### 601 women victims of violence in last month: BJMAS

A total of 601 women and children fell victims to different forms of violence last month, said Bangladesh Jatiyo Mohila Ainjibi Samity (BJMAS) in a press statement yesterday.

The organisation revealed a report, based on data published in 14 dailies, which says 52 women were raped, 17 were victims of acid attacks and 113 were trafficked during the last month.

Besides, 36 women were tortured for dowry. Fourteen of them were killed while three committed suicide.

## Polytech graduates can't be sub-assistant engineers

Engineers holding bachelor degrees at a meeting yesterday opposed the government's decision to allow polytechnic institute graduates to be eligible for the post of "sub-assistant engineer" at the entry level Institution of Engineers, Bangladesh

held the meeting at its premises where the speakers protested the move, saying that "only graduates who have had formal undergraduate education can be recognised as engineers".

Previously, a 2008 government provision recognised the entry level post of polytechnic graduates as "supervisor".

This, however, was changed following the countrywide movement launched by polytechnic institute students, resulting in more than 300 being injured during the past week only. The speakers also protested the other

petition made by polytechnic institute students which demanded that diploma engineers be granted speedier promotion.

# JU deadlock continues

The stalemate at Jahangirnagar University continued as the teachers demanding resignation of Vice Chancellor Prof Anwar Hossain on Tuesday night rejected the education ministry's request for more time to come up with a solution.

The ministry officials informally sought 10 more days after a two-member investigation committee filed its findings and recommendations with the ministry on Tuesday, an agitating teacher wishing anonymity told The Daily Star yesterday.

In the meantime, both Prof Anwar along with his wife Ayesha Akter and the teachers opposing him continued their separate sit-ins in front of the VC's residence on the campus for the third day yesterday.

Separately, some other agitating teachers have kept Registrar Abu Bakar Siddique and Deputy Registrar Abu Hasan confined to their offices since Monday so that the registrar did not sign the VC-approved appointment letters of three new deans.

In protest of the confinement, JU Employees Association went on a work abstention indefinitely Wednesday.

The agitating teachers under the banner, Sadharon Shikkhak Forum, launched a fresh work abstention as the VC did not quit by Tuesday. They have been intermittently staging demonstrations since April 27 accusing Prof Anwar of failing to expel a Bangladesh Chhatra League leader who had assaulted a teacher earlier, committing irregularities in teachers' recruitment, and misusing funds, among others.
