I can't take 20 balls to get set, I need to go out in the middle and play to the tone of the match. So it's not easy but I am still trying my best," he said, adding that he also love to bowl.

With 163 runs, Naeem Islam was the highest run-scorer of the ODI series and was Bangladesh's unlikely hero. 'Unlikely' because Naeem did not originally feature in Bangladesh's playing eleven and made a late entry following Shakib Al Hasan's exit due to dengue fever. The player, who played crucial knocks in the first and third ODIs, spoke to The Daily Star's Naimul Karim regarding his performance in the series.

DAILY STAR SPORT (DSS): Congratulations. How does it feel to be the highest scorer in the series?

NAEEM ISLAM (NI): Am I the highest just among my team or among everyone?

DSS: Among everyone.

NI: Oh, I was not sure of that. But that's good. Well, that just feels great honestly. I have been working hard on my batting in the last few months and thankfully I performed at the right

DSS: According to the captain you got in the playing eleven only due to Shakib Al Hasan's injury. From not being in the team to top-scoring in the series, did you expect that? NI: After Shakib got injured I tried

to make the most of the opportunity. I don't get too many chances so I really wanted to make it count. So yeah, I gave it my best shot. It started from the Test series; I worked on my batting a lot. Back then, even before Shakib's injury I was hopeful of playing at least one ODI and I knew that I would have to prove myself. Thankfully it worked

DSS: After that heroic performance, do you think you have sealed a spot in



the team?

NI: No, not at all. How can that be? Once Shakib gets fit he is going to be back and play in the number five position, where I batted. So I think I still need to fight to get a place in the team for the next series.

DSS: Is that disappointing?

NI: No. Look, it depends on what the team needs and the right combination. In fact this is a good sign for Bangladesh, there is a growing competition which was not that clearly seen before. There are so many players performing; it shows that we are progressing as a team.

DSS: You were a member of the team that beat New Zealand 4-0 in 2010. Which series win would you rate better?

NI: In terms of series wins both are equally important. But for me this win feels a lot better than the one in 2010. Back then I just played one out of the four games. My performance this year was a lot better.

DSS: You were involved in two 50run stands on Sunday. What was your

NI: There was a goal that we had to reach after every set of overs and it was going well. With [Shamsur Rahman] Shuvo I wanted to bat till the 35th over. He got out just before that. I wanted to bat till the end with Nasir [Hossain], but sadly I could not.

DSS: You were run out. An unfortunate end to a good innings?

NI: Yes. Actually, they had changed the position of the fielder just before that and I did not notice that. So yes, hard luck.

NZ press lays into whitewashed Kiwis

"How does a team go from beating South Africa and England in ODI series in their own back yard, to being Bangla-washed?" was a question posed yesterday by the Auckland-based New Zealand

Herald, the country's leading daily, following their cricket team's 3-0 series defeat to Bangladesh. There were other media reports too which followed a

similar flavour and came down hard on the Black Caps.

The New Zealand Herald in an article titled 'Black Caps: Three Harsh Questions' wrote, "This series result is symptomatic of New Zealand's long-running problems on the sub-continent. They often look clueless over there. They can hardly be accused of underestimating the opposition after the 4-0 drubbing three years ago.

The paper also questioned if the Black Caps had reached an all-time low. It stated, "The Black Caps' latest ODI series whitewash to Bangladesh adds another chapter to what has been a pretty dark year for the New Zealand cricket side that began when they were bowled out for just 45 against South Africa in Newlands." Another leading Daily, The Press, described New

Zealand's ground fielding and bowling performance as 'second-rate' and that it reminded everyone of the ghosts of the 2010 series defeat. According to an article entitled, "Sorry Black Caps lose by four wickets", 'The broom came out of the cupboard again this morning, as New Zealand suffered a successive one-day international series whitewash in Bangladesh.'

Analysts stated that while the defeat cannot be forgotten, the only way to ease the pain would be to perform well in the next series at home.

"They [fans] would call for patience, that there's a long summer at home to come. Beating the West Indies, then India, would make Bangladesh a distant memory.

You're as good as your last effort, however, so the Windies can't come soon enough. Problem is, this won't be forgotten," wrote The New Zealand Herald.

Injury-prone Australian batsman Shane Watson said Monday he is confident he will be fit for this month's opening Ashes Test against England despite suffering from a

hamstring problem. The powerful all-rounder will have scans later in the day on what he believes may be a fascial tear, before discussing the results with Cricket Australia's medical staff and working out how best to prepare for the Brisbane Test, which starts on November 21.

"It's not too bad," Watson told reporters at Sydney airport.

"I've had a few niggles like this even over the last eight or nine months, so hopefully it won't be too bad at all or put me out for too long.

"My body's really adjusting to bowling, it's just an unfortunate little hiccup." Asked if he had any

doubts about whether he

would be involved in the series opener, Watson said: "I'd never say 'no doubt' but I've been able to get on top of this sort of thing over the last eight or nine months with a few niggles that I had even throughout the [July-August] Ashes as well."

timate Test match, chalking out an elaborate list of plans to felicitate the legend as he prepares to walk out at the Eden Gardens for one final time against the West Indies over November

From conferring him with an honorary membership, felicitation by Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee, to naming a gallery after him, the CAB officials have chalked out a list of 'todo' in order to match Tendulkar's home association MCA in giving the

maestro a memorable farewell. "We would like to give him an honorary membership and later we would think of naming a gallery after him. But at the moment, we would

not like to disturb his focus from the match," CAB joint-secretary Subir Ganguly told reporters.

Tendulkar has always offered puja at Kolkata's famous Kali Temple at Kalighat and the CAB plans to present the cricketer's wife, Anjali, with a saree which was an offering to Goddess Kali during the recently concluded festivities. "We would present them [Tendulkar couple] with 'blessed saree'; and if Tendulkar scores a ton here, we'll feel proud," said Ganguly.

The chief minister will personally come to Eden Gardens on the last day of the Test to felicitate Tendulkar.

With superstars Amitabh Bachchan and Shah Rukh Khan in town for the film festival during that time, they too are expected, even though the CAB is tight-lipped about the guests list. It's like 'Sachin Tendulkar Festival' as the countdown began on Sunday for the Indian batsman's last outing at the majestic Eden.

CAB president Jagmohan Dalmiya and sports minister Madan Mitra earlier flagged off a tableau carrying memorable moments of Tendulkar's illustrious 24-year international career. The tableau has Tendulkar's cutouts and some rare photographs, and it would go to every parts of the metropolis till the last day of the Test traversing about 200 kms.

"Eden has the largest capacity of 70,000 but still many would be deprived to see Tendulkar, and the tableau will make up for it. It will stop at several places giving people an opportunity to have a glimpse of it," Dalmiya said. "To get a Test in the Tendulkar farewell series itself is a big achievement for us," he added.

On the last day of the Test, three two-seater aircraft will shower 199 kg rose petals from the sky to make it more befitting for Tendulkar. "They had a drill on Monday and everything is going on course. We're hopeful of a fine show," Mitra said.
