5 killed in violence

BGB opens fire in Cox's Bazar, BNP men clash with cops, AL activists elsewhere STAR REPORT

At least five people were killed and more than 450 were injured as opposition activists clashed with ruling party men and law enforcers centring demonstrations across the country yesterday.

Of the deceased, two pro-BNP activists were killed in Cox's Bazar, two in Chandpur, and a Jamaat man in Nilphamari. Another Jamaat-e-Islami activist died reportedly of cardiac arrest during a procession in Satkhira. Violence marred the day in several other districts as well.

In Cox's Bazar, the two men were killed and five others sustained bullet injuries when law enforcers opened fire on a BNP procession brought out in Chakaria yesterday afternoon violating a ban on political programmes, reports our correspondent there.

The deceased were Mohammad Badsha, 25, an activist of BNP's youth wing Jubo Dal, and Mizanur Rahman, 22, activist of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal, the pro-BNP student body.

The officer-in-charge of Chakaria Police Station claimed that opposition activists fired "around 250" bullets at police and Border Guard Bangladesh personnel forcing them to retaliate.

Tense Dhaka sees arson, blasts

Fearing possible violence from a face-off between the ruling and opposition parties, panic-stricken city residents mostly stayed indoors yesterday, leaving the streets almost empty.

In the end, the day passed with some minor incidents, including crude bomb blasts and vandalism.

Unidentified miscreants hurled two cocktails at the Zigatola residence of minister without portfolio Suranjit Sengupta around 6:00am. In the evening, at least 12 crude bombs blasted at different parts of the capital and two vehicles were torched and another one was vandalised, said police and witnesses.

Meantime, around 20 platoons of Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB) members have been deployed in the city for 12 hours from 7:00pm.

"We've deployed our force in aid of civil administration following their request," Col Hafiz Ahsan Farid, deputy director general (operations) of BGB, told The Daily Star last night.

Besides, members of Rapid Action Battalion and police were seen guarding and patrolling the city streets.

Dreadful days ahead?

Opposition's call for 3-day hartal worries commoners

Having no alternative means of livelihood, bus driver Amin Sheikh fears of dreadful days ahead, as the opposition leader yesterday called a 60-hour nationwide hartal from Sunday morn-

He already suffered from passenger scarcity yesterday as the city dwellers had hardly stepped out of their homes fearing political violence centring opposition's rally at Suhrawardy

Udyan in the capital. "I get to drive the bus on alternate days which fetch me something between Tk 800 and Tk 1,000. With this income, I have to support my

family of four living at Lalkuthi area in path," said Bashar. Darussalam," said Amin, adding that he would have to ask local shopkeepers to sell him essentials on credit.

With a capital of Tk 4,000 at hand, vegetable vendor of Karwan Bazar Mohammad Bashar expressed similar apprehension, as he too lives on daily income.

He feels the three-day shutdown will be of the fiercest of its kind and there would be no scope for trucks to bring in vegetables to the capital.

"I maintain a three-member family with my daily income of Tk 400 to Tk 500. If I have to live on my capital for the next three days, I will not be able to continue my business on the foot-

Vendor Karim, who sells shoes on a pavement in Farmgate, also sees hard times ahead. He is at a loss regarding how to feed his family of four living in

the city's Kathalbagan area. customers instead of taking a pause at his makeshift shop rushing home.

"I could not sell a single pair of office. shoes from 3:30pm until 6:00pm, whereas on regular days, I sell several pairs by this time," he said.

Thousands, who live hand to mouth, bear most of the burnt on hartal days.
