China offers 400m RMB as development assistance

The amount includes 400 RMB, which is under discussion for different development projects between the two countries.

Just a day after the death of a female college student who was run over by a bus plying in the wrong direction in the capital's Mugda, a 15-year-old schoolboy was killed as a truck ran him over in Gazipur yesterday. Rasel Rana alias Apan, son of Abul Hossain of Konabari

and a class XI student of Konabari MA Kuddus High School, was returning home from school on a bicycle when the incident occurred before Palli Bidyut Samity office around 12:15pm. Doctors at Dhaka Medical College Hospital declared

him dead while his friend Suman, who was pedaling, is undergoing treatment there. The female student, Marjana Jahan Munmun, 17, of

Central Women's College in Tikatuli, is the third such female victim in the capital of the last 30 days. Of the two others, Sanjida Begum, 35, died after being

Intense agricultural research prerequisite: PM

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday laid importance on constant and intense agricultural research to meet the demand for food of the country's growing population and make the country hunger and poverty free.

"Without new innovations to produce more food and make it more diverse, it is not possible to maintain the present pace of food production," she said while distributing Bangabandhu Jatiya Krishi Puraskar-1418 in the capital's Osmani Memorial Hall.

Bangladesh was able to cope with the worldwide food crisis and soaring food prices in the last few years due to her government's pragmatic steps for agricultural research, she said.

growth in the agriculture sector to protect our agri-based economy, ensure food security of the people and rural employment and improve their living standards," said Hasina.

Seeking support of agricultural

scientists, she said as an agrobased country, more attention must be laid on agricultural production to strengthen the country's economy to live as a dignified nation amongst the world community. Hasina announced that the

government would further consider increasing the retirement age of agricultural scientists so that they can contribute more.

Sundarbans land grabbing escalates as Rampal project proceeds

Roundtable told

As the government prepares to construct the controversial Rampal power plant near the Sundarbans, land grabbing has reached an unprecedented level in the forest, speakers alleged at a roundtable yesterday.

Different business groups with links to the two major political parties are openly destroying the world's largest mangrove forest while the government takes no action against them, they said.

Organised by the weekly Shaptahik, the discussion, "Unnayan, Jalani Babosthapona O Janashartho", was held in the capital's Bilia Auditorium.

"People who say that coal-fired power stations produce low cost electricity are wrong because they don't count the social and environmental costs of these plants," said Prof Anu Muhammad of Jahangirnagar University.

The Rampal plant, about 14 kilometres off the Sundarbans, will pollute the water bodies in the forest and destroy its ecological balance, he said. "Had the policymakers considered these impacts, they would have realised that the power station is not cost effective at all."

POLL-TIME GOVT UK, Canada hail Khaleda's proposal

The United Kingdom and Canada have welcomed the proposals made by the government and the opposition for their efforts towards dialogue to find a way to holding a transparent, credible, inclusive and peaceful election. The two countries, which earlier appreci-

ated Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's efforts to initiate dialogue with the opposition, yesterday hailed BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia's proposal to form a non-partisan election-time government where the ruling and opposition parties will nominate five advisers each. The British and Canadian missions in

Dhaka hoped that both the government and the opposition would use the opportunity and approach for a dialogue.

Responding to a question about the opposition leader's proposal and pledges, British High Commissioner Robert W Gibson particularly praised her reassuring remarks about international terrorism and regional co-operation and her renunciation of violence.

"We hope that the suggestions made in her speech will be considered by the government and that meaningful dialogue will quickly begin.

Amendments necessary for watchdog's independence

Eminent rights activists, jurists and professionals yesterday called for bringing necessary amendments to National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) Act-2009 for ensuring NHRC's administrative and financial independence. They also suggested empowering NHRC

so that it can investigate human rights violation allegations against law enforcers. Currently, NHRC can only seek a report from the government over such allegations.

They also recommended incorporating civil society members in the selection committee which recommends persons for the posts of NHRC chairman and members.

Currently the seven-member selection committee comprises the Speaker, law and home ministers, Bangladesh Law Commission chairman, cabinet secretary and two lawmakers, from the opposition and ruling parties.

The recommendations came at a roundtable, organised by NHRC at a city hotel, on reviewing the act.

Moderating the roundtable, NHRC Chairman Prof Mizanur Rahman said NHRC had both failures and limitations but it was their responsibility to bring the necessary amendments so that their successors could work smoothly.

Bhorer Kagoj Editor Shyamal Dutta said NHRC's effectiveness was fully dependent on the government's political commitment.

Transparency International Bangladesh Executive Director Dr Iftekharuzzaman said though established by the government, NHRC was not a government organisation and the government could only work as a watchdog.

The NHRC chairman and members should be non-partisan and must work beyond political influences, he said.

Police detained 22 men at National Bangla High School in the capital's Mirpur last night on suspicion that they were "BNP, Jamaat-e-Islami and Islami Chhatra Shibir activists planning subversive activities".

Nothing illegal was found in their possession but police were questioning why they had gathered there at night, Dhaka Metropolitan Police Assistant Commissioner (Mirpur Zone) Shakhawat

Hossain told The Daily Star. Mirpur police sources said a majority of the detainees, all teachers, were of the school.
