Chinese firm to get the job

A Chinese company is going to get the job of connecting the public administration up to the upazila level with the capital by establishing an information network.

The cabinet committee on purchase may approve today the proposal of awarding the job worth Tk 1,087 crore [\$133 million] to the company. Bangladesh has taken the amount as Ioan from the Chinese Exim Bank.

According to the Ministry of Information & Communication Technology (ICT) proposal, the project will bring all government offices at district and upazila levels under the network, which would also provide videoconference facilities.

The project will connect 55 government offices in each district and 30 at each upazila to the single network based on internet.

Video-conference facilities will be set up at 800 points including the offices of 421 upazila nirbahi officers throughout the country.

Training laboratories will also be set up at Bangladesh Computer Council (BCC), Bangladesh Telecommunications Company Ltd (BTCL) and 12 public and private universities for building up expert human resources for maintenance of the installations and equipment.

Moreover, data centres will be strengthened, disaster recovery centres constructed and wireless network set up at Bangladesh Secretariat for introduction of e-governance. Besides, tablet and personal computers will be given to

the government officials. As per the contract, the Chinese company would supply

and set up equipment and do the related works of the project. Earlier in May, the government signed an agreement with the Chinese Exim Bank regarding the loan, which has an interest rate of 2 percent. The total amount is repayable

within 20 years including five years' grace period. SEE PAGE 11 COL 5

TEESTA, LAND DEAL PLEDGES

Aiyar believes India failed to deliver

India's relations with Bangladesh are crucial, but New Delhi has not been able to deliver on its promises to Dhaka concerning the Teesta waters and land boundary, veteran Indian diplomat-turned-politician Mani Shankar Aiyar has said. The ties between the two countries, how-

ever, have strengthened during the tenure of Sheikh Hasina government, he observed.

Aiyar, who has deep interest in India's foreign policy towards its neighbours, was talking to journalists during his visit to Dhaka to attend a conference on "Religion and Politics: South Asia".

Recalling his association with Bangladesh since its birth, Aiyar said, "I was made the secretary of a committee that was to effect relief supply to Bangladesh on the day of Liberation and I used to visit Bangladesh very frequently in 1972, before many of you were born."

A member of the Indian National Congress, Aiyar was petroleum and natural gas minister from May 2004 to January 2006, and youth affairs and sports minister till 2009. He was also the first minister for development of SEE PAGE 11 COL 5

Ban Jamaat for its 'criminal acts'

Civil society members demand at national convention

Bangladesh Rukhe Darao, a platform of progressive and pro-liberation forces, yesterday reiterated its demand that the Jamaat-e-Islami be banned immediately under the Anti Terrorism Act, 2009 for "its criminal activities".

International Crimes Tribunal had identified Jamaat as a criminal organisation that committed genocide, rape and atrocities in association with the Pakistani occupation forces in 1971, it said.

The atrocities committed by Jamaat in the last few months were rarely perpetrated in the last four decades. "So, it's urgent to ban Jamaat," said | Maududi managed to rise eminent journalist Abed Khan while reading out a declaration of a national convention organised by the group in the capital's Suhrawardy Udyan. He added the opposition party and some local and international rights

organisations were spreading propaganda to "foil" the ongoing war crimes trial, without giving any suggestion for amendments to the International Crimes (Tribunals) Act-1973.

Bangladesh Rukhe Darao was launched on April 20 this year. It has held rallies in divisional headquarters to press home a five-point demand, including banning of Jamaat and its student wing Islami Chhatra Shibir.

It also demands that the government expedite the war crimes trial and execute the verdicts, resist communal violence and stand by its victims, take SEE PAGE 2 COL 1


A futuristic train that could on day become the future of underground rail travel has been unveiled.
