Jubo Mohila League tries to attack BNP MPs on JS premises

A group of Jubo Mohila League activists carrying sticks tried to attack a procession of 12 BNP lawmakers on the parliament compound in the capital yesterday.

Journalists present there said Opposition Chief Whip Zainul Abdin Farroque was leading the procession near the South Plaza around 10:30am in favour of the opposition's 60-hour hartal.

About half an hour later, some 40 activists of Jubo Mohila League, the youth wing (female) of the Awami League, led by its President Nazma Akhtar and General Secretary Prof Apu Ukil, gathered on Manik Mia Avenue. Some of them were carrying sticks.

As the parliament is in session, Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) has already imposed a ban on carrying any kind of weapons, including sticks, on the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban premises. But police, who were deployed at the entrance to the Manik Mia Avenue, did not stop them, witnesses said.

Later, the Mohila League activists were locked into a scuffle with another team of police who barred them from going farther towards the procession. But in the meantime about three activists went close to the procession with sticks

US congressman urges 2 parties to be peaceful DIPLOMATIC CORRESPONDENT

Visiting US Congressman Steve Chabot yesterday said both the ruling and opposition parties in Bangladesh should spearhead their campaigns peacefully ahead of the election and speak the truth that "whoever wins, wins but absolutely no violence should occur".

Steve arrived in Dhaka yesterday for a "couple of days" to discuss Bangladesh's role in the region and the bilateral

relations. The congressman, who met opposition leader Khaleda Zia, Law Minister Shafique Ahmed, Foreign Minister Dipu Moni, and Jamaat-e-Islami leader Abdur Razzak, also looks forward to discussing the international war crimes tribunals.

On the country's current political challenges, he said the US would not tell Bangladesh what to do. "It is not America but it's the people of Bangladesh who would decide what's best for them."

Emerging from a meeting with Khaleda Zia last evening, Steve said, "We look to see a free, fair and transparent election in Bangladesh."

The BNP chief informed Steve that her party was sincere

BDR MUTINY

Govt helps families of slain army officers

The families of those army officers who were killed in the 2009 BDR mutiny have got over Tk 41 lakh each and a plot or flats in the last five years from the government and other sources.

Each family received Tk 10 lakh from the prime minister's fund, Tk 5 lakh from the Army Welfare fund, and Tk 50,000 from Border Guard Bangladesh or BGB (previously Bangladesh Rifles or BDR) Welfare Fund, according to Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR).

The Bangladesh Association of Bankers gave Tk 24 lakh to each family, while Trust Mutual Bank gave placement shares worth

Tk 2 lakh to them. A total of 57 army officials were among 74 people killed in the February 25-26 mutiny that year.

Apart from those monetary assistances, each family received funds and facilities from the family security project, DSOP Fund, grants from the Welfare Fund, and monthly pensions.

The government gave employment to 32 members from the families, of whom three were given overseas jobs. In addition, 84 family members were admitted to different educational institutions to study free. Ten children of the deceased's families entered different cadet colleges.

To ensure permanent accommodations, families of 37 officers were allotted plots at Mirpur DOHS where 10 other families got two apartments each. Earlier, 11 officers had got plots in different DOHSs or under Rajuk projects. Temporarily, 43 families were provided accommodation in Dhaka Cantonment.


