Demo stopped after govt assurance

Vandalism, clashes continue

Students of polytechnic institutes yesterday afternoon postponed their countrywide demonstrations for 15 days after receiving assurances from the government of meeting their demands.

They will take their final exams, which they had boycotted on Sunday, if the authorities concerned within the next two days set free their fellow students detained by the law enforcers during the countrywide demonstrations.

The decisions came after several govern-

ment high officials, including the education secretary, held a meeting with the leaders of the agitating students and several organisations of diploma engineers at the education ministry.

Meanwhile, 75 more people, including policemen and journalists, were injured and many vehicles vandalised in Rajshahi, Bogra, Sylhet, Khulna and Feni as the students staged violent demonstrations yesterday demanding timely promotions in jobs and withdrawal of the entry-level position (supervisor) introduced for diploma engineers in 2008.

TAX HOLIDAY

Cap on Grameen's privilege likely

The finance ministry will place the new Grameen Bank Act in the cabinet meeting on Thursday with a proposal to cap the tax-exemption privilege for the microlender for a certain period.

"The tax holiday benefit for Grameen Bank might be capped for a fixed period through a notification," Finance Minister AMA Muhith said yesterday. Grameen Bank has been enjoying income tax exemption since its inception in 1983, but the privilege ended in December 2010.

The bank then sought extension of the privilege for five more years from January 1, 2011. The government agreed, but the National Board of Revenue began executing the order from July 1, 2011, meaning the bank had to pay income tax for the previous six months.

In May 2011, the government compelled Grameen Bank to pay an advance income tax of Tk 10 crore, and later again granted tax exemption status for 2011-2015, according to the Yunus Centre.

Medicine traders threaten strike

Press for release of fellows, return of seized drugs

Medicine traders have threatened to keep their shops shut throughout the country on Thursday if the government does not address their complaints regarding Saturday's drive against the sale of unauthorised medicines in the capital's Mitford.

Keeping their shops shut since Sunday, the medicine traders of Mitford, Babubazar and Islampur demanded the release of their fellow traders, reopening of the sealed shops, and the return of the medicines seized in the drive.

"All medicine shops across the country will remain closed from 6:00am to 10:00pm on Thursday if our demands are not met, and the complaints against the drive are addressed," said Sadequr Rahman, president of the Bangladesh Chemists and Druggists Samity (BCDS), while addressing a scheduled protest rally in front of the BCDS Bhaban around 11:00am yesterday.

Polls expense ceiling to be Tk 25 lakh

Bill placed to change RPO STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The government yesterday placed a bill in parliament proposing changes in the Representation of the People Order to increase the ceiling of individual election expenditure and donation for political parties.

According to the proposal, a candidate may a spend maximum of Tk 25 lakh in the next parliamentary polls. The ceiling has been Tk 15 lakh since the 2008 general election.

Individuals and organisations would also be able to donate more to political

parties once the proposals are translated into laws.

An individual would be allowed to donate to a party up to Tk 25 lakh, 10 lakh more than the current ceiling. An organisation or a company may donate up to Tk 50 lakh. Currently, they can donate Tk 25 lakh at the maximum to a political party.

The bill, placed by the law minister, also proposed increasing security deposit of a candidate to Tk 20,000 from the existing Tk 10,000.
