# Education in peril

Anxiety grips students, guardians as JSC-JDC exams coincide with opposition's planned blockade, hartal next month

Around 20 lakh schoolchildren are all set to bear the brunt of the ongoing political turmoil, thanks to the BNP-led opposition's planned three-day blockade from Monday, which coincides with the start of the JSC and JDC examinations.

And the woes of these children and their guardians are unlikely to end with the end of the blockade, as the opposition alliance plans to intensify its street agitation in the coming weeks to realise its demand for a non-party election-time government.

Also worried and panicked over such programmes are about 30 lakh primary and ebtedai students, as their exams begin on November 20.

Officials say they have completed all preparations for the Junior Secondary Certificate and Junior Dakkhil Certificate tests. It will be difficult for them to reschedule the exams if the opposition keep enforcing hartals and blockades.

Exams in two subjects of the JSC and JDC are scheduled for Monday, the day the three-day possible blockade of roads, rail and waterways begins. The exams of these class-VIII school

The prime minister, the leader of the opposition, ministers, lawmakers and other very important persons will not get any government facilities during their campaign for the next parliamentary polls, says a proposed amendment to the electoral code of conduct.

Besides, they will not be able to allocate money or make donations from any government, non-government or autonomous funds during the pre-election period, reads the proposal drafted by the Election Commission.

The EC defined the "pre-election period"

as the time from announcing the election schedule till the publishing of the gazette of election results. However, according to the existing code of conduct, 90 days from the dissolution of parliament constitute the pre-election period.

The commission yesterday finalised the draft that will be uploaded on its official website in a day or two for public opinion.

According to the proposal, the other VIPs are the speaker of parliament, chief whip, deputy speaker, deputy leader of the opposition, whip, deputy ministers and those holding equivalent posts, and lawmakers and city corporation mayors.
