The government has tricked people by hastily unveiling the foundation plaque of the Rampal power plant, said noted academician and environmental activist Prof Anu Mohammad yesterday. "They (government) know it will not be possible to

unveil the foundation plaque at Rampal on the scheduled date as people will resist it. That's why, the prime minister has done it through 'a remote control' staying far away from the spot," he said. Anu Mohammad was addressing a roundtable on "possi-

ble impacts of the power plant on the Sundarbans" organised by National Committee for Saving the Sundarbans (NCSS) at Dhaka Reporters Unity. Through a video conference, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and her Indian counterpart Manmohan Singh

unveiled the foundation plaque of the Rampal power plant yesterday, disregarding environmentalists' fear of a disastrous impact on the Sundarbans. The premier was scheduled to lay the foundation stone of the coal-based power station at Rampal, Bagerhat, 14 kilometres off the Sundarbans, on October 22 but she unveiled

Two-thirds of respondents unhappy with services

Nearly two-thirds of respondents are dissatisfied with the services provided by municipalities and city corporations, reveals a survey of the Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD). In the four-month study, the private

questionnaires. The findings show that poor services are also resulted from lack of commitment of mayors, councillors and municipality officials, corruption of contractors and elected representatives, and political consideration in

implementing development projects. CPD found that 63 percent of respondents heard about corrupt practices in development projects led

lems like sanitation, drainage, water supply, insufficient lighting, construction and maintenance of roads, and poor waste management. At the dialogue, speakers blamed

lack of autonomy of the local government bodies in spending for poor services and inadequate tax collections for financial constraints. Prime Minister's adviser HT Imam

favoured real devolution of power

instead of decentralisation, saying

decentralisation did not help when power remained centralised. "Give authority to the local bodies so that they are themselves responsible for their areas...give them the authority to collect. They can collect

funds and resources."

> Even if the misuse of religion in politics is not considered, Jamaat-e-Islami should be banned for genocide, opposing Bangladesh's Liberation War, not recognising the constitution and creating the recent violence, said eminent scholar Shahriar Kabir yesterday. "Jamaat still has not sought forgiveness for what it did

> during 1971," he told the concluding session of a two-day international public lecture series and conference, "Religion and Politics: South Asia", in the capital's Cirdap.

> Bangladesh Itihas Sammilani, a forum of historians, organised the programme.

> Shahriar said the secularism Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman put in Bangladesh's constitution was meant to "recognise all religions in harmony, not denying those".

> "This differs from the idea of secularism generated by the founder of modern Turkey Mustafa Kemal Ataturk or former Egyptian president Gamal Abdel Nasser Hussein," he

> He, however, observed that banning religion-based politics in Bangladesh and around the globe might not be possible considering the present state of world politics.

JU teachers burn CANADIAN effigy of VC

With no sign of solution to the ongoing deadlock at Jahangirnagar University in sight, the teachers demanding resignation of Vice Chancellor Prof Anwar Hossain brought out a silent procession carrying black flags and burned his effigy on the campus yesterday.

Over a hundred teachers joined the procession under the banner of Sadharon Shikkhak Forum. The march started from VC's residence and ended at the administrative building.

The agitators also circulated a statement signed by 395 teachers, saying their movement would continue till he resigned and assuring students of making up for their

In the meantime, Shikkha Odhikar Mancha, a students' forum, at a press conference at JU Journalist Association, demanded a permanent solution and restoration of academic atmosphere, urging intervention of Chancellor and President Abdul Hamid.

Separately, the confinement of Registrar Abu Bakar Siddique and Deputy Registrar Abu Hasan has been going on since Monday, while Prof Anwar along with his wife Ayesha Akter and teachers opposing him continued their sit-ins near the VC's residence for the fifth day.

Protesting the registrar's confinement, JU Employees Association has been on a work abstention indefinitely since Wednesday. These demonstrations have brought academic activities to a halt. The teachers have been demanding the VC's resignation since April 27.






