FAILURE TO PROTECT PABNA HINDUS

Journalist Abed Khan says attackers belong to AL, BNP and Jamaat; one more held

Former state minister for information Abu Sayeed yesterday accused State Minister for Home Shamsul Hoque Tuku and police for not taking immediate steps to protect Hindus in Bonogram of Pabna's Santhia upazila.

On November 2, over 100 Hindu houses in Sahapara and Ghoshpara were torched, vandalised and looted after some unidentified people in Bonogram Bazar distributed photocopies of, what they said, a "Facebook page" where one Rajib Saha maligned Prophet Mohammad (pbuh).

The Hindu schoolboy was framed by extortionists, mostly belonging to the BNP and Jamaat-e-Islami, after his businessman father Babul Saha refused to pay them.

Meanwhile, police arrested a man, accused of instigating the

attack, in connection with a case police filed on the night of the attack under the information and communication technology act.

Amimul Ehsan, 40, arrested at Sujanagar upazila's Bhobanipur village, confessed in preliminary interrogation spreading the photocopies, Assistant Superintendent of Police Abu Bakar Siddique in Pabna informed The Daily Star.

The total number of arrests now stands at 11 centring three cases, one filed by Babul and the two by police.

Earlier yesterday, journalist Abed Khan, addressing a press briefing in Pabna Press Club, stated that the attackers belonged to the Awami League, BNP and Jamaat and the attack was not an isolated one but the same as the ones perpetrated on minorities around the country.

KINGFISHER

wo years ago, while visiting Sundarban, I spotted a kingfisher high on top of a gewa tree on the beach. It descended swiftly to the water fifty feet away, dived, caught a small fish, and flew to another perch – all in less than five seconds.

I was astonished. How could it see the fish from so far away? Researching, I discovered that kingfishers have unusual eyes that allow them to detect movement up to three hundred feet away and see beneath six feet of water, even through glare. The bird has two foveae in each eye. They work together, allowing for extremely sharp vision in the air and accurate estimation of the depth of prey in water. (The fovea is that part of the eye responsible for our clearest, sharpest vision - each human eye has one fovea.) But the kingfisher's eyes cannot

move much in their socket, which is why it constantly moves its head up and down, to and fro.

Bangladesh has a dozen species of kingfishers. Of these, black-capped, brown-winged, collared, common, pied, and white-throated kingfishers are more common; others are less so. To my knowledge, the best place to watch a variety of kingfishers is Sundarban, which hosts nine species. You can see several easily during a trip there. If you take an early- morning ride on a small boat, you might spot a brown-winged kingfisher playing "catch me if you can" with the boat as it flits from branch to branch at water's edge, always maintaining a safe

distance from the boat. But you don't have to go to Sundarban to see our kingfishers - they can be seen around many water bodies, including Dhaka's lakes. With a flash of electric blue contrasting with

orange or red, these birds dive into the water to catch their prey, then fly low over the water before finding a perch to sit.

The kingfisher family originated in the tropical forests of South-East and East Asia and spread to other places. There are eighty six species worldwide. They can be found mostly in the tropics - with a few species in colder regions - and come in a wide range of colours and sizes. The smallest kingfisher weighs eight grams while the largest is five hundred grams.

Fish is not the only diet of kingfishers. Several species live in dry land, far from water, and eat insects. Their bodies have adapted: for example, Australian earthworm-eating kingfishers have short, conical bills. Kingfishers living near water supplement fish with insects and smaller aquatic animals. The pied kingfisher is special. While most kingfishers must sit on a perch to scan for food, thus limiting their hunting range over water, the pied kingfisher has the ability to hover - and scan - at one spot over water for many seconds. This greatly extends its hunting range over water.

Like all birds, kingfishers have a very high metabolism and most of their time is spent looking for food. For example, the common kingfisher eats 60% of its body weight every day. But whether hunting or simply flying, kingfishers are a treat for our eyes.

Pedalling 15,000km for 20 orphans

How far can a person go to change the lives of 20 orphan boys? For Luke Barton and Tom Smith, it is from London's Brick Lane to Dhaka. But here's the twist: the adventure-hungry duo crossed almost half of Europe and Asia, a whopping 15,000 kilometres or so, on bicycles.

The two-wheeled attempt was aimed at raising awareness on collecting funds to make a positive difference in the lives of the 20 children living in Noor E Farid Nasrine Academy in Comilla.

Arriving in Bangladesh on November 4 after a gruelling five-month-long journey, the duo met the press in the capital's La Vinci Hotel yesterday.

Neither of them are professional cyclists - Luke works for an engineering company and Tom for a web development firm. But that does not make them your average Joe. The feat of

crossing at least 13 countries, pushing their bodies to the maximum while travelling through extreme temperatures and varying terrains, is a testament to that.

No talks if hartal continues: MKA

No dialogue or discussion can be held if the opposition alliance continues with its destructive and undemocratic agitation for formation of a polls-time government, said Home Minister Mohiuddin Khan Alamgir yesterday.

He said at least 18 people have been killed in the recent hartals enforced by the BNP-led 18-party alliance. Those who enforced the hartals violated the rights of the victims, and so it is the government's responsibility to bring the enforcers under trial, he added.

The minister was speaking to reporters after attending a discussion at Institution of Diploma Engineers, Bangladesh in the capital. The discussion was held on the occasion of the institute's 43rd founding anniversary.

Mohiuddin said it is not possible to sit with BNP-Jamaat as they are destroying people's lives and properties through hartals and attacking minority communities.

He claimed that the opposition's hartals were unsuccessful as the public did not support their agitation programme.

Refuting allegations that law enforcers harassed common people during hartals, the minister said law enforcers performed their duty to maintain law and order.
