first Prime Dowleshwar, who notched their first win, rode on centuries from Mominul Haque (129) and Sri Lankan recruit Roshane Shiwanka Silva (140) to post 320. Abahani pacer Al Amin Hossain followed his six-wicket haul in the first match with figures of 5 for 65 and was the pick of the bowlers.

In reply, Abahani were restricted to 262 for nine, with batsman Liton Kumar Das retiring hurt. They depended mainly on Mosaddek Hossain (100) and Tharanga Paranavitana (81) for a lion's share of their runs. Forhad Reza for Doleshwar finished with figures of 5 for 51.

At BKSP-3 Sheikh Jamal won a game that was shortened to 47 overs due to inclement weather. Batting first CCS rode on half centuries from Uttam Sarker (56) and Gihan Rupasinghe (50) to post 247. The target was reduced to 239 off 47 overs. Sheikh Jamal scored 241 for 9 in 46.5. Mohammad Shehzad was the hero as he smacked a 78-ball 83. With four points Jamal are now in second spot on the league tables.

Meanwhile, Mashrafe Bin Mortaza's Mohammedan SC beat Kalabagan by five runs on Duckworth-Lewis. Mashrafe picked up one wicket in the match.

The Bangladesh national team's pace troubles are no secret. Constant injuries have compelled the selectors to look for new pacers

in the recent past. As a result, the likes of Robiul Islam and Sajedul Islam made returns to the national side this year.

Under these circumstances, young Al Amin Hossain's performance for Abahani at the start of the Dhaka Premier League provides hope. The bowler picked up eleven wickets in his first two matches. His second five-for came on the batting-friendly wicket of Bogra yesterday, in a match that saw three centuries.

"I had to work really hard to get the wickets (on Tuesday). It was batsman-friendly, so I had to use lots of variations. I tried to york and were really difficult to bowl at," he said. them, bowl slowers, etc. Also, it was very hot in Bogra, which made it even more difficult," Al Amin told The Daily Star.

"I am happy with my personal performance in the match, but it would have been better had we won," he added.

Like any other player, the 23-year-old hopes to break through to the national side in the near future and with the New Zealand series around the corner, he aims to give it his best shot in the league.

"I obviously want to break through into the national side. All I can do is provide my best performance here and finish the league on a high. I took 26 wickets last year, this year my aim is to take around 35 to 40," he said.

The pacer was a part of the Bangladesh A team that toured England earlier this year. That tour, according to him, has drastically changed his bowling outlook. "I feel like the tour has changed my bowling altogether. It has helped me mentally. They play a lot of power cricket

"We had to be perfect with our line. Since there was a lot of pressure there, comparatively it's a bit easier here," he added.

BFF boss urged to take back his words

The Football Coaches Association of Bangladesh (FCAB) yesterday urged Bangladesh Football Federation president Kazi Salahuddin to retract his statement regarding the quality of local coaches following the failure of the national team

under the guidance of Dutch coaches.

"We are saddened by the BFF president's remarks regarding the local coaches. Though we do not know which circumstances led him to say what he said, but we, FCAB, urge BFF president Kazi Salahuddin, who is also the guardian of the country's football, to retract his statement," read FCAB general secretary Satyajit Das Rupu at press conference at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

Salahuddin on Friday claimed that local coaches have been criticising the Dutch coaches out of jealousy and they do not have the quality to criticise the coaches of the national team. He also added that the local coaches had no calibre and if they did, then clubs like Abahani and Sheikh Jamal would not go after foreign coaches.

Rupu, also a BFF executive committee member, said that some coaches might have said something sporadically about the national coaches but the BFF president should not judge all local coaches on a single scale. He also mentioned that coaches like late Shaheb Ali, Ali Imam, Gafur Baluch, Abdur Rahim, Bazlu and veterans Tipu, Gazi, Selim had great contribution towards country's football.

"The BFF president himself had also been coach at the club and national level at one stage and many others followed his footsteps, but his criticism of local coaches is really sad for us," read the statement.

Former national player and coach Abu Yousuf said that the issue should have been about the federation and the national coaches due, but unfortunately the local coaches, who had no role in performance of the national team, came under fire.

Maruful Haque, a treble-winning coach last season, said that it is inappropriate for any coach to criticise another one and no local coach directly criticised the national coach, who on the other hand criticised the local coaches.

Salahuddin declined to comment over demand of FCAB.

In 2010, the Sri Lankans were in deep water at the Melbourne Cricket

Ground. In their chase of Australia's 239, the Lions were barely roaring at the halfway mark as they crumbled to a 107 for 8. Their traditional heroes, the Sangakarras and the Jayawardenes, failed to fire with the bat that day and midway through, it seemed as though the visitors had packed their bags and were just waiting to leave.

And that is when a harmless looking Angelo Mathews, barely 23 back then with a couple of half-centuries under his belt, entered the scene. With a little help from tailender Lasith Malinga, he scripted one of the most remarkable comebacks of the game. He literally snatched the match away from the hosts with his ice-cool 77 and the momentum generated from the game eventually led the visitors to an emphatic ODI series win.

In only three years since he is now captain of a side that includes three former captains -- Mahela Jayawardene, Kumar Sangakkara and Tillakaratne Dilshan.

The exciting aspect here is the fact the last two-three years. that a cricketer of the new age, who

likes to hit the ball hard, is leading a group of seasoned players. But how much pressure does that entail?

"There's definitely no pressure, I feel comfortable. No matter what they tell me, ultimately I decide as the captain. Getting help from them is good because they are seasoned campaigners and they have been in those situations quite a few times. Ultimately we take a collective decision which will help the team," Mathews, who is in Bangladesh to play in the Dhaka Premier League for Brothers Union, said.

His strategy may be slightly different from his predecessors -- "All five fingers are not the same, all of us abroad. You can stress out a lot in do it in a different way for the bene- cricket when you don't perform -fit of the team" - however, he credited his seniors for his quick growth in international cricket.

"As a youngster when you get into the national system, you feel nervous, stressed out and that's where the seniors came in for me. I am fortunate to have played with so many legends.

On a personal front the 26-yearold is trying to revive his bowling, something which he has been struggling to cope with due to injuries in

concern for Mathews. Batting at six, he has scored one century in Tests and his average hovers around the 40 mark. "You don't get a lot of opportunities when you bat at six. But I think whenever I got them I didn't really make the maximum out of it. I should have had more than threefour centuries by now. I need to convert the 70s and 80s into big scores."

Away from cricket, Mathews, who recently tied the knot, prefers the life of a family man.

"I owe my family a lot for what I have become. It was my mom who handled my cricket coaching before entered school as my dad was it's a mixture of emotions that you need to keep in check. My family and now my wife, helps me keep that balance," Mathews said.

At 26, Mathews has achieved numerous distinctions. He was named personality of the year in Sri Lanka in 2010 and also has a book written on him. Mathews though likes to keep it simple, "I don't set myself targets too high. I'll try to keep a legacy as a captain and a player. When I leave cricket I should be known as a gentleman who has played the game really hard."

Aus finish winning

Shane Watson's century saw Australia to a 49-run win over England in the fifth one-day international at Southampton on Monday as their lengthy tour ended with a 2-1 series victory.

Watson, involved throughout in a trip that saw Australia arrive in Britain in May before their early Champions Trophy exit was followed by a 3-0 Ashes series loss, made 143 in a total of 298 all out.

Together with captain Michael Clarke (75), he shared a fourth-wicket partnership of 163, on a ground where they'd both played for Hampshire, after their side had slumped to 48 for three in this day-night clash.

Durham all-rounder Ben Stokes led England's attack with an ODI best five wickets for 61 runs, the 22-year-old all-rounder starring as Australia fell just short of 300.

England debutant Chris Jordan, in for fast bowler Steven Finn, took three for 47 after his first ball in international cricket was hit for four by Aaron Finch, whose last match on the ground saw him score a Twenty20 world record 156 against England last month.

But Australia had more than enough runs as they enjoyed a win over England ahead of the return Ashes series down under starting

in November.

England's reply got off to a disastrous start when Kevin Pietersen was run out for

nought after being slow to answer Michael Carberry's call. Carberry, on his home ground, made 30

before he was lbw to left-arm seamer James Faulkner (three for 38).

And it wasn't long before 50 for two became 68 for four as Joe Root (13) and Luke Wright (nought) came and went.

Morgan fell for 30 when stumped by Matthew Wade off spinner Adam Voges. England's hopes now rested with Ravi

Bopara and Jos Buttler, whose 65 not out saw them to a series-levelling three-wicket win in Cardiff on Saturday.

But Pakistan-born leg-spinner Fawad Ahmed finished the match by bowling last man Rankin with two overs left.
