BNP agrees finally, tension eases

AL drops rally plan in Dhaka; more opposition men arrested; violence in Ctg

After a daylong drama, the BNP-led opposition alliance last night decided to hold today's rally at Suhrawardy Udyan in keeping with the DMP permission.

The opposition, however, demanded the government ensure security of rally goers and the venue and urged the ruling Awami League not to go ahead with its plan to take positions at different points across the capital. Tension ran high as the opposition yesterday evening announced it

would organise the programme in Nayapaltan area, while the Dhaka Metropolitan Police said they would allow it only at Suhrawardy "The opposition has to stage the rally at Suhrawardy Udyan. There

is no scope for holding it elsewhere," DMP Deputy Commissioner (public relations) Masudur Rahman told The Daily Star around 9:15pm yesterday. After the opposition agreed with the DMP, Awami League

Organising Secretary AFM Bahauddin Nasim last night said the ruling party would not go for any counter programme. But leaders and activists at AL offices will stay alert to any subver-

sive activities by Jamaat-Shibir men, he added. BNP insiders say the party high-ups till 9:30pm were seriously

considering the Nayapaltan venue.

Thursdays are usually the busiest, with the city streets going chock-full of cars as people move out home to get things done before the two-day weekend. But yesterday was quite different.

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

Khaleda tells govt; declares it illegal from today

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia yesterday said the Awami League-led grand alliance government will be illegal from today as "its tenure expired" yesterday.

"After tomorrow [Oct 25] ... in fact from today, you are no more a legal government. Your tenure

expires actually today. From tomorrow, this government will be illegal. It is our duty as citizens of the country to wage a movement against the illegal government," she said. Khaleda was addressing a rally organised by Shikkhak-Karmachari

Oikya Jote (Skoj), a pro-BNP teachers' platform, at the Jatiya Press Club. The BNP chief also said her party has done everything including

rolling out a proposal on polls-time government, but the government is now dilly-dallying to meet the demand for a non-partisan caretaker administration to oversee the general election.

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Shooting ordered if attacked

Home acts on terror alert

Law enforcers have been ordered to shoot if they come under attack in the course of today's opposition rally in the capital and elsewhere, Rab and home ministry officials said yesterday. Already, law enforcers across the country have been kept

on alert, following intelligence reports that Jamaat-Shibir activists may attack lawmen and key installations and snap rail and road communications. Alongside several thousand policemen, members of Rab,

Border Guard and Ansar have been deployed to ensure foolproof security of the secretariat and other important government offices, rail and road bridges, power stations, fuel pumps and other strategic points across the country.

"We've intelligence that Jamaat-Shibir activists might attack law enforcers as they did in the past. Law enforcers have been ordered to open fire if attacked," said an additional secretary of the home ministry, requesting anonymity.

Contacted, Lt Col Ziaul Ahsan, intelligence wing director of Rab, said: "I've ordered my force to shoot if they come under attack."

According to an official of the Special Branch of police, Shibir men were plotting to uproot rail tracks and dig holes and fell trees on highways to cut off Dhaka from the rest of SEE PAGE 2 COL 5

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Polls-time cabinet by vote percentage

The ruling Awami League wants the cabinet seats of its proposed all-party election-time government to be shared on the basis of percentage of votes the political parties got in the last parliamentary election, not the number of their lawmakers.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina plans to form the interim government with a 10-member cabinet. Of them, five would come from the AL, four from the BNP and one from the Jatiya Party, said AL insiders. The number of cabinet members might be increased on the issue, said diplo-

through discussions if the BNP agrees to join it, said the matic sources. Election Commission statistics show the AL bagged 49

percent votes, the BNP 33.2 percent votes and HM Ershad's Jatiya Party 7 percent votes in the last national polls. Hasina recently discussed the issue with some of her

close associates after announcing the proposal for an allparty polls-time government, which she finalised without discussing at any party forums, said AL insiders. The prime minister told her close associates that if the

interim cabinet seats are distributed based on the numbers of lawmakers the political parties have in parliament, the BNP would have a very low representation in the polls-time government.
