

HASINA PHONES KHALEDA

Relief? Not so much

Two leaders talk for 37 minutes; fail to set date, agree on contents of dialogue

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina finally phoned her archrival Khaleda Zia yesterday, and invited the BNP chairperson to the Gono Bhaban tomorrow to talk about the next parliamentary election.

But uncertainty remains, as they couldn't agree on the date and the contents of their parley.

In reply to the prime minister's invite, Khaleda said she could hold talks only after the opposition's 60-hour shutdown ends on October 29 evening.

At that, Hasina urged the BNP chief to call off the hartal. Khaleda, the leader of the opposition, said it was not

possible to withdraw the hartal now.

During the 37-minute conversation, the prime minister told Khaleda that they could discuss the all-party polls-time government she (Hasina) proposed in her address to the nation on October 18.

"You know I have been holding talks with different political parties. I invite you to the Gono Bhaban to discuss the upcoming election and have dinner with me ... Give me a list of people who will accompany you. You may bring along as many people as you want," Hasina told Khaleda over the phone.

3-day hartal on

Khaleda declines to entertain Hasina's request over phone

Rejecting the prime minister's request to call off the hartal, the BNP-Jamaat-e-Islami-led 18-party opposition alliance enforced a 60-hour nationwide strike from this morning, worrying people about security and economic activities.

The shutdown aimed at forcing Sheikh Hasina's government to install a non-partisan election-time government raised fear of violence as ruling and opposition parties prepare for a face off on the streets.


Business leaders also requested opposition parties not to enforce hartal, calling it a destructive weapon that hinders the country's economic growth.

"The two major political parties give priority to the issue of retaining power or assuming power over economic advancement of the country. We are just killing our potentials," said Fazlul Hoque, former chief of Bangladesh Knitwear Manufacturers & Exporters Association.
