### Idol makers busy as Durga Bangladeshi farmers breed Puja knocks on door

Inherited profession of idol making looses apart due to lack of support

"Pals'" (idol makers from generation) - are getting busy as Durga Puja; the biggest festival of Hindu community knocks at the door. Pal's business is always at its peak during this time of the year. Despite the decreasing number in this profession there are still some hundred idol makers practicing the traditional profession.

"Over five to six hundred idol makers live in Pabna but most of them left their inherited profession due to lack of support. Leaving inherited profession most of the 'Pal's have chosen other profession." Dhananjoy Kumar Pal, one of the prominent idol makers of Pabna told the Daily Star.

Most of the idol makers year and only during Durga Puza do we get sufficient work - Dhananjoy said adding that around one hundred idol makers are working in the district this

According to district Puja Udzapan Parishad 317 Puja Mondops have organized the Durga Puja festival this year while each idol maker takes contract of idol making for three to four temples.

"I have made statues for five temples in the district headquarters this year. I am charging Taka 20,000 to 50,000 for each idol." Bishnu Pada Pal, an idol maker of Faridpur upazila told the Daily Star. He is making idol in Joykali Temple, central temple of the district.



Are the Omanis getting attracted to plantation? The interest is growing immensely. Do they buy Bangali fruits? They buy jackfruits.

These nurseries of Oman are similar to one-stopservice centres. The customers get all the necessary inputs for plantation from the nursery. Fertilizer, pesticide, cutting tools, tubs, stands-everything gets sold here. What I noticed most is the pottery inside the nursery. You can find different kinds of flower tubs here. All these came from Vietnam. We also have different kinds of potteries but still we couldn't put these into international business stream. I That is why the business is hope those who are involved with pottery industry, will take effective initiatives.

Vietnam is securing their place in the pottery business around the world. All the tubs come from Vietnam. There are many organizations in Bangladesh who are making even more beautiful tubs and they are selling those locally. However, we couldn't grab the international market. That is why we need entrepreneurs who would be able to export the Bangladeshi pottery all over the world. As I was saying about one-stop-service, it is important to ensure that a customer gets everything from one place. Dhaka's agriculturalist nursery is a good example.

If one wants to decorate the indoor and outdoor of his house, he can easily collect all the necessary plants and inputs from the nursery. Regarding these issues, I also talked with



Rafiqul Islam, a worker of the nursery.

"We have urea, flower tubs and also plastic pots. We have to keep all these items in the nursery because we don't want our customer to go elsewhere"

"I have noticed beautiful Vietnamese flower tubs in the nursery."

"In Bangladesh, there are more attractive flower tubs. Why don't you bring those?"

"It's not feasible; one has to bear so many unnecessary

# Hundreds of illegal power lines from PDB poles

A section of dishonest power office staff have given hundreds of illegal power connections in remote villages of Domar upazila under the local office of Power Development Board (PDB), posing the risk of accidents.

Due to the situation, pressure on the main power supply lines often causes frequent power cuts while Domar PDB sees systems loss of 30% -35%, which is highest in the region.

As per government rule, power connection can be given up to 33 meters from poles erected by PDB but illegal connections stretching much longer

areas are given, PDB sources said. During a recent visit to command area under Domar PDB, this correspondent found kilometres-long illegal power lines spreading to different directions from the PDB pole at

Andarur More in Domar municipality.

Locals alleged that this malpractice

is random at Chilahati feeder (branch) of Domar PDB.

They said 350-400 households, shops and pumps are given connections from those lines for Tk 5000-Tk 20,000 against each connection with fake commitment to give relevant 30% -35%, the highest in the region, documents soon.

Electric meters of many illegal clients hang on poles or house walls but their names are not posted in the office register as dishonest PDB employees misappropriate the 'bill' for illegally consumed power.

Dishonest PDB employees snap the rubber insulation of PDB authorised thick metallic wires consisting of seven thin solid copper wires to turn 1500metre-long heavy copper wire into 10,000-metre-long thin wire and use them for illegal connections with the help of bamboo poles, PDB sources said.

four on September 25. Frequent load shedding causes damage to TVs, fridges, bulbs, fans, power pumps, and even PDB transformers.

System loss under Domar PDB is while PDB recommended system loss is only 14%.

Asked about the matter, Monoranjan Roy, resident engineer of Domar PDB, admitted existence of many illegal power lines and said, "I informed the higher authorities of the matter and asked repeatedly to transfer lineman concerned of Chilahati feeder Abu Taher to bring back discipline here and reduce systems loss.

Contacted, lineman Abu Taher said, "Those who served at this feeder before me were responsible for giving the illegal connections."

12/14 stormed into Jopmala Rani Church in Chougacha area of Gangni upazila at 11:30pm when a kirton (religious song) programme was going on.

The robbers took the devotees hostage at gunpoint, took away the necklace of mother Marry and damaged several religious books.

The robbers also beat up two devotees -- Sufal Mandol, 35, and Joyonto Mandol, 25, and hurriedly fled the scene, said Samir Kumar Biswas, caretaker of

the church. In Mujibnagar, a gang of armed robbers looted valuables from the houses of Abdur Razzak, Mojibul Islam, Ajit Mia, Mokhles, Kawsar and Gayes Uddin at Gopalpur village around 11:00pm.

Hearing the hue and cry, villagers chased the robbers who opened fire, leaving a man injured. However, the gang managed to decamp safely.

In Chuadanga, robbers looted cash, gold ornaments and other valuables worth Tk 5 lakh from a house at Kedernogar village in Alamdanga upazila early Monday, reports a correspondent.

To the relief of villagers, the union parishad building of Dholigour Nagar at Bauria of Lalmohan upazila was completed in 2011 at a cost of more than Tk 84 lakh.

With separate provisions for ICT office, tax collection, issuance of birth and nationality certificates, agricultural wings and the family planning office, the purpose-built new building had all the provisions that an union parishad office would require.

But the new building

remains totally unused till today. The chairman of the union parishad, Hedayetul Islam Mintu, refuses to move to the new building as it is a little far from his residence and business.
