#### France charges al-Qaeda suspect deported from Pakistan

AFP, Paris

A French-Algerian man suspected of al-Qaeda ties and deported from Pakistan this week has been charged with terror offences, French judicial officials said yesterday.

Intelligence officials believe Naamen Meziche was once connected to al-Qaeda's so-called "Hamburg cell", which planned the 9/11 attacks on the United States. Deported on Tuesday, he

was charged and remanded in custody in Paris on Friday for criminal conspiracy in relation with a terrorist enterprise, with a view to carrying out criminal acts, the source said.

# Obama against Republican plan on debt ceiling deal

President Barack Obama yesterday came out against a proposal to extend for just weeks the country's authority to borrow money as crisis talks with Republicans entered the 12th day. "It wouldn't be wise, as

some suggest, to just kick the debt ceiling can down the road for a couple of months, and flirt with a first-ever intentional default right in the middle of the holiday shopping season," Obama said in his weekly radio and video address.

Damage "to America's sterling credit rating wouldn't just cause global markets to go haywire; it would everyone in America to borrow money."

One Republican idea that was floated to stave off a disastrous US debt default and end a partial government shutdown included a temporary extension to US borrowing authority -- without which Washington could begin to default on its obligations for the first time in history after October 17.

The government, shuttered since October 1, will be fully reopened, possibly on an interim basis, and there will be some kind of commitment from both sides to work towards an

# Tourist landmarks to reopen in US

The Statue of Liberty and the Grand Canyon are to reopen despite the US government shutdown, with US states temporarily paying the running costs of worldfamous landmarks shuttered by the standoff.

Mount Rushmore, Rocky Mountain National Park and eight federal sites in Utah will also reopen starting this weekend, officials said Friday, although other world-famous destinations including Yosemite National Park and Alcatraz prison remain closed. The federal National Park

Service announced deals with the states of New York, Arizona, Colorado, Utah and South Dakota, under which the states agree to fund the sites which draw

millions of tourists and in fund the Grand Canyon, many cases keep local economies afloat.

More than 400 federally

managed tourist sites across the nation have been closed since the shutdown started at the start of October due to a budget impasse between Republicans and Democrats. The stalemate is costing \$152 million a day in lost

workers, according to the US Travel Association. Alone some 20,000 park services employees were furloughed. Friday's New York agreement will allow funding for the Statue of Liberty for six days, beginning Saturday through October 17, with

Corporation of Bangladesh (TCB), prices of onion soared by Tk 30 a kg within a week from Tk 75 on October 4 to Tk 105 yesterday.

The TCB said around this time last year, onion was selling at Tk 22-35 a kg.

"Local onion is available throughout the country. Besides, traders are importing it from different countries. There is no reason why the prices of onion should rise like this overnight," additional commerce secretary Monoj Kumar Roy told The Daily Star yesterday.

The district administration throughout the country has been instructed to watch out for any ulterior move to raise the prices of onion during the Eid, he said.

Official sources noted that the government has become perplexed by the erratic behaviour of traders. "It appears that everyone out in the market is trying to reap maximum benefits out of a crisis," one of them added.

Surprisingly, the latest price hike of onion took place overnight after the traders reassured the government of no more increase in its prices at a stakeholders' meeting on Thursday.

The storm was set to hit the same coastal area which was devastated by a cyclone in 1999, killing about 9,000 people.

Authorities evacuated thousands of people from thatched shacks along the coasts of Odisha and its neighbouring state Andhra Pradesh to relief camps and cyclone shelters.

The Odisha government said it was setting a "zero casualty target" in the densely populated state of close to 40 million people and was seeking "100 percent" evacuation of people in areas likely to be hit by the storm.

Satellite photos showed an intimidating cloud mass barrelling across the Bay of Bengal as forecasters said the danger zone was about 150 kilometres (90 miles) wide and would hit Odisha and Andhra Pradesh.

In Odisha's capital Bhubaneswar, where trees swayed in strong winds, panic buying saw many shops run low on food with memories still strong of the deadly cyclone which had hit the same region 14 years ago.
