### **Social Business** Summit kicks off in Malaysia today

...... The Global Social Business Summit will kick off in Kuala Lumpur today with an aim to find ways on how the new economic theory can be applied to solve social problems in order to change the world.

Themed 'Social business to change the world', the three-day annual event will open at KLCC Convention Centre in the Malaysian capital.

This year, 600 participants from around 40 countries will attend the fifth edition of the summit. A total of 107 participants will join from Bangladesh, where the idea was originated by its sole Nobel Peace Prize Winner Prof Muhammad Yunus.

# 80 factories shut over unrest fears

Production in nearly 80 garment factories at Savar, Ashulia and Gazipur was suspended yesterday in anticipation of a massive labour unrest over prompt implementation of the wage board's recommended minimum salary of Tk 5,300.

"I have closed down five of my units at Kashimpur fearing unrest. I will reopen them once I hear of the government and BGMEA's final decision on the minimum wage," said MA Jabbar, managing director of DBL Group, a leading garment group.

A total of 9,000 workers are employed

in the five units that were closed, he said. "The government and the BGMEA should resolve the wage issue as soon as possible to avoid further unrest." Momin Mondol, managing director of

Mondol Group, another leading garment group in Gazipur, also said he suspended production in one of his units fearing unrest.

"They [the workers] come and leave as they please, without doing any work. However, they did not submit any written

demand to the factory management."

He, too, said he is waiting on a decision from the government and BGMEA.

Atiqul Islam, president of Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA), said nearly 80 factories in Savar, Ashulia and Narayanganj shelved production yesterday. However, our Gazipur and Savar

correspondents reported 12 factories in Savar and Ashulia and 20 in Gazipur The BGMEA president said the owners will meet with the labour and employ-

ment minister on November 11 to discuss

the minimum wage issue. "We are expecting a decision from the government in the meeting." He said the small and medium factories will face difficulties in implementation of the recommended salary at Tk

5,300 per month. "We need a win-win situation. The board has imposed the recommendation on us -- the industry will not be able to sustain the recommended salary struc-

## Sonali allowed to take any step to retrieve Hall-Mark funds: Muhith

The bank suggests govt appoint an administrator for the group

Sonali Bank board will have the complete autonomy to do whatever is needed to retrieve the funds swindled by Hall-Mark Group, Finance Minister AMA Muhith said yesterday.

"We will go ahead with whatever Sonali Bank board decides. I repeat, there will not be any interference on the government's part," Muhith told reporters after a meeting between the finance ministry's banking division and the state-owned bank's board to discuss the options for recovering the swindled funds.

According to Sonali Bank's latest data, Hall-Mark Group took out loans of Tk 2,964 crore, of which it has already adjusted Tk 410

crore. As a result, the company still owes the state-run bank Tk 2,554 crore.

"Sonali did everything within its rights to repossess the funds. Now, there is no other option but to take legal actions against Hall-Mark Group."

The move comes after Sonali Bank on October 30 forwarded a host of recommendations following assessment of Hall-Mark Group's total assets, their repayment capacity and their lawyers' opinion to the finance ministry. On top of the list of recommendations was legal action against the company.

According to the six lawyers that Sonali Bank consulted, the cases have to be filed within three years of detection of the irregularities.

### DCCI launches handbook on entrepreneurship

The Dhaka Chamber of Commerce and Industry (DCCI) yesterday unveiled a handbook on entrepreneurship as part of its plan to create 2,000 innovative entrepreneurs across Bangladesh.

President Advocate Abdul Hamid unveiled the guideline styled 'Handbook of Entrepreneurship' at the 'Entrepreneurship and Innovation Expo' organised by DCCI at Sonargaon Hotel in Dhaka.

Through this programme, DCCI will not only guide new entrepreneurs but also arrange financing from an allocated fund of Tk 100 crore from Bangladesh Bank and different financial institutions.

The chamber has already opened a help desk to register innovative entrepreneurs and projects in different traditional and nontraditional sectors, said DCCI President Sabur Khan at the expo.

"We will hold a seminar in Dhaka in May next year, when the successful projects and entrepreneurs will be awarded," Khan said.

DCCI has taken such an initiative to create jobs, he said. A total of two million people come to the job market every year, but the existing companies can only absorb one million, he added.
