Alves adds to Barca's injury woes

Brazilian full-back Dani Alves has become the latest Barcelona star to be struck by injury as he has been ruled out for up to 10 days with a calf problem.

The 30-year-old suffered the injury whilst away on international duty with Brazil and will miss Saturday's league match at home to Granada and Barca's Champions League visit to Ajax next week.

"The tests carried out on Thursday morning have confirmed that Dani Alves has a small muscle tear in his right calf. The approximate time out will be seven to 10 days," said a statement on the club's website.

The next step is the World Cup draw on December 6th, where the teams will be divided into all-important groups.

The draw process is simple. There are four "pots" with

eight teams each. The final groups consist of one team from each of the four pots, and they are randomly drawn from a hat. So teams from Pot 1 can't be in groups with teams from Pot and so on.

Pot 1 is the top-eight teams in the world according to FIFA's rankings. Pot 2 is four teams from Asia and four teams

from North America. Pot 3 and is five teams from Africa, two teams from South America, and one team

from Europe. Pot 4 is eight teams from Europe.

Three unlucky teams will be placed in a group with hosts Brazil, fresh from winning the 2013 Confederations Cup and raring to get

going in front of a raucous home crowd. Three more unlucky teams will land with Argentina, three with Colombia, three with Uruguay, and even if you avoid those, Chile and Ecuador may be lying in wait later in the draw.

If you pick up a group containing Belgium, Chile and South Korea, it's still a tough draw considering you could have landed Ghana or Honduras (depending on the pots) instead of La Roja on their home continent.

With the pots (largely) predictable, you can begin to forecast a potential "Group of Death" scenario, which incorporates four of the strongest teams that can feasibly be drawn together.

Brazil, as hosts, could head a group that contains Italy, France and Mexico. Argentina could feasibly be paired up with the Netherlands, the Ivory Coast and Japan.

At the other end of the scale, Switzerland, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Burkina Faso and Australia could all be drawn together, making for a nip-and-tuck scenario between all four sides.



Messi hails Ronaldo



Barcelona superstar Lionel Messi praised archrival Cristiano Ronaldo's goal-scoring prowess in an interview

published Thursday as speculation mounted that the Portuguese international could be picked as World Player of the Year. A day after picking up a Golden

Boot award for scoring 46 league goals last season, more than any other player in Europe, the 26-year-old Messi paid respect to his Real Madrid rival.

"I don't know if Cristiano Ronaldo is at his peak but he is always there scoring goals in all the games and taking part in his club and national side," Messi told Spanish sports daily Marca and other European sports journalists.

"He has been doing that for many years and whether he is at his peak or a bit less makes no difference."

The 28-year-old Ronaldo is emerging as the favourite to pick up this year's Ballon d'Or for the world's best

player over four-time winner Messi.

Ronaldo scored a hat-trick on Tuesday as Portugal beat Sweden to qualify for their fourth straight World Cup finals and he tops the Spanish league scoreboard so far this season with 16 goals in 13 matches.

Messi has 11 goals from eight games in the league this season but has been sidelined for up to eight weeks with a muscle tear in his left hamstring muscle, his third leg injury this season. Spanish Prime Minister Mariano

Rajoy, a Real Madrid fan, told public radio he would back Ronaldo for the Ballon d'Or award if he had a vote. "I think he is in impressive form. He is a player who gives everything, who

makes an all-out effort. Yes, I would

vote for him," Rajoy said. The Portuguese's chances seemed to rise even further when FIFA announced this week a two-week extension to the voting deadline until November 29, citing a weak turnout, and allowing participants to change ballots already cast.

Catalan sports newspapers, which traditionally back Barcelona, cried foul

over the FIFA decision, which comes as Ronaldo hits top form and Messi is injured.

Messi brushed off comments in the media about the injuries he has picked up this season, following some criticism that he should have paced himself better.

"What they say about the injury did not worry me and does not worry me because I am used to people talking and saying many things not only about the injury but about pretty much everything," he said.

"I am sorry I cannot help my teammates now but it is an injury that heals normally and I will be back next year keen to get started."

The Argentine international said there was no chance of his leaving Barcelona despite suggestions that some clubs would be ready to write a blank cheque to sign him.

"My intention is to stay with Barcelona for good," Messi said.

"I am grateful if what they say is true and there are people interested. It makes you proud that they say such things. But my life is with Barcelona."

Uruguay last to qualify

Uruguay became the final team to qualify for the 2014 World Cup on Wednesday after grinding out a 0-0 draw in a gritty battle with Asian minnows Jordan.

After Uruguay thrashed the Jordanians 5-0 in the first leg in Amman last week, a capacity crowd at Montevideo's famous Centenario Stadium had looked forward to seeing a full-strength Celeste side produce a high-scoring send-off.

their fans from erupting in wild celebrations at the final whistle as fireworks exploded above the stadium.

Uruguay, the fifth ranked side in South America's qualifying campaign became the last of 32 teams to qualify for next year's

World Cup in Brazil.

Only a few months ago, 2010 World Cup semi-finalists Uruguay had been struggling to qualify, scraping into fifth place after mounting a late rally which saw them win four out of their five final qualifiers.

They join Brazil, Argentina, Colombia, Ecuador and Chile as the South American representatives at the finals. The tone for Wednesday's match was set

early on with Mohammed Aldmeiri and Adnan Hasan both booked by referee Jonas Eriksson in the first half for some wild lunges. Uruguay meanwhile struggled to pene-


