VIOLENT ELECTROAL TRANSITION CPD worried about economy

The Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD) yesterday asked politicians to protect the economy from the negative impacts of an electoral transition.

"No economic activities and livelihood concerns, however large or small, should be held hostage to our unique democratic practices," the civil society think tank said in a media briefing while releasing its independent review report on the economic upsets at its Dhaka office.

The report is titled "Bangladesh economy in FY 2014: Three months after the budget, three months before the elections", a subject on which Dr Debapriya Bhattacharya, a distinguished CPD fellow who led the team that prepared the report, made a presentation.

The report was based on three broad issues – year closing figures of the economy and the starting benchmarks of the new fiscal year, movements of key economic indicators of the first quarter of 2013-14 and analysis of the political business cycle to understand its impact on macroeconomic prospects.

Bangladesh generally goes through a tumultuous time during every election year. Ruling and opposition parties take an antagonistic stand to realise their demands, causing sufferings to the masses and hurting the economy. The upcoming election is no exception and the country has already witnessed a lot of strikes and acts of vandalism,

Expressway route revised Proposal awaits govt nod today

The government is going to drop the links of the Dhaka Elevated Expressway (DEE) at Mohakhali, Farmgate, Golapbagh and Maniknagar areas due to complications in acquiring land.

The communications ministry will place today the proposal at a meeting of the cabinet committee on economic affairs for approval, said ministry sources.

As per the revised final route of the expressway, it will now commence at Shahjalal International Airport and pass by Kuril, Banani, Mohakhali, Tejgaon, Moghbazar, Kamalapur, Sayedabad and Jatrabari.

The DEE will take traffic over the Gulistan-Jatrabari flyover and end at Kutubkhali near the Dhaka-Chittagong highway.

According to another proposal, the government will appoint a Thai-led joint venture company as the independent engineer for the Dhaka Elevated Expressway (DEE)

DRONE STRIKES BY US It can be classed as war crimes Says Amnesty International

US officials responsible for the secret CIA drone campaign against suspected terrorists in Pakistan may have committed war crimes and should stand trial, a report by a leading human rights group warns. Amnesty International has highlighted the case of a grandmother who was killed while she was picking vegetables and other incidents which could have broken international laws designed to protect civilians.

The report is issued in conjunction with an investigation by Human Rights Watch detailing missile attacks in Yemen which the group believes could contravene the laws of armed conflict, international human rights law and Barack Obama's own guidelines on drones.

The reports are being published while Nawaz Sharif, Pakistan's prime minister, is in Washington. Sharif has promised to tell Obama that the drone strikes – which have caused outrage in Pakistan – must end.

Getting to the bottom of individual strikes is exceptionally difficult in the restive areas bordering Afghanistan, where thousands of militants have

Criminals hurl bombs at police station 5 injured

A defence witness in the war crimes case against Motiur Rahman Nizami yesterday testified that he had never heard of the Jamaat leader's name in Pabna during the Liberation War in 1971.

Shamsul Alam, second defence witness who claimed to have been a freedom fighter from Pabna, Nizami's home district, said he had no idea if Nizami was the president of Islami Chhatra Sangha, the then student wing of Jamaat-e-Islami, in 1971.

According to the prosecution documents, Nizami was the chief of Chhatra Sangha during the war.

In his testimony at the International Crimes Tribunal-1,

The Petrobangla is seeking today the approval of cabinet committee on economic affairs to sign a production sharing contract (PSC) for a block in the shallow waters of the Bay of Bengal with two foreign oil companies.

Australian Santos and Cayman Island-based KrisEnergy jointly won the bidding for block number SS-11 in August. The joint venture had submitted its bid on July 29.

Although their bid did not have to face any competition, the Petrobangla was satisfied with their proposal and qualification.
